

3	MS. JONES: My name is Cynthia Jones, again. It
4	is now 3:07 on December 8th. I am the Section Leader in the
5	Programmatic Safety Section in our Division of Industrial
6	Nuclear Medical Safety in our Washington office, of the
7	Nuclear Regulatory Commission, which is actually located in
8	Rockville, Maryland.
9	We have a couple of people with us. What I would
10	like you to do is just to state your name will start with
11	Ron and your title here, and I will go on and explain
12	what the IIT is all about.
13	MR. LLOYD: Yes. My name is Ron Lloyd, also with
14	the Incident Investigation Team, out of the Rockville
15	office.
16	THE INTERVIEWEE: I am Ron Ressler, maintenance
17	supervisor here at Scenery Hill Manor.
18	MS. JONES: Could you spell your last name, too?
19	THE INTERVIEWEE: RESSLER.
20	MS. JONES: Thanks. What I mentioned before is
21	that I work for the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and they
22	have established what we call an Incident Investigation
23	Team. It is the highest level of team that is formed when
24 .	there is an incident of a very serious nature, which this
25	is.

One of the purposes of the incident investigation team is to establish what happened, identify any probable causes or mistakes that people made along the way and to provide any appropriate feedback, as necessary, to in this case the licensee or the manufacturer of the device.

As I mentioned before, the reason for conducting the interview is to obtain information and facts regarding the incident we are looking into and to contact people, such as yourself, who were directly involved with the material as it made its way through the different paths.

One purpose of transcribing the interview is to aid us later in developing a factual record and be able to look at that factual record when we need to and minimize any amount of notetaking that we have to take during the interview.

As I mentioned earlier, there will be transcripts available and what I am handing you now is Exhibit 3.1 and you can keep that.

19 [Handing document to Interviewee.]

MS. JONES: I will put a phone number of the Best Western where we are staying and you can come over in about 24 hours -- give us a call first -- and the contact's name is Marcia K. I will write down the phone number for you. That [indicating] explains what the transcripts are, how they will be available and if you have an

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opportunity -- or if you feel the need to make any changes or clarify any statements that you made today, you can certainly go ahead and do that and we will include those statements as part of the transcript.

5 The transcript will be available in two locations, 6 one is at the NRC Public Document Room in Washington, D.C., 7 and the other one is our Region 1 Office, which is in King 8 of Prussia, Pennsylvania, outside of Philadelphia.

9 If you want, when it is available in the public 10 document room, if you request you can have a copy of the 11 transcript provided to you. In addition, the IIT will be, 12 within the next 45 days, putting together all these facts 13 from all the people that we have interviewed and talked with 14 and be writing a report. That will be available in about 45 15 days.

So that will be a final report.

One thing, if you could just do for us is to give us an idea of what your normal duties are here at the nursing home. What would a normal day consist of, and what are you responsibilities?

THE INTERVIEWEE: We do all the repairs if anything breaks down. We haul our water in. Snow removal, grass cutting in the summer. Pulling posies out in the summer. Stuff like that. Buff floors. We repair about anything -- you know, maintaining stuff. Clean the fan

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1 vents; practically anything to do with maintenance, we do. 2 MS. JONES: Are you the only maintenance personnel? 3 4 THE INTERVIEWEE: No, me and another guy. 5 MS. JONES: Do you, or do you both have 6 responsibility for what was called red bag waste? 7 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. MS. JONES: You both do? 8 9 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. We take turns taking it 10 out. 11 MS. JONES: For the week of the 1 th of November, which started on Monday, is there any way to tell who would 12 13 have taken out the trash of the red bag waste that week? 14 THE INTERVIEWEE: Well, we both did but I took it 15 out that morning that I was told to wait by 16 when the found something, I guess. 17 MS. JONES: I don't know what happened. 18 THE INTERVIEWEE: We usually pick up between 8 and 19 8:30. 20 MS. JONES: In the morning? 21 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. She told me to leave it 22 sit, don't pick it up yet. Then I did t really know what 23 was involved, but I didn't take it out until she told me it 24 was okay. MS. JONES: When would that have been? 25

