Plan - Indian Pt.

Dear Senator D'Amato:

Regarding my telephone conversation with you
Mr. Howard Jim on August 23rd regarding the
testing of a State and County emergency plan to take
care of a disaster at the Indian Point nuclear complex:

I personally have not read anything about what plan
there is in case there is a very heavy snowfall, or a
blizzard, with freezing temperatures, doing away
with quick use of buses and automobiles, because of
vehicular road conditions, grounded airplanes and heli-
copters, and possibly railroad operation curtailments.
Far fetched, but even the Hudson River could not be used.
My point is, I hope these tests are not just fair-
weather tests, with the sun shining. I am concerned about
what plans, if any, they are also devising in event
there is a disaster under very severe weather conditions
mentioned above.
