WHEREAS, the Board of Chosen Freeholders of the County of Ocean, on behalf of County residents and visitors, has consistently expressed its grave concern about the potential dangers and health risks associated with the construction and operation of nuclear generating stations in Lacey Township by Jersey Central Power & Light Company; and

WHEREAS, this Board has actively opposed through litigation the construction of the second nuclear generating / tation in Lacey Township, the construction of a 550 foot salt water cooling tower, as well as rate increase applications filed by Jersey Central Power & Light; and

WHEREAS, in the wake of the nuclear accident at Three Mile Island, Pennsylvania on Murch 28, 1979, this Board's concern for environmental safeguards has even untensified; and

WHEREAS, Jersey Central Power & Light has been cited for ninety safety violations within a two-year period and fined \$26,000.00; and

WHEREAS, on August 13-14 1979, some 2300 gallons of radioactive rainwater were discharged into the Oyster Creek without having first been processed through the station's waste treatment facility; and

WHEREAS, the facts that this incident was attributable to human error and went unreported until August 15, 1979 dramatize the need for more careful monitoring and reporting of activities at the Oyster Creek facility:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the BOARD OF CHOSEN FREEHOLDERS of the COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, that it hereby calls upon the Congress of the United States to take necessary action to provide funding for 24 hours a day/7 days a week radiological monitoring of the Cyster Creek racility by an independent agency charged with the responsibility to notify appropriate Federal, State, County and Local officials of an impending threat or danger of radiation contamination of the atmosphere or water supply.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution shall be sent to the United States Senators and Members of the House of Representatives from the State of New Jersey, the State Burgau of Radiation, Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and Jersey Central Power's Light Company.


