Jear isnator Simon.

Obmission may be taking a decision as to whether the Merraciae Company will be allowed to bury on site the radicactive materials from the operation of the plant on the dest Chicago property. As a West Chicago resident, I am property owner.

As to the health concern, there was some information given re by an alderman a few years ago that the materials are of a low radioactive nature and this radioactivity is such that occurred when there was talk of encapsulating the material above ground. Now we seem to be thinking in terms of below that an encapsulation. Bither way it seems like a very thing, if seepage should occur and contamination of ground water might result.

Secondly, I am concerned about the value of my property. Having radioactive material permanently entombed within the heart of a town is a stigma on that town's name. I certainly would not buy property here if I were given the choice now.

Please look into this matter as soon as possible. If ever a town needed nelp, ours does.