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1 THE INTERVIEWEE: I think it was Wednesday or 2 Thursday; I ain't sure. 3 MS. JONES: Where did it stay from --4 THE INTERVIEWEE: It stayed in the can in the 5 hopper room. 6 MS. JONES: Okay. That is that utility room that 7 is in the --8 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. 9 MS. JONES: In a normal day's worth of waste, who 10 goes into the hopper room? Who puts in waste in there? Is 11 that you, or the nurses? 12 THE INTERVIEWEE: The nurses do it when they do 13 their meds, and stuff, their changings. We just take it up when they are done in the morning and then in the afternoon 14 before we leave. We throw it in the bin out here, the 15 wastercom -- the little generator room. 16 17 MS. JONES: Right. The back side of the 18 recreation room? 19 THE INTERVIEWEE: Right. 20 MS. JONES: So it gets picked up twice a day? 21 THE INTERVIEWEE: Twice a day. 22 MS. JONES: And that is about -- what time in the 23 morning, again? 24 THE INTERVIEWEE: We average between 8 and 8:30 in the morning and 2:30 to 3:30, before we leave. 25

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1 MS. JONES: Right about now? 2 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. 3 MS. JONES: Is it filled in the morning when you 4 go in there? 5 THE INTERVIEWEE: Not really. Maybe half a can. The can is only a three-gallon container. We put a fresh 6 7 bag in. 8 MS. JONES: When you go in there in the morning to 9 pick it up, what do you do with the bag? 10 THE INTERVIEWEE: We wear rubber gloves and we take it up, put the new bag in, and take it straight out to 11 that little room outside. We don't set the bag down on the 12 13 floor, or nothing. We just take it straight out. 14 MS. JONES: Do you have to seal it with tape, or 15 do you just ---16 THE INTERVIEWEE: We just knots in the bag. 17 MS. JONES: Tie the knot. Then when you put it 18 outside in that room outside, maybe you can show me later -19 -Again, do you put it in a box, or do you just put it on the 20 floor? 21 THE INTERVIEWEE: No, we have boxes made up with 22 bags, big liners. We just keep it in there until the box is 23 filled and then we seal it up, tape it up, and mark on it 24 when we started the box and when we ended it. 25 MS. JONES: Okay. How long does it take for you

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to get a full box? What size is the box? On the average. 1 2 THE INTERVIEWEE: When they pick it up, it usually weighs anywhere from 30 to 40 pounds, sometimes -- maybe 3 4 less. That is about a week. 5 MS. JONES: A week's worth in one box? 6 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. 7 MS. JONES: How often does -- the vendor that 8 picks it up is BFI? 9 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. On the average, about three weeks they came because we only have like three or 10 11 four boxes they send back. 12 MS. JONES: Okay. Do they come on a special day? THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, usually on Wednesdays --13 14 maybe Tuesdays sometimes. It depends on their schedule, 15 when they are notified. 16 MS. JONES: Do they have a set contract, do you 17 know, with this facility? 18 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, I am pretty sure they do. MS. JONES: Or, do you have to call them when the room gets filled? THE INTERVIEWEE: We usually call them when it is 21 full. When we have isolation cases, then it gets full 22 23 quick. MS. JONES: How often would that happen, would you get isolation?

1 THE INTERVIEWEE: That is not very often at all. 2 MS. JONES: Okay. Who usually calls BFI to come 3 pick up the waste? 4 THE INTERVIEWEE: Usually Ed or the secretary. 5 MS. JONES: Do they know to call on a certain day? 6 THE INTERVIEWEE: Well, we tell them we have a few 7 boxes back there full. We let them know. 8 MS. JONES: And then they come? 9 THE INTERVIEWEE: Then they come and take care of 10 it. 11 MS. JONES: What happens when they show up here? Where do they go and who do they talk to? 12 13 THE INTERVIEWEE: Me. I sign for it when they 14 pick up and drop us off new boxes and bags. 15 MS. JONES: Do they drive around the back? THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, they drive around and they 16 back right into the -- they back into the little building 17 there. We just carry the boxes out and put them on their 18 tailgate of the truck and they weigh them. 19 20 MS. JONES: Do they have a scale with them? THE INTERVIEWEE: Oh, yes. They write everything 21 down on a paper and I look at it and sign it. 22 MS. JONES: I have a copy, and you can correct me 23 -- This [indicating] happens to be the shipment in question. 24 25 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes.

JONES: There is a question about the date on this one in particular. Ed has a better copy, but it was written like a third copy so it is hard to read. I had filled in darker, kind of followed your name here [indicating], but the date that was written on that Ed could read appeared to be the 23rd, which was a Monday.

