PROCEEDINGS

2 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Now, there were a couple of 3 matters that I think it would be useful for us to look at 4 and see if by any chance we can sort them out. Maybe we can 5 and maybe we can't.

6 In order to go forward with that discussion 1 will 7 ask you to join me in voting to hold a meeting on less than 8 one-week's notice, a meeting which is titled a General 9 Administrative Meeting and at which I would hope to consider 10 in sequence the notes back and forth on a model hearing 11 schedule, that matter of incident response procedures and 12 finally I have got a letter I am trying to get out on the 13 Byron schedule.

So if you will join me in voting for this meeting son short notice we can get on with it.

Those in favor?

17 (Chorus of Ayes.)

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18 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: So ordered.

19 Peter, did you ever have a chance to scan through 20 that memo? I haven't seen anything back.

21 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: This is the one on the 22 hearing schedules?

23 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Yes.

24 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: I would prefer to strike 25 the first and last paragraphs and just send the middle three.

1 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: This was a draft I guess Peter 2 and I drafted on it. Why don't we said a couple across the 3 table. I am sorry the people in the audience won't have 4 it. You can simply regard yoursel is as reviewing what 5 would in more normal circumstances be a set of internal 6 discussions between Commissioners taken two at a time rather 7 than altogether at the table.

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8 It needs some sort of an introduction. We need at 9 least a first sentence in the first paragraph to sort of get 10 started on it.

11 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Okay.

12 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: I would be inclined to take the 13 second as well and then strike the last one.

14 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: That is all right. Yes, 15 that is fine.

16 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Okay. So in this thing we 17 would strike the last sentence of the first paragraph, the 18 next three and then strike the last one.

19 How does that strike you?

20 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: You have the next three 21 paragraphs in, right?

22 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Yes.

23 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: And then strike the last 24 one.

25 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Yes.

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COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: That is right.

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2 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Okay. If that is agreeable to 3 you why don't we vote Aye on that draft and I will give it 4 to the Secretary since its a Chilkogram.

5 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Good.

6 (Chorus of Ayes.)

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7 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: All right, Sam, we give you 8 that and I am not pleased to be able to junk that set of 9 papers. We are making splendid progress here.

10 The next item has to do with the incident response 11 plan and goes back to a memorandum John sent us back in 12 April recommending some language to go in the response plan 13 making clear the licensee's responsibility and putting in 14 somewhat clearer terms what we would do and would not do.

Now, I marked up his draft. I tended to mark up to the backend of it. Peter then had some markups and he to mark up the frontend of it.

18 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Yes. I think our only 19 point of difference was over the business about even if the 20 act violates the NRC tech specs.

21 What I thought might suffice for me would just be 22 to strike that language entirely. That is leave out my 23 various statements about not being able to guarantee 24 anything but also take out the phrase "even if that action 25 violates the NRC license technical specifications" from your

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1 and John's previous circulation.

It just doesn't seem to me to be right, for 3 example, if you had a situation in which the licensee 4 released a substantial quantity of radioactive material. 5

5 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: If he had to violate the 6 license condition because he felt it was necessary for 7 safety in the accident circumstance.

8 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Right. The fact is that 9 one certainly would take that into consideration in deciding 10 what subsequent enforcement action is necessary, but there 11 may be situations in which even the mitigative action were 12 so severe from a public health point of view that it would 13 lead to a later enforcement action.

I can't think of all the possible contexts now so 15 I would be happier taking out the language that appeared to 16 exonerate it in all situations.

17 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Okay. Let's see, that would 18 leave the response plan, that paragraph 211. Let's scan 19 through it and see how it would then read.

20 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Just as you had it in your 21 version of June 8th only without the words beginning with 22 "even if" and ending with "technical specifications."

23 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Okay. You also wanted to 24 strike "or adverse publicity" up there.

25 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Oh, yes. That is right.

1 I am sorry. I thought that had gotten done. But you are 2 right, it hadn't.

3 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Yes. That would also then 4 remove the insert.

5 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Yes.

6 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: I guess I hesitate to go 7 forward with it, Peter, because John was anxious to make the 8 point that if you have to breach the license conditions in 9 some way in the interest of safety, you know, do it. I 10 guess I am inclined to think, since he isn't here to defend 11 it and carry it on, that maybe we ought not to make a 12 decision now and discussion ought to resume when he comes 13 back and can deal with it himself.

14 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: That is okay if it is okay 15 with you.

16 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: You didn't have great objection 17 to the comments I made on his draft or on the draft 18 Chilkogram and I would hope you would continue to take those 19 into account when you do settle down sort the points out. I 20 think this was for him a fairly significant part of the 21 approved guidance he was trying to provide and he ought to 22 be here to settle it out with you.

23 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: Okay. Now, let's see. 24 There was a letter that has been kicking around for some 25 time. This was in response to a March 27th incoming letter

1 commenting on our nominal schedule on the Byron Station and 2 I had some problems with it as finally rodrafted.

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3 Peter, I think you had no objection to my redraft.
4 COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: No, that is right.

5 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: John sent along a note that he 6 is not fond of the changes and would like a sentence to go 7 in at the appropriate point saying that he thinks the 8 current schedule is too optimistic and so on which I would 9 propose simply to put in at the correct place and then get 10 the blasted letter out so that Dean Palladino doesn't find 11 him answering letters from March, although I certainly 12 wouldn't guarantee this is the only one that lies that far 13 back.

14 If that is okay with you, why let's us do that.
15 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: That is okay. Why don't
16 we just leave it to you to work it out.

17 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Well, I will stick it in some 18 place.

19 MS. HARDING: John is pretty flexible.

20 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: Good.

Now, that takes me through the three items that I 22 wanted to bring up. Was there anything else that occurred 23 to anybody else that this kind of a discussion would help?

24 (No response.)

25 CHAIRMAN HENDRIE: All right. In that case I find

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1 we have concluded 15 minutes ahead of time. I am pleased to 2 note the public sessions this afternoon.

3 The Commission will move on after a one-minute 4 recess to continue its discussion on an operating license 5 for McGuire. So I will pause here and ask those who should 6 not be present at a closed meeting of the Commission to 7 kindly absent themselves. 8 (Whereupon, at 2:30 p.m., the general
