Dear Ms. Schwabauer:

Your letter of August 24, 1989, to Senator Nancy L. Kassebaum citing your concerns regarding the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission's (NRC's) denial of the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club's petition pursuant to 10 CFR 2.206 has been forwarded to me for response. Enclosed with your letter was a copy of a recent Sierra Club publication that discusses its petition regarding the Wolf Creek Generating Station along with a brief summary of the NRC's decision to deny the request. Included in your letter was a statement relating your belief that concerns raised in the petition were "'swept under the rug' and ignored."

The NRC staff has expended considerable effort over the years in responding to allegations of safety deficiencies relating to the Quality First Program (Q1) at the Wolf Creek Generating Station. Petitions pursuant to 10 CFR 2.206 relating to Q1 have been received from both the Government Accountability Project (GAP) in May 1985 and the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club in January 1989. We responded to these petitions in Director's Decisions DD-88-14, dated August 22, 1988, and DD-89-4, dated June 26, 1989. In addition, the NRC has reviewed Q1 on a number of occasions through the normal inspection process and in a special investigation performed separately by our Office of Investigations (OI).

As previously noted, your letter included a brief discussion of the Sierra Club's petition along with the NRC's decision to deny the request. I believe that it would be beneficial for you to have access to the entire Director's Decision DD-89-4 that was forwarded to the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club. Therefore, I am enclosing a copy of this decision, which provides a complete explanation of (1) the role and function of Q1 at the Wolf Creek Generating Station, (2) the regulations relied upon by the NRC staff in making licensing decisions regarding the Wolf Creek Quality Assurance Program, (3) the role of NRC's review of Q1, and (4) the basis used by NRC in denying the petition. The following items highlight the major topics in the enclosed decision.

- NkC's licensing decisions to approve the Wolf Creek Quality Assurance Program were based upon the regulations found in 10 CFR Part 50, Appendix B, "Quality Assurance Criteria for Nuclear Power Plants and Fuel Reprocessing Plants." This program was completely independent of and separate from the licensee's Q1 program.
- Q1 was a voluntary program established by the licensee to provide an independent route for Wolf Creek employees to bring quality concerns to the attention of Wolf Creek management. Employees continued to have the opportunity to voice their concerns directly to the NRC Resident Inspectors on site.

- Ol was not intended to meet the NRC's quality assurance requirements of 10 CFR Part 50, Appendix B, as implied by the Sierra Club.
- In response to the GAP petition, a special NRC team examined all Q1 files (271 case files containing a total of 752 concerns) and concluded that although a number of programmatic aspects of Q1 were deficient. there were no indications that Q1 failed to properly assess and resolve any significant safety issue. The NRC review team did not identify any violations of or deviations from NRC requirements. Moreover, the NRC team found that the Q1 program adequately resolved all the technical safety issues that were reported by employees through the program.
- The OI investigation of Q1 (OI Case No. 4-86-004) identified a number of shortcomings that were itemized in the Sierra Club publication (e.g., an incident of document shredding and the blackballing of a former inspector by Q1 management; removal of aggressive Q1 investigators from the Q1 program). However, the O1 investigation concluded that despite the shortcomings identified in the Q1 program, the evidence did not establish wrongdoing on the part of Kansas Gas and Electric management. Furthermore, the OI investigation found that some of the most significant technical issues received extensive Q1 attention and multilevel management review and that the NRC was independently involved in closure on many of these important technical issues. The OI report concluded that in those instances, the Q1 program was highly successful in communicating important problems to the affected organizations for corrective action.
- The Sierra Club petition did not provide any new information that had not been available to the staff. Therefore, the staff did not find any basis to take additional action regarding this subject.

In conclusion, I hope that the enclosed material will help alleviate your concerns that safety deficiencies have been ignored at the Wolf Creek Generating Station.

