

Gentlemen:

Haddam Neck Plant Millstone Nuclear Power Station 1, 2 and 3 Evacuation Time Estimates

In References (1) and (2), the staff requested that NNECO and CYAPCO estimate the period of time necessary to evacuate the people within the areas encompassed by the two, five and ten mile radii of the Haddam Neck Nuclear Power Plant and Millstone Nuclear Power Station Site. This information was to be submitted on or before 1/31/80. Reference (3) requested an extension of the due date, based on certain complications in data acquisition and interfacing with state and local agencies. Verbal communications with NRC staff personnel resulted in the authorization of additional time for NNECO and CYAPCO to complete the compilation of this response.

Accordingly, enclosed are the public notification and evacuation time estimates for the Haddam Neck Plant and Millstone Nuclear Power Station.

Conservative methods were used in estimating these notification and evacuation times. For example, television and commercial radio were not considered as a means of notifying the public. Also, the study used adverse weather conditions and worse case assumptions. Use of more realistic parameters could potentially reduce these time estimates.

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Input to and a brief review of this evacuation study was solicited and received from the Connecticut State Office of Civil Preparedness, the Connecticut State Police, the Connecticut State Department of Transportation and certain selected towns.

The Connecticut Radiological Emergency Response Plan will be expanded to include all the towns within ten miles of each site. No doubt, this detailed planning will result in significant changes to the conclusions of this study.

We trust this information satisfactorily responds to the Reference (1) and (2) requests.
