This letter is to put on the record my extreme concern about the questionable quality of Marble Hill construction. At Marble Hill, there have been discovered so far (who knows what <u>may</u> be discovered):

- Defective concrete construction and improper repair;
- 2. Defective welds;
- 3. Ineffective and insufficient inspection systems;
- Intentional failure by PSI to use nuclear certified plumbing materials.

This misconduct demonstrates that PSI doesn't deserve the opportunity to build a nuclear reactor. Fortunately, this lack of merit was discovered now before Marble Hill is built. Otherwise, this incompetence would only be discovered during a "postmortem" similar to Three Mile Island investigation.

Additional questions must be answered before construction on Marble Hill should be permitted to resume:

- 1. Do we really need it?
- 2. Where is the radioactive waste to be stored?
- 3. Who, rate payers or PSI shareholders, is going to carry the burden of repair or delay?
