Dear Ms. Nasta:

I have been asked to respond to your letter of September 6, 1979 to Mr. Harold Denton. As you may be aware, it is the responsibility of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to assure the health and safety of the public and workers regarding the providing of electric power by nuclear means. No construction permit or operating license will be issued to a utility company for a nuclear power plant until all of our criteria for safety and public and worker health protection are met. As a result of the Three Mile Island accident, which actually had a very small health effect, there will be additional safety features added to both operating plants and plants under construction or planned.

The health effect of the Three Mile Island accident was minute, as shown in the attached interagency report (NUREG-0558). As described on Page 2 of that report, the projected number of excess health effects is approximately two, in a population that would be normally expected to have 325,000 fatal cancers over the rest of its lifetime.

Normal operation of the nuclear fuel cycle also creates for fewer health effects than an equivalent amount of power generated by coal. In NUREG-0332, attached, Table 1, page 17 shows that excess mortalities in the nuclear fuel cycle are 0.47 per 0.8 GWy(e) compared to 15-120 for coal for the same amount of energy.

Finally, I should mention that the current radiation exposure experience of nuclear power plant workers, under the occupational exposure limits of Federal Regulation 10 CFR Part 20 which is implemented by NRC, places their work in a low risk category compared to most industrial employment.