Wolf Creek nuclear generating station at Burlington, Kansas

On January 30th the Kansas Chapter filed a petition with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) in their Office of Inspections and Enforcement demanding suspension of the operating license for Wolf Creek Generating Station in Burlington until the Commission explains why it believes the plant is operating safely in spite of NRC's everwhelming evidence to the contrary. Our petition wasn't based on any new information or new problems at the plant, but was based on a series of published reports, mostly from the NRC itself relating to uncorrected

problems at the plant.

Through a Freedom of Information Act request, the Chapter received documents from NRC's Office of Investigations that confirmed a large number of allegations made by former employees of Wolf Creek concerning operating safety. There have been so many complaints that in June of 1986 NRC opened its third investigation of operating safety since the plant went on line. Many of the allegations regarding safety problems have come from former emplovees of Kansas Gas and Electric Company who participated in the Quality First Program (Q1). The Q1 program encouraged employees to report potential quality assurance problems to KG&E so that they could be addressed. Employees were encouraged to report their concerns to KG&E rather than to the NRC or to other interested groups. When they concluded that KG&E was not adequately investigating and correcting the problems, employers who had first worked within the Q1 program subsequently reported their concerns directly to the NRC. The Office of Investigations of NRC interviewed those who had filed complaints. It is a report of those interviews that the Chapter has reviewed. That report is now available to the public; it is on file in the Wolf Creek Public Document Room at Emporia State Universi-

Specifically, NRC's investigator H. Brooks Griffin interviewed witnesses who substantiated allgations of document shredding; blackballing; transfer and termination of aggressive Q1 investigators; file "streamlining"; confiscation of tape recorders formerly used to record employee allegations about possible safety problems: management changing the conclusions of investigators; management restricting the scope of Q1 assurance investigations; management failing to investigete allegations of drug use, harassment, intimidation, falsifi-

tentially adverse effects on safety; and conflicts of interest.

In the report Griffin himself concluded that, 'verification of corrective action by Q1 was not meaningful" and that 'signifi-cant numbers' of employee allecant numbers of employee au-gations about anfety problems were closed with superficial in-vestigative discumentation, all of which was accepted by Q1 supervi-men. **Griffin also found that emplayer concerns were summarised in one or two sentences which lead to "meaningless investigations and primature closures of issues which merited further investigation." Purther, he found that issuce of wrangdoing were not investigated for potential impuets on disciplined. Finally, Griffin de-termined that the closure rate for some investigators jumped from an average of four per month to the point where some investigators were clo. .ng cases at a rate of one per day as the fuel load date approached and he concluded that nearly 66% of the conclusions used to close Q1 complaints about alleged wrongdeing could not be supported by facts or documentation.

These and numerous other findings are included in Griffia's report, which incidentally, had fully one-third of each of ten pages expurgated (out of the 15-page report) prior to being released for public view. And yet, Griffin stated that despite 'substantial chortcomings identified in the Q1 program, it is concluded that the evidence gathered does not substantiate wrongdoing on the part of KG&E management in their conduct of this voluntary program. The Chapter however, believes that the evidence draws the opposite conclusion and that safety concurns have not been adequately addressed. Secondly, the Chapter believes that the NRC's own regulations make quality assurance mandatory and not voluntary.

We are not alone in our criticism of safety at Wolf Creek. On June 26, 1988 the Kansas City Star reported that Wolf Creek had received the lowest mark possible for its quality control programs in the annual NRC report. The Star ar-ticle also said. The report also criticizes the plant's Quality Assurance program for failing to identify safety-related problems on a timely basis. For instance, managers failed to ensure the repair of defective equipment designed to make sure high levels of chlorine don't esep into the control room." And on July 21, 1988, Joe Callan, Director of the division of reactor projects for NRC Region IV, was quoted in the Kansas City Star / Times as saying that it appeared that Wolf Creek management had improperly sought short-term' solutions to safety problems without determining the underlying causes of problems. He told the rev spaper that corrective actions 'were often superficial and didn't get to the root cause of the southern

cited above, the Chapter had asked

(1) the operating license for Wolf Creek Generating Station be suspended.

