

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Dear Mr. Palladino:



I would like to let you know my views about some issues relating to nuclear fission reactors.

First let me indicate that I loudly applaud your revoking Diablo Canyon's license!! That move was the only correct one, in my opinion.

Secondly, I am concerned about some bills that are currently in the Senate and in the House of Representatives.

Senate Bill 1662 calls for the establishment of temporary, away-from-the-reactor storage facilities at Hartwell, South Carolina, West Valley, N.Y., and Morris, Illinois. I am against this bill because it ignores both the rights of the states and the

public to participate in the selection of nuclear waste disposal sites.

In addition to this denial of rights, I fear that the nuclear power industry is attempting to pull the wool over the public's eyes, and, I fear, over the NRC. You see, the proposals are being called "temporary demonstration projects", so they do not need to be licensed by the NRC.

But suppose the nuclear industry later quietly converted these sites into large-scale permanent waste-disposal areas? What do you think of this bill, and of toxic waste disposal in general?

Two bills in the House of Representatives, HR 2840 and HR 1901, I am told, would undermine

the program to identify the safest possible permanent disposal sites.

These bills, and others which we will see in the future, are crucial. There must not be any "short-cuts" in the process of finding truly safe disposal sites for nuclear waste. For if the nuclear industry can not find a safe way to dispose of its toxic and highly lethal wastes, what right has it to build another reactor?
