

MS. JONES: My name is Cynthia Jones and we will be starting the interview this morning. As I mentioned to you on Tuesday evening, there is a person here who is taking notes, a stenographer, and there is another individual here who is also a member of the Incident Investigation Team.

What I will have you do after I give the introduction is have you both introduce yourself and spell

MS. PRUSHNOK: All right.

MS. JONES: As I mentioned before, the purpose of the discussion today and the reason why it is being documented by a stenographer is that the NRC has established an Incident Investigation Team or an IIT.

The purposes of the team are to establish what happened, to identify the facts and to identify any probable causes and in addition, to provide any feedback that we may need to give back to the industry, the licensee in this case or the manufacturer regarding any recommended changes in regulations or guidelines that would result in any lessons learned that we find from this event.

One of the reasons that we document the interviews is so that when we start to write the report we can go back into the transcripts and look at the facts as people such as

2	my notes as I did on Tuesday evening.
3	There will be transcripts made available and what
4	I will be doing, Wilda, is mailing you a copy of what we
5	call exhibit 3.1 and the title of that is called,
6	"Guidelines for Review and Availability of Transcripts."
7	During our investigation, a copy of these will be
8	made available for you to look at and to document if there
9	are any changes or corrections that need to be made to the
10	transcripts once it is done.
11	You can correct your answer on an errata sheet, a
12	sheet that is attached to the document, and if you have any
13	other questions, there will be someone from this team
14	available to answer any questions.
15	Because we are so far apart and I understand you
16	are near Indiana, Pennsylvania?
17	MS. PRUSHNOK: Yes, I am.
18	MS. JONES: We will have someone from the team
19	come out there.
20	MS. PRUSHNOK: I can hardly hear you, Cynthia.
21	MS. JONES: Is that better?
22	MS. PRUSHNOK: That's better.
23	MS. JONES: Great.
24	MS. PRUSHNOK: You are back again, I can't hear

21	away on Thursday.

24	MS. PRUSHNOK: I won't be back.
25	MS. JONES: You won't be back.

1	MS. PRUSHNOK: I doubt that I will be.
2	MS. JONES: We can make it available whenever it
3	is convenient for you.
4	MS. PRUSHNOK: All right, that's better.
5	MS. JONES: As I mentioned before to you on
6	Tuesday evening, to the best of your knowledge if you can
7	explain when you went to the nursing home, how often you
8	were at the nursing home and for the record, please, if you
9	could state your full name and spell your last name.
10	MS. PRUSHNOK: My name is Wilda Prushnok.
11	MS. JONES: We have one other person in the room
12	as well.
13	MR. MADISON: Alan Madison with the NRC.
14	MS. PRUSHNOK: I can't hear you.
15	MS. JONES: I am having a difficult time here,
16	too.
17	MS. PRUSHNOK: There is something wrong.
18	MS. JONES: Maybe it is a loose connection. Is
19	that better?
20	MS. PRUSHNOK: No.
21	MS. JONES: This has happened before.
22	MS. PRUSHNOK: I can hear you now but then in a
23	moment, I won't be able to hear you again. I heard Alan
24	say, "This is Alan."
25	MS. JONES: Alan Madison.

1	MS. PRUSHNOK: Can you hear me?
2	MS. JONES: Yes, I can hear you very clearly.
3	MS. PRUSHNOK: All right. Let's try it again. My
4	name is Wilda Prushnok, P-R-U-S-H-N-O-K.
5	MS. JONES: Thank you, Wilda. To the best of your
6	knowledge then during the week of November 16th, how often
7	and what evenings did you go by to visit the patient, your
8	friend, Mildred.
9	MS. PRUSHNOK: I went to visit Mildred Colgan on
10	Thursday evening, November 19th and Friday evening, November
11	20th.
12	MS. JONES: Do you remember what times of the day
13	that you went to visit?
14	MS. PRUSHNOK: It was in the evening and it
15	probably didn't exceed two and a half hours.
16	MS. JONES: On Tuesday evening, you mentioned that
17	on the 19th, you were alone?
18	MS. PRUSHNOK: That was Thursday evening, that was
19	the 19th. Yes, I was alone that night and to my knowledge
20	there wasn't any other person other than the aides who came
21	in and out of that room.
22	MS. JONES: All right.
23	MS. PRUSHNOK: No other visitors.
24	MS. JONES: Or other visitors?
25	MS. PRUSHNOK: No other visitors.

1	MS. JONES: All right.
2	MS. PRUSHNOK: No other visitors on Thursday
3	night.
4	MS. JONES: Ar you able to drive to the nursing
5	home or did you have anyone drive you there?
6	MS. PRUSHNOK: I am able to drive to the nursing
7	home. I went there many, many times but that week as I was
8	just getting over a bout with the flu that started November
9	13th, that was Friday, November the 13th, the day of her
10	implant surgery and I didn't recover from that until about
11	Tuesday, and I didn't want to take any germs to Mildred so
12	that is why I am saved from many of those visits because I
13	didn't go until Thursday. I would speak with her on the
14	phone.
15	MS. JONES: All right. Did she mention anything
16	to you on the phone about how she felt after she had the
17	implants?
18	MS. PRUSHNOK: She felt good after the implant.
19	That would be Saturday and Sunday. She felt quite good.
20	MS. JONES: Was she able to walk around?
21	MS. PRUSHNOK: Well now, I can't answer that
22	because remember, I wasn't there.
23	MS. JONES: That's fine. When you went to the
24	nursing home on the 19th and on the 20th, can you give us an
25	idea of where you sat or stood in the room next to Mid?

