My family and friends and I
are extremely concerned over the operation
of the McGuire Nuclear Plant near
Charlotte:

I understand that if an accident
were to occur at McGuire like the one
at 3 mile Island that the containment
building here is not sufficient to
hold the pressure. I don't see how
you could therefore license this plant
for operation.

I also don't understand why
a mock evacuation was not held
in Charlotte. Surely you must admit
that the wind does not always blow
in only one direction but could very
easily blow towards Charlotte from McGuire.
In that case why did you approve
the evacuation? A very small percentage
of the population even actually responded.

It seems to us that Charlotte, with some 320,000 citizens would be much more difficult to evacuate and would involve much more preparation than the small area that was chosen for evacuation. How unprepared therefore, would Charlotte be were an accident to occur. I shudder to think!
