I was shocked to learn that the NRC has proposed licensing exemptions for radioactive scrap metal smelting. As specialists you are certainly aware that any amount of radiation is dangerous, and I think it is the height of irresponsibility to propose that radioactive materials be used in such items as cars, furniture, utensils, and coins. The negligent attitude of the NRC is well typified in its own news release of October 29, 1980, which states: By smelting this scrap it is hoped to reduce the contamination . . . (emphy is added).

Public health and safety must not be allowed to hinge on hopes; it is the responsibility of the NEC to see that it rests on some firmer foundation. I urge you to retain the requirement of the use of uranium-contaminated metals in smelted alloys.
