Meeting Summary:

Meeting on June 29, 1982 (Combined Report Nos. 50-272/82-16 and 50-311/82-16
Scope: Special, announced management meeting to discuss licensee activities to maintain security following return to work of striking employees. Status of long term plans to deal with acts of tampering in a general sense were also discussed.

Results: The licensee presented current status of plant operations and current direction with respect to long-term initiatives.

3. Discussion

All bargaining unit employees at Salem Nuclear Generating Station were on strike during the period May 1 - June 11, 1982. Due to an apparently deliberate attempt to trip Unit 2 on April 28, 1982, the licensee undertook a series of actions to preserve and improve plant security prior to, during, and after the strike.

By letter to NRC Region 1 dated May 20, 1982 the licensee outlined a post-strike security plan which included a series of short-term actions and a list of long term initiatives designed to prevent and deal with deliberate acts of tampering with plant equipment.

The licensee stated that all short term actions described in the letter have been completed and that operations have returned to a pre-strike condition. With respect to long term actions, the following information was provided; generic procedures to deal with acts of tampering or vandalism are near completion and should be virtually finalized within one month, specific actions in the area of surveillance equipment and the screening program have not yet been finalized, supervisory training and employee attitude modification are being addressed through the use of an industrial psychologist, and, investigative capabilities within the company have been identified.

The NRC staff provided information relative to the availability of additional resources in developing and evaluating plans for dealing with these types of events. Region I will continue to monitor progress in those areas still under development.
