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Trojan pat-down searches proposed

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission is seeking citizen comments on a plan to require thorough searches of all individuals entering sensitive areas at Trojan and other nuclear power plants throughout the nation.

The proposed search requirements are part of the commission's measures to protect nuclear power plants from sabotage, the NRC said in a press statement this week.

Under the proposed regulations, Portland Genera 8101290 168 Electric Co. - operator of the Trojan plant near Rainier - would be required to use equipment for detecting firearms and explo- power plants, the NRC ing the regulations perma- ton, D.C. 20555. sives on all individuals, including PGE employees, entering sensitive areas at the plant.

In addition, nuclear plant owners would be required to conduct a physical pat-down search of all visitors to those areas.

Any Trojan employee suspected of trying to carry firearms, explosives or fire-starting devices into the areas also would be subjected to a pat-down search.
