SUBJECT: WITHHOLDING PROPRIETARY INFORMATION FROM PUBLIC DISCLOSURE - MCGUIRE NUCLEAR STATION, UNITS 1 AND 2

By letter dated February 14, 1994, Duke Power Company submitted B&W Nuclear Technologies (BWMT) document #51-1229187-00 titled, "McGuire Unit 1 and 2 Kinetic Sleeve Evaluation" (proprietary), and requested that this document be withheld from public disc osure in accordance with 10 CFR Section 2.790 of the Commissions regulations. A copy of BWNT's non-proprietary version was also submitted (#51-1229188-00" for placement in the NRC's Public Document Room.

In an affidavit dated January 25, 1994, you provided information supporting the basis on which the information held proprietary to BWNT be withheld from public disclosure pursuant 10 CFR Section 2.790(b)(4) in accordance with the following criteria.

- a. This information consists of test data or other similar data concerning a process, method or component, the application of which results in a competitive advantage to BWNT.
- b. The information reveals special aspects of a process, method, component or the like, the exclusive use of which results in a competitive advantage to BWNT.

The NRC staff has reviewed BWNT's information based on the requirements and criteria of 10 CFR 2.790 and, on the basis of BWNT's statement, has determined that the submitted material sought to be withheld contains proprietary commercial information. Therefore, the proprietary information will be withheld from public disclosure pursuant to 10 CFR 2.790(b)(5) and Section 103(b) of the Atomic Energy Act, as amended.

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Withholding from public disclosure shall not affect the right, if any, of persons properly and directly concerned to inspect the documents. If the need arises, we may send copies of this information to our consultants working in this area. We will, of course, ensure that the consultants have signed the appropriate agreements for handling proprietary information.

If the basis for withholding this information from public disclosure should change in the future such that the information could then be made available for public inspection, you should promptly notify the NRC. You should also understand that the NRC may have cause to review this determination in the future, for example, if the scope of a Freedom of Information Act request includes your information. In all review situations, if the NRC makes a determination adverse to the above, you will be notified in advance of any public disclosure.