(2) that prior to reinstating the operating license:

a. the NRC should reopen its case (\$4-86-004) and provide sound technical reasons for its conclusion that the plant is asie enough to operate in spite of all of its investigative conclusions regarding quality assurance problems;

b. the NRC should review all of its information on quality assurance at Wolf Creek developed subsequent to case #4-86-004 being issued and covering operations through 1989 to provide sound technical reasons for its conclusion that the plant is safe to operate; e c. all corrective actions determined by NRC to be necessary to achieve a level of operating safety that complies with federal regulations she ld be incorporated as conditions of he operating license and if they are and met, the operating license should be revoked.

The petition also asked that four individuals cited in Mr. Griffin's report be barred from any and all involvement or participation in any activities at the generating station.

Recently the Chapter received a response from Thomas E. Murley, Director of the Office of Nuclear Reactor Regulation of the NRC. In his letter Murley states that he has declined to issue an order to suspend operation of the generating station for a number of reasons Among those reasons: NRC does not require licensees to implewment programs like Q1 and does not rely on results from such programs in its licensing decisions. With regard to our request to reopen the Office of Investigation's case (4-86-004) and to review all information on quality assurance, Murley's letter lists the conclusions of the OI report and states that a staff review supports the conclusions reached. He sent on to say, that the Sierra Club petition, "does not offer any new information or additional in-(therefore) the staff sees no basis for reopening" the case. And finally regarding our request that certain individuals cited in Griffin's report be barred from involvement or activity at Wolf Creek, Murley supports the conclusion of the OI case that "the evidence gathered does not substantiate wrongdoing on the part of KG&E management in their conduct" and considering that Sierra's petition does not provide any new information, "the staff does not find a basis to prohibit the named individuals from licensed activities" at Wolf Creek

One of the reasons for our petition was to bringour perception of problems of continuing safety deficiencies at Wolf Creek to the attention of the public. To the extent that you can reise this issue by writing letters to the aditor of your hometers re-spaper or by other

Brooks Griffin interviewed witnesses who substantiated allegetions of document shredding; blackballing; transfer and termination of aggressive Q1 investigators; file "streamlining"; confiscation of tape recorders formerly used to record employee allegations about possible safety problems; management changing the conclusions of investigators; management restricting the scope of Q1 assurance investigations; management failing to investigate allegations of drug use, harassment, intimidation, falsifi-

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In the report Griffin himself concluded that, 'verification of corrective action by Q1 was not meaningful" and that "significant numbers" of employee allegetions about safety problems were closed with superficial investigated that and transparent by stated decementation, all of which was accepted by Q1 supervision. (Griffin also found that emission.) ployee concerns were summarized in poster two sentences which lead to meaningless investigations and primature closures of issues which merited further investigation." Further, he found that issues of wrongdoing were not investigated for potential impacts on matter, and wrongdows were not disciplined. Finally, Griffin determined that the closure rate for some investigators jumped from an average of four per month to the point where some investigators were closing cases at a rate of one per day as the fuel load date approached and he concluded that nearly 66% of the conclusions used to close Q1 complaints about alleged wrongdoing could not be supported by facts or documentation. -

These and numerous other findings are included in Griffin's report, which incidentally, had fully one-third of each of ten pages expurgated (out of the 15-page report) prior to being released for public view. And yet, Griffin stated that despite "substantial chortcominge identified in the Q1 program, it is concluded that the evidence gathered does not substantiate wrongdoing on the part of KG&E man-agement in their conduct of this voluntary program." The Chapter however, believes that the evidence draws the annuals.

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b. the NRC should review all of its information on quality assurance at Wolf Creek developed subsequent to case #4-86-004 being issued and covering operations through 1989 to provide sound technical reasons for its conclusion that the plant is safe to operate;

c. all corrective actions determined by NRC to be necessary to achieve a level of operating safety that complies with federal regulations should be incorporated as conditions of the operating license and if they are not met, the operating license should be revoked.

The petition also asked that four individuals cited in Mr. Griffin's report be barred from any and all involvement or participation in any activities at the generating station.

