It is our understanding that your office has an open investigation into the conduct of Nuclear Energy Services (NES).



We are pleased and proud to congratulate you on your inauguration as President of the United States. We want you to know that you and Al Gore will have our firm support for the fulfillment of the programs on energy and the environment that you outlined during the Presidential campaign.

We will do all that we can to help. We urge you to:

- stimulate the economy by adopting a "green investment" package that includes strong support for energy efficiency, renewable energy, and transportation alternatives;
- adopt plans to improve the energy efficiency of the economy by 30 percent by 2010;
- reduce energy use in transportation through a steady increase in automobile fuel efficiency, support for domestic manufacturers through incentives to retool their plants and equipment, and "feebates" to create a market for better cars;
- reduce carbon dioxide emissions by 25 percent by the year 2005;
- continue the dialog on environment and development begun at the Earth Summit and adopt laws and policies to fulfill the agreements made there.