7 Do you think it is possible that the shipment 8 could have been picked up on Monday?

9 THE INTERVIEWEE: It could have been -- very 10 possible. Sometimes on a day -- with our schedule, we work 11 every other weekend, off on Friday, and then work the 12 weekend, then we are off Tuesday the following week. We do 13 get our days mixed up.

MS. JONES: If BFI had a record that showed that it was on the 25th, which was a Wednesday, is it possible that maybe you just got the date mixed upon here?

THE INTERVIEWEE: No, he dates it.

MS. JONES: The driver dates it? So that is not -- that wouldn't be you?

20 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. I don't date it.

21 MS. JONES: What part of this form would you fill 22 out?

THE INTERVIEWEE: Right here [indicating]. I print my name and then sign it.

25 MS. JONES: Okay.

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1 THE INTERVIEWEE: They always dated it. 2 MS. JONES: So they date it. In this case, it was 3 whoever the driver was --4 THE INTERVIEWEE: Right. 5 MS. JONES: Does he normally come and pick up the waste? 6 7 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. He is a pretty steady 8 driver. 9 MS. JONES: Do you know what kind of truck he 10 comes in? 11 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, it is a big, straight 12 truck. 13 MS. JONES: When he comes here, can you tell if 14 -- Have you ever looked in the back of his truck? Is there a lot of boxes already in, or it is an empty truck? 15 16 THE INTERVIEWEE: No, there are some boxes up 17 front -- not a lot. 18 MS. JONES: If you had to say how deep it was --19 THE INTERVIEWEE: About a third of the truck. 20 Maybe a row or two of boxes; that is it. 21 MS. JONES: Okay. 22 THE INTERVIEWEE: That is all I ever noticed. 23 24 the driver for BFI, is he the one who normally comes here? 25 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes.

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1	MS. JONES: Do you know if he has a radiation
2	instrument with him? Or, has he ever used one on boxes that
3	he gets from here?
4	THE INTERVIEWEE: I have never seen him use it.
5	MS. JONES: Do you know if he has one?
6	THE INTERVIEWEE: I don't know.
7	MS. JONES: Have you ever seen the cab of his
8	truck?
9	THE INTERVIEWEE: No, we seal the boxes up and
10	take them to the tailgate, set them up, he weighs them and
11	writes it down and I sign them.
12	MS. JONES: How long would that take?
13	THE INTERVIEWEE: Ten or 15 minutes. On the days
14	It probably was a Monday. but like I said, we get our
15	days mixed up
16	MS. JONES: That is certainly easily enough to do
17	when you have a lot to do.
18	How often do you have to go out to the back
19	storage room at all? Would anyone else have access to that
20	room?
21	THE INTERVIEWEE: Well, if we have a problem up
22	here, if we have to use the generator, the generator is in
23	that room. So if you ever go in there, it would be right in
24	there with the box.
25	MS. JONES: Do you know if anyone

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1 THE INTERVIEWEE: NO. 2 MS. JONES: Have you had a problem recently to 3 need the generator? 4 THE INTERVIEWEE: No, not for a while. 5 MS. JONES: So not probably within the last month? 6 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. Usually when there is a 7 problem with the generator, we are called in. 8 MR. LLOYD: Other than yourself, who would be 9 going into that room? 10 THE INTERVIEWEE: My assistant, Rob. 11 MR. LLOYD: What would be the reason that he would 12 go in there? 13 THE INTERVIEWEE: Just to drop off waste. 14 MR. LLOYD: So he would only be in there a very 15 short period of time -- just to drop waste off? THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, that and we do -- We have a 16 17 weekly check on the generator. We just take it outside, 18 start it, make sure it is gassed and full and throw it back 19 in there. 20 MS. JONES: Okay. On that morning, you normally 21 would have taken the red bag waste out of that utility room, 22 you mentioned that for the nurses, who is one of the nurses here, said not to. 23 24 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, she told me to wait a 25 while.