Recently the Chapter received a response from Thomas E. Murley, Director of the Office of Nuclear Reactor Regulation of the NRC. In his letter Murley states that he - han declined to issue an order to suspend operation of the generating station for a number of reasons Among those reasons: NRC does not require licensees to implewment programs like Q1 and does not rely on results from such programs in its licensing decisions. With recard to our manner

Your letter of August 24, 1989, to Senator Nancy L. Kassebaum citing your concerns regarding the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission's (NRC's) denial of the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club's petition pursuant to 10 CFR 2.206 has been forwarded to me for response. Enclosed with your letter was a copy of a recent Sierra Club publication that discusses its petition regarding the Wolf Creek Generating Station along with a brief summary of the NRC's decision to deny the request. Included in your letter was a statement relating your belief that concerns raised in the petition were "'swept under the rug' and ignored."

The NRC staff has expended considerable effort over the years in responding to allegations of safety deficiencies relating to the Quality First Program (Q1) at the Wolf Creek Generating Station. Petitions pursuant to 10 CFR 2.206 relating to Q1 have been received from both the Government Accountability Project (GAP) in May 1985 and the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club in January 1989. We responded to these petitions in Director's Decisions DD-88-14, dated August 22, 1988, and DD-89-4, dated June 26, 1989. In addition, the NRC has reviewed Q1 on a number of occasions through the normal inspection process and in a special investigation performed separately by our Office of Investigations (Q1).

As previously noted, your letter included a brief discussion of the Sierra Club's petition along with the NRC's decision to deny the request. I believe that it would be beneficial for you to have access to the entire Director's Decision DD-89-4 that was forwarded to the Kansas Chapter of the Sierra Club. Therefore, I am enclosing a copy of this decision, which provides a complete explanation of (1) the role and function of Q1 at the Wolf Creek Generating Station, (2) the regulations relied upon by the NRC staff in making licensing decisions regarding the Wolf Creek Quality Assurance Program, (3) the role of NRC's review of Q1, and (4) the basis used by NRC in denying the petition. The following items highlight the major topics in the enclosed decision.

- NRC's licensing decisions to approve the Wolf Creek Quality Assurance Program were based upon the regulations found in 10 CFR Part 50, Appendix B, "Quality Assurance Criteria for Nuclear Power Plants and Fuel Reprocessing Plants." This program was completely independent of and separate from the licensee's Q1 program.
- Q1 was a voluntary program established by the licensee to provide an independent route for Wolf Creek employees to bring quality concerns to the attention of Wolf Creek management. Employees continued to have the opportunity to voice their concerns directly to the NRC Resident Inspectors on site.

- Q1 was not intended to meet the NRC's quality assurance requirements of 10 CFR Part 50, Appendix B, as implied by the Sierra Club.
- In response to the GAP petition, a special NRC team examined all Q1 files (271 case files containing a total of 752 concerns) and concluded that although a number of programmatic aspects of Q1 were deficient, there were no indications that Q1 failed to properly assess and resolve any significant safety issue. The NRC review team did not identify any violations of or deviations from NRC requirements. Moreover, the NRC team found that the Q1 program adequately resolved all the technical safety issues that were reported by employees through the program.
- The OI investigation of Q1 (OI Case No. 4-86-004) identified a number of shortcomings that were itemized in the Sierra Club publication (e.g., an incident of document shredding and the blackballing of a former inspector by Q1 management; removal of aggressive Q1 investigators from the Q1 program). However, the OI investigation concluded that despite the shortcomings identified in the Q1 program, the evidence did not establish wrongdoing on the part of Kansas Gas and Electric management. Furthermore, the OI investigation found that some of the most significant technical issues received extensive Q1 attention and multilevel management review and that the NRC was independently involved in closure on many of these important technical issues. The OI report concluded that in those instances, the Q1 program was highly successful in communicating important problems to the affected organizations for corrective action.
- The Sierra Club petition did not provide any new information that had not been available to the staff. Therefore, the staff did not find any basis to take additional action regarding this subject.

In conclusion, I hope that the enclosed material will help alleviate your concerns that safety deficiencies have been ignored at the Wolf Creek Generating Station.


