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## PROCEEDINGS

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: The meeting will please come to order.

I want to take this opportunity to express my pleasure at joining the Commission and I look forward to working with my fellow Commissioners and with the members of the Staff on the matters that come before the Commission.

Since this is my first meeting, I hope you will bear with me if I'm not familiar with all of the procedural aspects of the meeting. I am sure I will learn as I go along, and I will try to work any procedural questions out as they arise.

Today's meeting is an Affirmation meeting. I wonder if the Secretary, Mr. Sam Chilk, would walk us through the items on the agenda.

MR. CHILK: The first paper is SECY-81-317 and subsequent versions A, B, and C, Proposed Rulemaking to Eleminate the Need for Power and Alternative Energy Sources Isues in the Operating Licensing Proceedings.

The Commission is being asked to approve a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking which will amend 10 CFR Part 51 to eleminate the need for power and alternative energy sources at operating license proceedings in the absence of special circumstances. The current version of the rulemaking that we are addressing is contained in an ELD memo dated June 25th. It has been modified by revised pages 5 and 6, which was circulated in SECY-81-317C, and there was a later revision to a footnote 5, as -

of this morning.

The status of the paper is that Commissioner Bradford has approved it and has recommended modifications. The Chairman has approved it and concurs with the modifications that have been suggested by Commissioner Bradford, including the footnote which was ---

COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: And as slightly further modified.

MR. CHILK: --And as modified by your modification.

Commissioner Gilinsky, I understand, is prepared to vote on the paper.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, I used to agree with everything that Joe Hendrie and Peter agreed on, so I think I will follow that precedent.

MR. CHILK: Commissioner Ahearne is not available to participate, but has no objection to this affirmation proceeding. If I have stated your views correctly, would you please affirm your votes?

(Chorus of ayes.)

MR. CHILK: Thank you.

The second paper is SECY-81-392, which is an FOIA

Appeal in which the Commission is being asked to deny some 15

Commission-level documents.

All of the Commissioners have voted to approve the paper and have agreed with a minor modification suggested by

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Mr. Bradford. Commissioner Ahearne, again, is not available to participate, but has no objection to this affirmation. Would you please affirm your votes?

(Chorus of ayes.)

MR. CHILK: The other three have been stricken for various reasons.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I understand that on one of the items there has been a request for future discussion, and this will be taken up in the Agenda Session.

MR. CHILK: Yes, sir. I have nothing further.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: All right.

Are there any other items?

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: No.

COMMISSIONER BRADFORD: No.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: You ran a splendid meeting.

(Laughter)

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I'm glad you started me off relatively easy.

I would urge that we do keep focused on two of the items that were formally on the Affirmation agenda so that we can act on them in a timely fashion, that is SECY document 168, it may have modification A, B, or C, I'm not sure which, and the other one on SECY 376, because those certainly appear to be items that we don't want to get too far behind on.

If there are no other matters to come before the meeting, we will stand adjourned.

(The meeting was adjourned at 11:05 a.m.)
