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PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: The Commission meets this afternoon on one of several meetings on the Indian Point reactors. As many of you know, we earlier this year established a set of procedures for reviewing the Indian Point reactors. These procedures included setting up an Atomic Safety & Licensing Board which will meet in the New York area, going out on what we call an informal procedure to ask a set of questions to help the Commission identify what tasking we should give to that hearing board, setting up a special task force in the Commission at the Commission level to summarize a number of items of information to enable the Commission to reach the question of what ought to be done with the plants in the interim; the interim being the period between now and when the hearing board reaches its decision.

We have heard extensively earlier in the year from a number of individuals who have concerns about the Indian Point area and Indian Point reactors. We, within the last two weeks, heard from the Task Force on their review, and this afternoon we meet to address the question of the interim operation. Whether today or at another meeting, when we reach that question, we then will have to turn to provide instruction to the General Counsel in order for preparation of the instructions to be given to the licensing board.

Len, perhaps you could outline this afternoon.

MR. BICKWIT: Yes. I guess I also ought to say that

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there's been a request from the UCS to address the Commission and the majority of the Commission does not support that request.

On the -- what I'd like to add is simply that the order of events is one that the Commission can choose. The Commission can choose to follow the order of events as laid out by the Chairman or not. We recommend that order of events, and we believe it implicit in the order originally put out by the Commission.

We also believe it implicit in that order that the decision on the interim operation be made without consideration of the comments under the informal aspect of this proceeding. Initially, it was suggested in an earlier draft of this order that the interim operation be a subject of that proceeding, and ultimately, the Commission decided to remove the question of interim operation from the informal proceeding.

We have advised the Commission that from a legal standpoint, there are many options, but we believe that a decision to
leave the plant operating or to shut it down or to take any action
in between will be sustained if the Commission can support it on
a rational policy basis, and if the Commission acts consistently
in applying that policy to other reactors.

The question, then, for the Commission is what it chooses to do in the interim. The only expression on that subject by memorandum has been from Commissioner Hendrie. You can proceed in any order you like, but I would suggest that given that

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CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Any objection?

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: No.

COMMISSIONER HENDRIE: My conclusion is that the Task

Force report shows us that within the accuracy available for such
evaluations, the operations of the Indian Point units do not
represent a risk that is outside the run of risks from operating
units all across the country. That was the essential question,
tt seems to me that we set the Task Force to determine. I
conclude, therefore, that there should be no objection to the
IP units remaining in operation while we go forward with the
other proceedings established in our May 30th order.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: So your conclusion is to allow the operation to continue under the -- that would be under the conditions as relating to Denton's original order?

COMMISSIONER HENDRIE: Under the conditions prescribed in the Director's order of earlier in the year.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: With no other modification?

COMMISSIONER HENDRIE: I see no need for any.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Vic?

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: On the basis of what we heard from our group that looked into the problem, the safety problems at the Indian Point site didn't seem to stand out sufficiently to cause me to want to terminate the operations while we're

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Is that, then, in agreement with Joe's recommendation?

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Certainly in the large. I'm not sure I understood the fine print.

COMMISSIONER HENDRIE: I don't think there was much fine print. My suggestion, after having a conclusion for myself, was that the next step following a long ledge would be to have the General Counsel and the Policy Evaluate draft an appropriate order that would lay out the background for the decision, and that we look at the language of that and in due time if enough of us thought well of it, vote it as a Commission order s ving that they will continue in operation.

But I think it's useful to have the rationale for that spelled out. The Task Force reported things as they saw them, and they didn't come to a recommendation, so a Commission statement is useful.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: And the other part of it, Vic, was

I think Joe's recommendation was that this operation -- the only
other conditions on it be those as imposed by Denton's early
order in February.

commissioner GILINSKY: Well, those are the only outstanding requirements. I don't have anything additional to add at this point. I suppose that somewhere along the way if we decided that something additional was needed, we'd impose it.

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commissioner Hendrie: And there certainly was no implication in the way I came out that I wouldn't go shead with those things which Harold had said do. Some of them are done, some are in process, some remain to be done. But I propose that they get on and get them done expeditiously.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Peter?

COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: I wouldn't rest this conclusion very heavily on the risk assessment portion of the staff work to date. I think Bob Bernero was very candid in describing the uncertainties attached to that. But my inclination at this point is to permit the plants to stay in operation during the hearing. I do want to review the OGC order and anything else that may come up between now and Wednesday. But my inclination at this point as based on what we've heard over the last few months is that the plant should stay in operation.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: I share the same view. So with that, Len, if you will, then, prepare the order. And at the same time you should also begin turning to -- we now have the comments that came in on the informal proceeding. So I think it's also time for the Commissioners to -- you sent us a summary of that, and we ought to provide you with any additional comments we have to help you focus a draft for us on the instructions to the board.

COMMISSIONER HENDRIE: Yes, I think we need to get on to that next step, which is to begin to outline the terms and conditions on which the adjudication for Indian Point will go

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forward. And not much beyond that, we also need to begin to think at least how we will phase the generic proceeding on high population density sites, with the particular proceeding at Indian Point. You know, let us figure out whether one has to pretty well complete before the other starts, or how they can coordinate and so on.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: I think we ought to get the Indian Point started.

COMMISSIONER HENDRIE: I think that's right, to get that moving certainly as a first step.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Yes. Any other Indian Point issues? MR. BICKWIT: I don't think so. It may not be possible in the time before we hope to have the next meeting to draft up an order with respect to charging the board. I think it will be possible to draft the interim operation.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Fine.

MR. BICKWIT: And at that meeting you might simply want to have an informal discussion to give us some guidance along those lines.

CHAIRMAN AHEARNE: Fine. Any other Indian Point issues? Very well. Adjourned.

(Thereupon, at 2:55 p.m., the meeting in the aboveentitled matter was adjourned.)

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
