SUBJECT: SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT WITH ARNOLD GUNDERSEN; DEMAND FOR INFORMATION

This is to advise you that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission has received a letter dated February 12, 1993, from Arnold Gundersen, a former employee of Nuclear Energy Services (NES), challenging certain sections of the settlement agreement between Mr. Gundersen and NES dated December 29, 1990 (copy enclosed). In his letter, Mr. Gundersen asserts that paragraphs 4, 6, 7, 9, and 11 violate 10 CFR 30.7(g), which provides that no agreement affecting the compensation, terms, conditions, and privileges of employment may contain any provision which would prohibit, restrict, or otherwise discourage an employee from participating in protected activities. Mr. Gundersen requests that the NRC declare the settlement illegal and to be null and void. In addition, Mr. Gundersen requests that the NRC rule that a civil suit filed against him by NES is illegal.

The NRC has reviewed Mr. Gundersen's letter and it appears that certain provisions of the settlement agreement, specifically paragraphs 6, 7, and 10, may possibly prohibit Mr. Gundersen from exercising the rights guaranteed by Section 211 (formerly Section 210) of the Energy Reorganization Act. Such a prohibition would be a violation of 10 CFR 30.7(g) and also would be void as against public policy and, therefore, such provisions would be unenforceable by either party to the settlement.

Pursuant to Sections 161c and 161o of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended, and the Commission's regulations in 10 CFR 2.204 and 30.32(b), in order for the Commission to determine whether enforcement action should be taken in this matter, you are required to respond to me in writing and under oath or affirmation, within 30 days of the date of this letter, concerning the following matters:

- (1) why the NRC should not conclude that the settlement agreement violates 10 CFR 30.7(g);
- (2) since Mr. Gundersen believes the settlement agreement attempts to prohibit him from bringing matters to the attention of the NRC, what action have you taken, and

Nuclear Energy Services - 2 what actions do you plan to take, to inform Mr. Gundersen that no portion of the settlement agreement should be interpreted as prohibiting him from exercising his rights under Section 211.
