

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anything, and said everything was satisfactory and never mentioned the '83 report or any of the difficulties we're having with hazardous waste, toxic waste, dangerous cancer, and so forth, and said everything is all right.

So how can we believe them when they do this, and even did not give this information to later studies being made by the DOE and EPA in 1988, 1986, and now 1989.

JUDGE BLOCH: Donald W. Wallace.

PRESENTATION BY MR. DONALD W. WALLACE

MR. WALLACE: My name is Don Wallace, I live at 1710 North Cold Canyon Road in Calabasas, California 91302.

I'm a member of the Executive Board of the Coalition for Clean Air, and have been authorized to make a statement in their behalf. Additionally I am the chairman of the Adhoc Group of home owners, and civic, and environmental organizations formed to oppose the relicensing of Rockwell International Corporation, Santa Susanna Field Laboratory.

We oppose this re-licensing for all of the reasons that you've heard to this point and for the other reasons that you will hear later tonight.

We oppose also the re-licensing because the most toxic substance known to man is being trucked through our

neighborhoods.

We oppose the re-licensing because this corporation has been cited for 58 violations of Federal Nuclear Regulations. We oppose the re-licensing because this corporation has been cited for 14 violations of state, health and safety laws. We oppose the re-licensing because this corporation has failed or refused to comply with both federal and state reporting and disclosure laws about nuclear accidents and exposures.

We oppose this re-licensing because they have poorly designed, poorly executed inadequate and antiquated excuse for a monitoring system. We oppose the relicensing because we think that our property values, our investment in public works and emphastructure our physical, emotional and psychological health are more important than the equity of Rockwell shareholders.

We oppose the re-licensing because our lives and our economic futures are compromised and threatened so that this corporation can fully depreciate its capital investment, but most of all we oppose this re-licensing because this corporation has no credibility.

I do not believe Rockwell's assessment of the danger, their record of truthfulness is lacking. I do not believe Rockwell's denials, they have too often turned into addissions. I do not believe Rockwell's assurances,

they have too often proved them false.

A few days ago I had the opportunity to review a document titled, "On site radiological contingency plan for Rockwell International operations licensed under special nuclear material license number SNM-21," dated July 25th, 1986, and revised in May of this year.

This document is rife with false assurances.

This document is generally false and specifically fulse.

The document purports to lay out a plan to detect,

contain, resolve and recover from several different types

of nuclear accidents. It spends most of its 100 or so

pages filling space with bureaucratic nonsense. It lays

out the agreements and resources available to help

mitigate an accident and despite what the document says

and implies, there are no agreements to have many of these

resources respond to emergencies.

Now, I can speak with some knowledge about this subject because I'm a fire captain in Woodland Hills, approximately five and a half miles from the site. I have checked on the accuracy of the document with respect to the fire fighting section, and with respect to the emergency medical section.

Page 1.3 of this document is a map depicting locations of various facilities including emergency resources like hospitals, and fire stations, and sheriff

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sub-stations, and police stations.

Page 1.4, or 1-4 details the facilities depicted on the map. Page 1.5 says, "The legend to figure 1.1, which is the map, also lists those hospitals --

JUDGE BLOCH: Mr. Wallace, stop for a second. I want to make sure if I can get to that. You're talking about the on site radiological plant?

MR. WALLACE: Yes, and I'll give you a copy of the pertinent pages.

JUDGE BLOCH: Okay. I have the whole document, what page should I be looking at?

MR. WALLACE: Start with 1.1. Excuse me, page 1-

JUDGE BLOCH: Thank you. Please, continue.

MR. WALLACE: Which is a map that has on it the Rocketdyne headquarters, the Santa Susanna Field Laboratory and DeSota Headquarters. It also has in circles several numbers, one through 14.

JUDGE BLOCH: Fourteen.

MR. WALLACE: Those circles depict what are on page 1-4, if you'll turn to the next page. 1-4 sets forth the legend that indicates what those numbers indicate, which is the hospitals, fire stations, in Los Angeles City, one Los Angeles County fire station, one Simi Valley fire station, three Los Angeles sheriff's divisions, which

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are actually L.A. City police stations. One Ventura County police station.

On page 1.5, the next page, it says at the bottom of the first paragraph, "The legend to figure 1.1 also lists those hospitals, Venture County sheriff's offices, and fire stations that are supportive in an emergency situation that may arise at the Santa Susanna site."

It also substantially repeats that statement at the bottom of the page. It fills space by saying it again, to make the document longer and therefore it looks better.

Page 4.7, or 4-7, says that Rockwell has,
"arrangements for emergency medical evacuation with Los
Angeles fire department, (LAFD), paramedic ambulances,"
and then goes on, not pertinent to this.

Page 5-15 repeats that same statement in a slightly different form. These statements about the availability of Los Angeles City fire department resources to respond to emergency nuclear accidents at this site are calse, there are no such agreements on record.

I called today and spoke to the chief of our planning section, no such agreement has ever existed. No such agreement exists now.

The fire stations that are listed on page 1-4 are not even the closest fire stations to the Santa Susanna

site. One of the fire stations which is listed, lists

Paramedic Engine Company, that has not been in existence
as Paramedic Engine Company for approximately five years.

This plan goes on to state that this plan is updated and that records are kept of all the drills yearly. This also is false. There are other -- these are demonstrable falsehoods in the document and they make the remainder of the document suspect.

