Dear President Cartery

It is ironic that on the first anniversary of the Three Hile Island incident, we, the customers of the Metropolitan Edison Company, living within the twenty-five mile radius, received electric power bills reflecting a fifty percent (50%) increase in cost over and above prior monthly and previous yearly bills even though our consumption of kilowatt hours decreased substantially.

When we questioned Met-Ed Officials concerning this increase, they explained the rise in costs were due to Met-Ed's having to purchase energy from other power utility companies because of the shut down of Three Mile Island Unit I and Unit II. Thus, it appears our citizens are paying other power companies for premium energy and thereby reducing the power companies' cost of energy, but drastically increasing the cost to the victims of Three Mile Island. In this circuitous fashion, the victims are forced to pay for the damages which resulted from T.M.I.

Lebanon Countians have been affected psychologically, physically and financially. We believe that our cost of energy as well as the cost of clean-up, should be shared by those who benefited from the T.M.I. accident experience: namely, power companies throughout the United States. Page 2
