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

Dear Mr. Hartman:



The Ogle request with supporting data was dated October 8, 1980, and received by us on October 14, 1980. Our authorization was issued on November 12, 1980, within one month of receipt of your request. Considering that this non-routine request could only be granted following documentation of an intense technical, policy, and legal evaluation, I consider the one month turnaround timely.

In addition to the timeliness aspect, I find Ogle's comment regarding the license condition disconcerting. A significant portion of my staff's time during the one-month review process was spent discussing the specific conditions with Mr. Catchpole and agreement was reached concerning the condition prior to our issuing the November 12, 1980 authorization. We do this as a matter of course for major licensing actions in an effort to preclude subsequent incongruities as seem to have occurred in this case.

If indeed, the license condition identified as (c) in our authorization is excessively burdensome, by staff is available to explore alternate measures with your staff that would lead to a mutually satisfactory operating procedure that would provide adequate protection of public health and safety and the environment.