I ask that I be allowed to present further evidence of my veracity at your hearing tomorrow as a requester, in short, what we want is for Rocketdyne, Rockwell to clean up and clear out. Thank you for your time and the opportunity to appear at the hearing.

JUDGE BLOCH: The standards for being a requester require that you show how your personal interest has been hurt. I don't know if you meet those standards, but whether or not you are personally a requester, a requester, if there is one, cam, as a party, file an affidavit by you, they can do that.

So I don't know whether you personally will meet the standard to be a requester, that's different, you would certainly meet the standard to be able to submit an affidavit of personal knowledge.

MR. WALLACE: I did detail my personal -- I believe I detailed my personal, economic, social, mental,

emotional, and psychological health as certainly a sufficient reason to become a requestor and I would ask that you take that into consideration. Thank you.

JUDGE BLOCH: Sylvia Fliss.

PRESENTATION BY MS. SYLVIA FLISS

MS. FLISS: How do you follow an act like that. Good evening, Judge Bloch, I am a member of the United Nations Association, San Fernando Valley, in coalition with the Rocketdyne clean up coalition.

Tonight's limited appearance session is important. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission has rightly called for a national investigation of the Rockwell International Corporation nuclear activities and resulting contamination as in the case of Rocky Flats, Colorado.

We in the San Fernando Valley are very concerned because Rockwell International sits only three miles from Chatsworth, not withstanding our concern for our neighbors in Simi and Ventura County.

Half a million preside within a 10 mile radius of that area. There is a gray area I feel is germane in piecing together what I see as a jigsaw puzzle. One of its missing parts represents trucking dispatch records of material coming and going. Are there accident records.

Residents in the area can see what we cannot, and they talk about fear of accidents. They uneasily witness

the form in which you're doing it. So, if you wouldn't mind, I would like to have you file a written application.

MS. ZEPPIERI: All right, I'd be happy to.

JUDGE BLOCH: Thank you.

MS. ZEPPIERI: Okay.

JUDGE BLOCH: Thank you very much. You're Donald Wallace?

MR. WALLACE: I am.

JUDGE BLOCK: And your address and distance from the plant?

MR. WALLACE: My address is 1716 North Cold Canyon Road in Calabasas. That's approximately nine point six miles away from the plant.

JUDGE BLOCH: Thank you, it's not a plant.

MR. WALLACE: I work at 6345 Fallbrook Avenue, which is approximately five point two or three or slightly over five miles from the plant. Since I am a fireman, I work there one-third of my life. I own -- additionally, I own twelve acres of property approximately three and a half miles from the plant, from the facility. My health and safety and my economic interest will be directly effected by the outcome of these proceedings.

If you grant the relicensing, my health and safety will be compromised and my health concerns include the radiation effects from potential accidents, the radio

effect -- radiation effects from transportation accidents and radiation effects from transportation through my -- through and by my neighborhood.

Economic concerns include the effects of relicensing on my property values. I bought fourteen acres of land about twenty-two years ago and I planned to live there. When that became impossible due to other economic circumstances, I determined to hold on to the land as a -- as an investment. The value of my land will be diminished by limiting the market for sale should you grant the relicensing. Additionally, California law requires that the existence of this nuclear waste facility or this nuclear facility be disclosed to potential buyers and my economic interest would be adversely affected by the relicensing of this facility through that device, through the disclosure laws in the State of California concerning real estate.

My concerns are, if granted the status of a party to these proceedings, I will present evidence that Rockwell International is not qualified to be licensed by the MRC due to a demonstrated lack of willingness or ability to follow MRC rules concerning the handling and storage of nuclear products set forth in the license. I will present evidence that Rockwell has falsified its on-site radiological contingency plan, particularly in its

fire, EMS and population sections.

engineered provisions for handling abnormal operations are inadequate or outdated or inadequate and outdated. I will present evidence the Rockwell's organisation for the control of radiological accidents are inadequate. I will present evidence that Rockwell's maintenance of radiological contingency prepared and its capability is inadequate and does not actually exist as it is stated in its on-site contingency plan and is inadequate under provisions for -- under the -- under the license agreement.

I will present evidence that its reports and records are inadequate and I've just spoken to a person knowledgeable in Workers' Compensation law in the State of California and I expect to be able to present evidence that Rockwell does not meet the standards for relicensing under the sections dealing with safety of its workers. I would also like to file additional concerns and present additional evidence after I've bad an opportunity to review the documents which have been distributed to requesters and the record.

I think that succinctly puts my concerns and my interests on the record and I would request that you grant me this status. Thank you.

JUDGE BLOCH: Mr. Wallace, I suspect that with respect to one or two of the last things that you wrapped in there, that I need a little bit more about the way that it's germane to the application. So, for example, the OSHA -- whatever the standards are in Worker -- whatever is wrong in the application about that, you might just want to file a supplement about that, so that I have

MR. WALLACE: I will -- I will put these -- to the best of my ability, I will put these in writing and submit them to you just as soon as I can get access to the documents that you have granted to the requesters to this point.

JUDGE BLOCH: Okay, and as I heard what you said, I heard that you incorporated by reference the remarks you made last night when you talked about inaccuracies and inadequacies of the plan.

MR. WALLACE: I do. I would like those concerns or those statements that I made last night incorporated.

JUDGE BLOCK: Thank you.

MR. WALLACE: Thank you.

JUDGE BLOCH: You might want to stay in case there's rebuttal to be done. I don't know what --MR. WALLACE: I'm just freeing up the chair.

JUDGE BLOCK I believe there's one more person,

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something more specific.
