2	MR. CHAPMAN: For the record, this is an interview
3	of Richard L. Parker.
4	MR. PARKER: A.
5	MR. CHAPMAN: Richard A. Parker who is employed by
6	Sequoyah Fuels Corporation, Gore, Oklahoma. The location of
7	this interview is the Sequoyah Fuels Facility, Gore,
8	Oklahoma. The date is February 26, 1991 and the time is 1:3
9	p.m.
0	Present at this interview, in addition to Mr.
1	Parker, is Ira Shapiro who is an attorney from the law firm
2	of Winthrop, Stimson, Putnam and Roberts, Washington, D.C.
3	and is representing Sequoyah Fuels Corporation.
4	Also present at this meeting representing the U.S.
5	Nuclear Regulatory Commission, Office of Investigations is
6	Larry Chapman.
7	Mr. Parker, if you would please stand and raise
8	your right hand.
9	Whereupon,
0	RICHARD A. PARKER
1	appeared as a witness herein, and having been first duly
2	sworn, was examined and testified as follows:
3	EXAMINATION
4	BY MR. CHAPMAN:
5	Q Mr. Parker, first of all, I would like to get a

- 1 little bit of background information as to when you came to
- 2 work at either Sequoyah Fuels or when it was called Kerr
- 3 McGee.
- 4 A I was -- I came down here originally on the
- 5 accident investigation team in January of 1986. I spent
- 6 approximately seven or eight -- seven plus weeks here on the
- 7 accident investigation team. I returned to my original
- 8 position in Wyoming with Kerr McGee and in May of 19.6, I
- 9 came down here on temporary assignment with Kerr McGee to
- 10 work in the Maintenance Department. In June of 1986, I was
- 11 transferred here on a permanent basis with Kerr McGee.
- 12 Q In what position?
- 13 A Manager of Maintenance.
- 14 Q Manager of Maintenance?
- 15 A (Nodding head affirmatively.)
- 16 Q Are you still currently holding that position with
- 17 Sequoyah Fuels now?
- 18 A I am the Operations Manager and I also have --
- 19 oversee the maintenance function with consultants.
- 20 Q When did you assume the position of Operations
- 21 Manager?
- 22 A January 18, 1991.
- 23 Q January 18, 1991?
- 24 A Yes.
- 25 Q Back when our discussion was held on September 7,

- 1 1990, then your position would have been Manager of
- 2 Maintenance --
- A Yes, sir.
- 4 Q -- with Sequoyah Fuels Corporation here in Gore?
- 5 A Yes, sir.
- 6 Q Mr. Parker, during our conversation of September 7
- 7 1990, we centered our discussion on a management meeting that
- 8 had taken place here on August the 7th, a Tuesday morning
- 9 staff meeting. Do you recall our discussions about that?
- 10 A I don't remember what date the staff meeting was,
- 11 but I remember we did talk about a staff meeting.
- 12 Q Okay. Well for the record, we discussed
- 13 specifically an August 7th staff meeting.
- 14 A Okay.
- 15 Q In that meeting, you indicated to me that an issue
- 16 was brought up by Ronald Atkinson of contaminated water being
- in the excavation pit adjacent to the solvent extraction
- 18 building, commonly referred to as the SX excavation.
- 19 A I don't remember who brought the subject up at this
- 20 time.
- 21 Q Do you recall it being discussed during that
- 22 meeting?
- 23 A If that's what we discussed. I remember discussing
- 24 it with you as of August the 7th.
- Q Keep in mind that we're not trying --

- 1 A Yeah. I'm just --
- 2 Q I'm just going over these facts as they were 3 relayed to me back then.
- 4 A Okay.

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- Well, let me go on then. I'll say that also as you've stated you recalled the issue of the water being 6 contaminated was brought out -- brought up without any 7 8 specific results being discussed. Only that you do recall 9 there was discussion that the water was contaminated in the 10 SX area -- in the pit itself. You also indicated that it was 11 brought up possibly -- the initial issue was brought up 12 possibly by Carolyn Couch or Sam Fryer somewhere toward the end of that meeting. Do you still agree with those facts 13 14 or...
 - A If that's what I said. I don't really recall what exactly -- who brought it up. I remember the discussion. I remember Carol and Ron in some discussion of contaminated liquids -- at least, it appeared to be contaminated water in that excavation. Who brought it up and who talked about it, I don't really recall.
 - Q Okay. But for the record, you do recall that in this meeting there was a discussion of contaminated water in that area?
- 24 A It was either the 7th or 14th staff meeting. I 25 can't -- if it was the 7th we talked about, then it was the

- 1 7th.
- 2 Q All right, sir. Also, you indicated that Michael
- 3 Nichols was also present at that meeting --
- 4 A Yes, sir.
- 5 Q -- and was privy to the discussion that was being
- 6 held at this meeting, correct?
- 7 A Right.
- 8 Q Also, you indicated to me that both Nichols and
- 9 Couch were expressing some concern during this meeting about
- 10 the water being contaminated in the pit. They did not give
- 11 you specifics, but there was just a general discussion, yes,
- 12 the water is contaminated and we are concerned about it.
- 13 A As I recall.
- 14 Q Is there any other personnel that you can recall at
- 15 that meeting, or do you have any additional information
- 16 regarding that meeting?
- 17 A No. I really can't recall who was there. One of
- 18 the problems I have in recalling who may have been there is
- 19 that I've read reports about what occurred since then. It
- 20 makes it a little bit blurry about what I -- what dates. You
- 21 know, you say August 7th. I -- I know it occurred on either
- 22 August 7th or the 14th, but I can't remember what exact
- 23 meeting it was.
- Q Well, I do know that we never discussed the 14th
- 25 meeting.

