Dear Senator Griffin:

I am calling public attention, with paid advertisements, to the threat to public health and safety from the nuclear reactor being planned for Midland, Hichigan.

Until the First ads can (July 9th and 11th), the immediate affected public in the Midland-Saginaw-Bay City area had not as much as been informed that public evacuation plans are required for nuclear plants. Instead is a related how safe nuclear reactors are and, presumably, we should not therefore concern purselves with such problems.

Exaggerated claims of safety are no more than speculation on paper. Like the evacuation plan that cannot, with reason, be expected to work, the anchor safety device (ECCS) in a nuclear reactor has never been tested. It has, in fact, failed in laboratory tests.

I have called attention in my first month's advertising (newspaper, radio, direct mail) principally to the impossibility of evacuation. I will cover other concerns in future advertising.

It is my belief that decisions with such potential public effect must be public decisions. But unless the public and its representatives are informed about the mazards of nuclear power plants, they cannot be involved in such important decision making.

I am enclosing a news release and newspaper ad that were included in the July campaign. I hope you will take a few minutes to read this material. It is time to put a stop to construction of nuclear plants in populated areas like Midland. There is, in fact, no location in Michigan that is out of disaster range of some populated area. It is time to ban nuclear plants in this state.

NUCLEAR FOE STARTS AD CAMPAIGN

Hidland, Michigan. A long-time critic of nuclear power, Mendell H. Marshall of Mapleton, Michigan has announced plans for an advertising campaign in the Sagloaw Valley. Furpose of the advertising is to inform Seginaw Valley resident of the perils of the nuclear reactor being planned for Midland by Consumers Power Company.

"Too many unanswered questions of safety exist. And the potential disaster of a carious accident is so great, it is irresponsible to want to build a nuclear plant in a town the size of Midland or in an area as populated as the Saginaw Valley," Marshall claims.

Marshall says that the radioactive isotopes produced by a nuclear reactor are the deadliest materials ever produced in mass quantities. He cites plutonium, for example, a by-product of the nuclear fission process, as one of the most toxic substances known to man. Dispersed as fine insoluble particles, one ounce of plutonium represents the potential for 560 million human lung cancer doses. Plutonium has a life span that requires isolation from the environment for 10,000 human generations. One of Marshall's fears is that such high-level radioactive materials will escape into the environment through a serious plant accident or an accident in transporting the materials by truck, rail or plane from the plant through population centers.

Marshall says, "When so great a risk to public health and safety exists, the public must be given a voice in the decision. Decisions of this type cannot be left simply to those who stand to make a buck on nuclear power. But when the public is not informed of the risks of having a nuclear plant in their midst, how can they voice their concerns or be party to any decision? That's the reason for this advertising campaign."

The advertisements will start running next month in newspaper, on radio and by direct mail in the Midland-Saginaw-Bay City area.

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EVACUATE? How Do You Outruna Deadly Radioactive Cloud?

An Open Latter To The Residents Of The Saginaw Valley

DEAR NEIGHBOR:

This letter to you is promoted by our concern for the safety of residents of the Saginaw Valley in case of an accident at the nuclear reactor proposed in Midland.

Consumers Power Company is presently suing the contractors who built their other nuclear plant, Palisades, which has been closed down for over a year now. The lawsuit claims that its contractors furnished defective materials and design for Halisades and asks for 5300 million in damages.

Consumers Power has since been fined \$19,000 for having dumped radioactive wastes from Palitades in violation of federal safety standards and for not reporting the act. No one knows for sure what the effects of that radioactive durping might have been if that plant had been located in a populated area like the Saginaw Valley. Padiation can cause cancer, leukemia and birth defects.

Despice Consumers Power's disastrous experience with Palisades, the Company is going micanead with plans for the Midland duclear plant and has hired the same contractors it claims botched the Palicades job.

Because of our concern for the sofaty of Midland and Cupires Valley residents, the acked the Atomic Energy Commission how it intenis to protect the people in event of an accident at the proposed nuclear plant site in didland. The AEC tells us that Consumers Power has an imargency plan which will include evacuation of the public.

Now maybe the U.S. Atomic Energy Commission thinks that we are a bunch of hicks out here. But nobody can tell me that people in cities the size of Midland, Saginaw and Bay City, in a few seconds or minutes time, can race out of town to escape the path of a radioactive mass. Nobody can tell me that a family with children in school, dad at work, mom home or shopping, can get itself together in a few seconds to escape a deadly invisible cloud. I can just see the accidents and traffic from such desperate mass action blocking the escape routes.

Since the only real protection against a sudden release of radioactivity is to be somewhere else -- and since the people of the Saginaw Valley are denied that protection because the nearness of the proposed nuclear plant would not leave time to get away -- we have asked the Atomic Energy Commission to deny requests for further permits for the Midland Nuclear Plant. It is important that such action be taken by the AEC before more money is spent by Consumers Power on this plant. The AEC has never denied an operating permit after a nuclear plant has been built. Yet the AEC does not even require final emergency plans from Consumers Power until after the plant is constructed.

Consumers Power has clready gambled and lost hundreds of millions of dollars on nuclear power. We pay the cost of those losses in higher electric rates.

The nuclear plant proposed for Midland is a further gamble. But the stakes are higher: not just the hundreds of millions of dollars in plant costs; the gamble includes the lives and health of Saginaw Valley residents.

We have purchased newspaper space for this letter because we believe that citizens have the right to know the hazards of Consumers Power's proposal to build a nuclear reactor in their midst.