1	MS. JONES: Did she say why?
2	THE INTERVIEWEE: I understood she just a piece
3	of catheter, or something. I am not sure. She would let me
4	know when to take it out.
5	MS. JONES: Do you know if she had to contact a
6	doctor to get his directions, or did she know
7	THE INTERVIEWEE: I don't know. I didn't ask.
8	Okay, I will just get it later.
9	MS. JONES: Did she find you later and tell you
10	when to pick it up?
11	THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, he come and got me and told
12	me to go ahead and dispose of it.
13	MS. JONES: About what time was that?
14	THE INTERVIEWEE: I would say that was about an
15	hour before break. About an hour later.
16	MS. JONES: So that was
17	THE INTERVIEWES: Around 9, maybe 9:30.
18	MS. JONES: It was still in the morning?
19	THE INTERVIEWEE: Oh, yes.
20	MS. JONES: It didn't stay there all day?
21	THE INTERVIEWEE: No As a matter of fact, it
22	was out before I went on break.
23	MS. JONES: Okay. What did you do with the bag
24	. then when you were ready to take it out?
25	THE INTERVIEWEE: I took it straight to

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1 MS. JONES: To that room? 2 THE INTERVIEWEE: To that bin. 3 MS. JONES: Was there a box already in the back room that had started to be filled? 4 5 THE INTERVIEWEE: Right. 6 MS. JONES: Did you just put it -- What did you do 7 with t bag then? 8 THE INTERVIEWEE: Just dropped it in the box. 9 MS. JONES: Do you remember, by any chance, if the box was half filled with stuff, or not quite filled? 10 11 THE INTERVIEWEE: It was about a third. 12 MS. JONES: Okay. Then, later on that day, you 13 had more waste? 14 THE INTERVIEWEE: One more bag before we went 15 home. 16 MS. JONES: Okay, and you put that on top. How long did it take you to fill up that box? This indicates 17 that three boxes were picked up for shipment [indicating]. 18 19 THE INTERVIEWEE: You see, I don't know if Rob sealed that box. I was off the weekend. With hunting 20 season and all, we were switching days around. 21 MS. JONES: If you went into the room, do you have 22 an order where you put boxes, first, second and third that 23 24 you filled up? 25 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes.

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1 MS. JONES: Where would the first box be if it was filled? Would it be toward the rec room? 2 3 THE INTERVIEWEE: It would be on like towards 17 on that corner. When we fill another one, we just it on top 4 of that one. The third one, probably be the one we are 5 working on now, it would be right beside of it. 6 7 MS. JONES: Okay. Was this one on the floor that 8 you were working on? 9 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. 10 MS. JONES: Do you remember if there was any other 11 boxes already filled up? THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, I believe there was one. I 12 13 am pretty sure there was one. 14 MS. JONES: And then it would have got picked up 15 the next week, before Thanksgiving. 16 THE INTERVIEWEE: Right. I think there was one 17 more besides this. 18 MS. JONES: So in a month's time, about how many 19 boxes do you have? 20 THE INTERVIEWEE: Usually three. MS. JONES: Are they those tall boxes? You don't 21 22 ever use the smaller ones? 23 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. 24 MR. LLOYD: The bigger box? 25 MS. JONES: The 31 x 21 x 21?

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1 THE INTERVIEWEE: There are two or three to pick 2 up. Like I said, isolation -- maybe four. If we have an 3 isolation unit set up. 4 MS. JONES: Okay. Do you ever help BFI load any 5 of the boxes onto the truck? 6 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, sometimes we left them up 7 to the tailgate for them. He has a scale up on the bed. He 8 is up there putting them on scale, weighing them and he 9 takes them straight up to the front. 10 MS. JONES: Has the driver ever mentioned having 11 radioactive packages before, or having any problem with 12 packages? 13 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. 14 MR. LLOYD: Why does he weigh the packages? 15 THE INTERVIEWEE: To see how much weight is in 16 them. 17 MR. LLOYD: You don't get charged by the pound? 18 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, there is charge. I am not 19 sure about that but I think there is a charge for the 20 poundage. That is what I kind of figured -- that is probably how they make out, they charge by the pound. I 21 22 don't know. 23 MS. JONES: Back to the utility room, the room 24 that holds the waste, if you walked in there at 8:30 in the 25 morning and it was really only a couple of small bags in

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there, would you not put it back in the storage room, or would you --