- 1 A Well, then, that's --
- MR. SHAPIRO: Larry, I think you said it before,
- 3 but for the record, your earlier conversation with Mr. Parker
- 4 was what date?
- 5 MR. CHAPMAN: September 7, 1990.
- 6 BY MR. CHAPMAN:
- 7 Q If you can focus in on this meeting and try to put
- 8 your thinking cap on a little bit; one of the things that was
- 9 discussed with you was, after the meeting was held, Donald
- 10 Knoke -- who was in charge of the Process Laboratory here at
- 11 Sequoyah Fuels -- went to his laboratory and looked up some
- 12 results. Mr. Knoke has indicated to me that he returned to
- 13 the room where the meeting was held and that you were still
- 14 present --
- 15 A Yes.
- 16 Q -- along with some others who -- there seems to be
- 17 some discussion who they were. But, at least, you were
- 18 present. And he made a comment, "That amount of
- 19 contamination that we were discussing during the meeting is
- 20 about three grams per liter." Do you recall him returning
- 21 and making such a statement?
- A I remember him returning to the meeting. I don't
- 23 remember what the grams per liter was.
- Q Do you recall him making a pronouncement of grams
- 25 per liter?

- A Yes.
- 2 Q Some number --
- 3 A Right.
- 4 Q -- but the exact number is unknown?
- 5 A Right.
- 6 Q Also, during our September 7th discussion, you
- 7 indicated that when Knoke returned, you believed that
- 8 Atkinson and Lee Lacy were still present upon Knoke's return?
- 9 A I think Lee was just leaving but I Ron and I were -
- 10 it must have been Ron and I, if that's what I said. There
- ll may have been somebody else but I don't remember. It was
- 12 just right at the end of the meeting. I remember because Don
- 13 left the meeting to try and find the results that people had
- 14 mentioned something about. He came back and most people had
- 15 left already.
- 16 Q Do you recall when Mr. Knoke left? Did he make any
- 17 pronouncement that he was going to get these laboratory
- 18 results, or did he give any general comments about I'm going
- 19 to see if I can determine what these are?
- A Yeah, I'm pretty sure that's what he said.
- 21 Something like that because he left kind of fast. He said,
- "Well, I'm going to see", you know, "what kind of results
- 23 there were." Something to that effect. I remember him
- 24 leaving then.
- Q Without getting into any time frames, was it fairly

- 1 shortly that he returned? Like the meeting was over, and
- 2 say, within a few minutes, did Mr. Knoke return because ther
- 3 were still folks lingering around, I guess?
- A Yeah, there were a few lingering around. It would
- 5 have been a fairly short period. It could have been within
- 6 five minutes.
- 7 Q Do you recall after the official meeting was so
- 8 called terminated or closed, was there some discussion among
- 9 the folks still there of this contamination, or was there a
- 10 different subject being discussed?
- 11 A I don't recall.
- 12 Q Okay. After our meeting on the 7th -- immediately
- 13 after our meeting on the 7th, did you hold any discussions
- 14 with anyone else that might have clarified any of your
- 15 memory? When I say immediately, I'm not talking -- within
- that week frame because I realize since then there's been a
- 17 tremendous amount of discussion about this subject. Or did
- 18 you receive any information that would solidify your
- 19 participation in that meeting?
- A I remember I asked Don if it was at that August 7th
- 21 meeting and he hought it was the 14th -- I thought he said.
- He wasn't sure what -- I thought it was at the August 7th
- meeting that it was brought up. There was some discussion
- 24 about what time frames we were looking at.
 - Q So basically, you're -- what you're telling me is

- there has been nothing new?
- A Nothing that I know of.
- O Okay. Just the general information --
- A I haven't been too involved, other than reading the reports that come out from it.
- Q All right, sir.
- A I do remember that Don was concerned about that
 number. He thought it was totremely high. Some number had
 come out and that's why he went back to the lab.
- 10 Q Did you -- do you recall if a number was given --
- 11 A No.

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- 12 Q No. Do you recall if a number was given, did it
 13 raise any concern with you? Did that number trigger in your
 14 mind that there was some high readings out there?
 - A No. Not -- I guess, I was concerned from the standpoint of other people showed some concern about it. It said that the numbers in that range would have been too high to expect.
- Q But you had no personal immediate concern is what I

 -- enough that it drove you somewhere else to talk to someone

 else and bring up an issue of it?
- A No. Actually Don was schooling me on the number,
 as far as I can recall. I mean, I can't --
- Q I understand.
- 25 A There's been a lot of discussions about this.

