Kostmayer against new nuclear policy

Rep. Peter Kostmayer, D-Bucks County, and other House Interior Committee members are preparing legislation to combat a new federal policy relaxing controls on low-level radioactive wastes.

Kostmayer said the Nuclear Regulatory Commission policy holds particular significance for Pennsylvania, which recently approved a law preventing nuclear wastes from being dumped in municipal landfills.

Without congressional action, Kostmayer said, he feared the law might be superseded by the recently announced policy.

Under the new policy, low-level wastes, such as gloves, clothing, lab equipment and even buildings at nuclear power plants, would be treated like normal garbage if radiation doses were low enough.
