Dear Mr. Coelho:

As further indication of what I consider undue government regulation, enclosed is a copy of a letter received from the State of California regarding our problem of selling watches with tritium paint on the dial. The Nuclear Regulatory Commission apparently contacted the California Department of Industrial Relations and informed them they felt we needed a state license also.

I personally talked with Mr. Franaszek on the phone and told him all we were doing was importing watches from Switzerland that had minute amounts of tritium on the dials. He indicated to me he didn't see why we should be required to have a license. I then received the enclosed letter which apparently indicates we have to throw away our inventory of watches or suffer the expense of the license. Other jewelry stores selling watches are not required to have this license and I simply do not understand why we should be required to do so.

I know you have been working on this matter for us. Anything further you can do to help "get these people off our back" will be greatly appreciated.

Gentlemen

This refers to our discussion on October 1, 1981 conce ming possession of radioactive material in California. We understand that you are in the process of transferring all the radioactive material you possess and terminating your NRC License No. 04-12377-01 E.

Your previous activity of storing watches containing Tritium for purposes of commercial distribution required prior authorization from the State of California. Possession for commercial sales without a state license is contrary to Section 30172 of the California Radiation Control Regulations (Title 17, CAC).

If our understanding is correct that all tritium containing watches now in your possession are to be transferred for waste disposal purposes only, it will not be necessary for you to make application for a California license at this time.

Your corrective actions will be verified at our next inspection. Should you have any questions in this matter we will be glad to discuss them with you.