- 1 Q I understand that and that's why I'm trying as much
- 2 as I can to limit it to this time frame --
- A Yes.
- 4 Q -- and trying to leave all of these other
- 5 discussions because there has been a lot --
- 6 A You know, I --

at that time.

that time.

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- 7 Q I realize it all --
- A I know numbers pretty well right now, and in what time frame I learned those numbers --
- 10 Q That's why I'm not trying to pin you down on

 11 specific numbers but just to find out if your feeling was,

 12 yes, there should be concern or just try to get your mindset
- A I guess, I would say I was concerned because a 14 15 number was brought up that -- and I don't know if it was a specific number, but someone said there may be a contamination problem there and I was as concerned as anybody 17 else would have been around the table saying we have a 18 problem and we need to look at it. I mean, that's the only 19 standpoint. I didn't know what the numbers were. I wouldn't be in the reporting system for the numbers regarding that. I 21 really would not have known too much about numbers at all at 22
- Q All right. I'm sorry, I didn't mean to cut you off.

- A No, that's...
- 2 Q Just for clarification purposes so that I don't get
- 3 too far away from it; does this meeting usually take place in
- 4 the morning?
- A Tuesday mornings at 8:30?
- Q 8:30?
- 7 A (Nodding head affirmatively.)
- Q Their duration is an hour or so usually?
- A Anywhere from a half hour -- 20 minutes to an hour.
- 10 It depends on what the subjects are.
- 11 Q So we would be fairly safe to say -- well, I

 12 started to say we would be safe to say that Don came back

 13 within an hour but that wouldn't be true because the meeting

 14 would have broken up and he would have been --
- A Well, he was back within an hour from the meeting -
- QQ Oh, yeah, I'm sure of that.
- 18 A -- after the meeting broke up.
- Q Do you have any -- in the Maintenance Department,
- 20 did you have any knowledge prior to the excavation being
- started of possible soil contamination out there in the area
- immediately adjacent to the SX building to the north?
- 23 A No, sir.
- Q Were you aware of any past spills or overflows of the so called dump tank which flowed out onto the ground?

- 1 A No.
- 2 Q Would you department have been called to do any
- maintenance repairs of broken flanges or anything of
- 4 importance that you recall about those tanks before they were
- 5 unearthed?
- A (No response.)
- 7 Q Did I get you lost with my question?
- A Yeah.
- 9 Q What I was trying to determine is, prior to the
- 10 actual digging of these tanks up, I understand that in some
- 11 years previous, they had overflowed on occasions. There had
- 12 been broken valves on these tanks or flanges or something.
- 13 I'm not sure of the terminology. And I was just wondering if
- you had any major maintenance out there on these two tanks?
- 15 A Not that I had known of.
- Q Okay. Were you privy to any soil samples or any
- information regarding soil samples taken on that ground?
- 18 A No.
- 19 Q You, yourself, would not have taken soil samples --
- 20 A No, sir.
- 21 Q -- in the course of your normal duties?
- 22 A No.
- 23 Q Okay. In your capacity in the Maintenance
- Department, did you supply any personnel to assist in pumping
- 25 water from this excavation once it was discovered?

- A Not to my knowledge.
- Q Were you requested to furnish any equipment, be it
- 3 barrels, be it pumps, be it any type of technical support?
- 4 A I was not requested. That doesn't mean that we
- 5 wouldn't have had mechanics on-shift that would have worked
- 6 for the supervisor on-shift. No one come to me and said I
- needed to provide equipment and whatever so I can pump out
- 8 this.
- 9 Q All right. My next question is, do you have any
- 10 knowledge of any maintenance personnel being requested to be
- 11 out there?
- 12 A No. We did some original preparation work on some
- 13 piping racks up above.
- 14 Q But you had no direct involvement in the actual
- 15 excavation --
- 6 A No.
- 17 Q -- or fault --
- A No, that was strictly a contractor's job.
- 19 Q Okay.
- 20 A That's not to say that there may not be people in
- 21 my department that were saying can you bring something to me
- or whatever. But that wouldn't have been a request to me.
- Q Right. But limiting it to you, you had no official
- 24 request by Sequoyah Fuels to take action?
- 25 A No, sir.

1	MR. CHAPMAN: Okay, basically, I don't have any
2	additional information that I need to seek from you. I just
3	want to give /ou an opportunity if you have anything you
4	wish to add or any comments you want to make, feel free to
5	make them.
6	THE WITNESS: The only comment I can is, I feel
7	somewhat confused because of everything I've read since our
8	meeting. In trying to reconstruct what went on in my own
9	mind, it's certainly hard to say what I've read and what I
10	recall.
11	MR. CHAPMAN: Okay.
12	THE WITNESS: But if you have something that I've
13	said, I wouldn't have reason to change that.
14	MR. CHAPMAN: Well, I can assure you that this
15	information was brought down to paper immediately
16	THE WITNESS: Yeah.
17	MR. CHAPMAN: or as soon as possible after.
18	Mr. Parker, have I or any other NRC representative
19	threatened you in any manner or offered you any reward in
20	return for this statement?
21	THE WITNESS: No, sir.

24 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir.