3 THE INTERVIEWEE: No, you take it out. 4 MS. JONES: Even if it has a little bit? 5 THE INTERVIEWEE: We take it out. 6 MS. JONES: Okay. 7 THE INTERVIEWEE: And we always put afresh bag in. MS. JONES: Is that a policy here, or just ---8 9 THE INTERVIEWEE: It is a policy me and my buddy 10 have. We get it out of there. Never told to let it go from 11 morning to afternoon. We do change it twice a day. 12 MR. LLOYD: Did you remove it from that room the 13 same day as the pick up? 14 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. 15 MS. JONES: What do you mean? 16 THE INTERVIEWEE: Do you mean when they picked the 17 waste up? 18 MR. LLOYD: Yes. It went from Room 4 into the 19 hopper room and it stayed there for how long before you removed it from there and put it out to the storage room in 20 21 the back? 22 THE INTERVIEWEE: I don't get you there. 23 MR. LLOYD: Somebody moved it -- I assume the nurses, right? Moved it from there to the hopper room. You 24 25 said you picked up that package from the hopper room the

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same day as the individual came to pick it up from the 1 2 storage room. 3 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. 4 MS. JONES: No, I thought you meant -- two 5 questions. One was when the nurse put it in the interim room, when did you pick it up and put it back in the storage 6 7 facility? 8 THE INTERVIEWEE: After she told me it was okay. 9 MS. JONES: That was the same day -- that was that 10 morning at --11 MR. LLOYD: That is what I was trying to --12 MS. JONES: Right before your ---13 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, before my break. 14 MS. JONES: Okay. And your question was when the BFI truck, was it the same day? 15 16 MR. LLOYD: Correct. 17 THE INTERVIEWEE: I don't know if it was the same 18 day or not. Really, we didn't even know what was going on 19 with that room there, what was found or anything. 20 MS. JONES: We were wondering when you put it back in that room that day; did you have the truck come from BFI 21 22 and pick it up? 23 THE INTERVIEWEE: I can't recall if it is the same 24 day or not. 25 MS. JONES: Who else would have a key to the

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1 storage room if they needed to get in? 2 THE INTERVIEWEE: We have a key in the key box and we have a key in the maintenance shop. They are the only 3 two keys that I know of. 4 5 MS. JONES: Do you know of any reason why anyone 6 would have to go in there? 7 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. Except when they have to use the generator. They will call me for that. 8 9 MS. JONES: Now there is a room on the back side of -- is that the generator room? It seems like there are 10 11 two rooms back to back. 12 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, that is where the transformer and stuff are for the building. 13 14 MS. JONES: Does anybody use the transformers or 15 have to go in there? 16 THE INTERVIEWEE: No, just the electric company when they come out and make their meter reading. 17 18 MS. JONES: Would there have been any reason for anyone to park outside near that area, rather than using any 19 20 of the two parking lots you have? THE INTERVIEWEE: No. Usually salesmen might, for 21 the kitchen stuff -- might pull in there and park. Not an 22 23 all day thing. MS. JONES: If they were parked out there, how 24 25 long would they be out there for?

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THE INTERVIEWEE: Maybe 10 or 15 minutes; just 1 enough to get an order. 2 3 MS. JONES: Real short. 4 THE INTERVIEWEE: Usually if somebody is parked 5 there, we ask them to move. We have trucks coming for 6 delivery and stuff. It would crowd that corner. 7 MS. JONES: So delivery trucks would come in. What kind of delivery trucks and how often would they come? 8 9 THE INTERVIEWEE: They come in straight trucks, 10 they come in small trailers. We get a couple of big semi's 11 in here. 12 MS. JONES: For food or supplies? 13 THE INTERVIEWEE: Food, our maintenance products; 14 you know, laundry material and stuff like that, or building 15 material. We had a semi deliver door frames and stuff. 16 MS. JONES: Is there any way, that you have a list 17 or a record of who would have delivered things from the 19th 18 of November until the 23rd or 25th, when it was picked up. 19 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes, Ed would. We sign for 20 everything that comes in -- you know, pick ups and anything 21 we get we turn those slips into the secretary. MS. JONES: We can ask Ed for that. 22 Do you have any questions? 23 24 THE INTERVIEWEE: No. Like I said, on them days 25 -- we might have the days mixed up on the pick up, but as

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far as the bag goes, Sara told me not to pick it up. I 1 figured there was something up, but I didn't ask. She told 2 3 me it was okay to take, it took it out and disposed of it. 4 MS. JONES: Sara is on the day shift? 5 THE INTERVIEWEE: Yes. She was charge nurse that 6 day. 7 MS. JONES: So I will probably check with her 8 tomorrow -- just to chat with her. 9 I think that is it. That will be the close of the 10 interview. It is now 3:30. 11 [Whereupon, at 3:30 p.m., the interview was 12 concluded.] 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25