1	MS. PRUSHNOK: Well, I stood everywhere and I sat
2	on the bed which would be as you are looking toward Mildred,
3	well, her bed was the window bed so it would have been to
4	her right. I sat on that bed. I leaned over on that side
5	of her bed because that was where her food tray was and I
6	tried to feed her but every bite I gave her, she threw up.
7	MS. JONES: Could you repeat that last part for
8	me, please?
9	MS. PRUSHNOK: Every bite and there weren't too
10	many bites as I remember, there were three bites and she
11	threw that up and she told me that she hadn't kept a bit
12	down since she had that radiation treatment.
13	MS. JONES: All right. Would you help her with
14	her food during that evening on the 19th and 20th?
15	MS. PRUSHNOK: Not on the 20th, on the 19th.
16	MS. JONES: All right. Would you hold her hand or
17	touch her physically?
18	MS. PRUSHNOK: Oh, yes. I held her and I
19	whispered in her ear and I sang little songs to her, little
20	hymns that were rather personal little things that we would
21	play on the piano and harmonize for many, many years and
22	those came to my mind and I sang those to her in her ear and
23	I took her hand and, of course, she was very arthritic in
24	her hands and very crippled and I would hold her hand and it
25	seemed to me like her pulse was just like a phonograph

1	record going around, it was just very, very rapid.
2	MS. JONES: So if I had to make an estimate of
3	what distance away you were from her on the evening of the
4	19th, would you say that more than half the time or less
5	than half the time, you were touching her and holding her
6	hand and being close to her?
7	MS. PRUSHNOK: I would say more than half the
8	time.
9	MS. JONES: Maybe 75-percent of the time?
10	MS. PRUSHNOK: I would say or even maybe 80
11	percent of the time. I am getting a beep. Could I answer
12	that?
13	MS. JONES: Sure.
14	[PAUSE.]
15	MS. PRUSHNOK: I am back.
16	MS. JONES: Great. Who else came to visit on
1.7	Friday, the 20th when you were there visiting her?
18	MS. PRUSHNOK: Well, when I got there and I just
9	can't remember. I seems like it might have been about 5:30
0	maybe, I just cannot tell you but when I got there,
1	were there.
2	MS. JONES: with you at
3	all?
4	MS. PRUSHNOK: Yes.
5	was with me. She, too, was very close to Mildred, hanging

1	over and kissing her and, of course, Mildred was a kissy
2	person and a huggy person and that is what she liked. She
3	needed that contact.
4	MS. JONES: How long was there?
5	MS. PRUSHNOK: I am going to say two hours.
6	MS. JONES: And was there on the 20th?
7	MS. PRUSHNOK: The 20th, that would be the day
8	before her death.
9	MS. JONES: Right. I asked you this before on
10	Tuesday but again for the stenographer, did you or
11	know Dr. Bauer at all before this?
12	MS. PRUSHNOK: Yes. I have been acquainted with
13	Dr. Bauer for perhaps four years or five and my husband, 19
14	months ago died with multiple myeloma and so he had many
15	treatments of this nature also and in the beginning when I
16	met Dr. Bauer, I took my husband, Raymond, to Dr. Bauer's
17	office.
18	But it was in my husband's best interest to be
19	transferred to a facility in Johnstown, Pennsylvania where
20	he had his treatments and also at the Giesinger Clinic and
21	Dr. Bauer had never helped with any treatments for my
22	husband.
23	Then after his death, then I had occasion to meet
24	Dr. Bauer again when I took Mildred Colgan right when she
25	found out that she had the malignancy, I took her to Dr.

Bauer the first time and she was very nervous and to my 1 recollection I think Dr. Bauer prayed with her that day and 2 he is a very nice person and an upright citizen in the 3 community and I feel this is very unfortunate that this 4 thing has happened but I can't get into that, I am not a 5 medical person. 6 MS. JONES: Right. Now you mentioned on Tuesday 7 that you were in to visit for surgery. 8 MS. PRUSHNOK: On December 3rd which was a 9 Thursday, that was the day of her surgery. She had TMJ 10 surgery and she was on that floor. I think perhaps at that 11 point she was in recovery on the floor where the laboratory 12 is where they take your blood. 13 MS. JONES: Right. 14 MS. PRUSHNOK: And as I walked off the elevator, I 15 noticed sitting there in that 16 area and they motioned to me and, of course, I went over and 17 spoke with them and they said that they were there for their 18 blood test, is that why I had come in to the hospital and I 19 said, "No, I don't know what you are talking about, I am 20 here because of 21 Then they began to tell me and explained it to me 22 at which time the girl, the lab technician, called on the 23 telephone and got Dr. Bauer on the phone and he spoke with 24

me and he explained to me what he wanted me to do, was to

25

1	have this test taken.
2	I said, "Oh my goodness, am I all right?" He
3	said, "Oh, certainly. You are all right." It isn't any big
4	deal because I believe he said that I probably had about the
5	same dose as a person would receive if they were having a
6	kidney scan. So at that point, that satisfied me but I
7	didn't run over and tell who was coming out of
8	recovery.
9	I kept that from her even in the evening when she
10	was more coherent. Then the next day which was December
11	4th, that was Friday, had seen it on the news in
12	the middle of the night and that alarmed here somewhat.
13	-Then Dr. Bauer called her, explained it to her as I have
14	explained it to you but told her at that time that her test
1.5	was abnormal but she had been giving a lot of blood, well, I
16	won't say a lot of blood, the necessary amount to store for
17	her TMJ surgery so she could have her blood back.
.8	MS. JONES: Right.
9	MS. PRUSHNOK: They talked about that. I don't
0	even understand that so you would have to take that up with
1	someone else.
2	MS. JONES: All right. Did Dr. Bauer give you or
3	Kathy the results back from the blood test?
4	MS. PRUSHNOK: No, no, and I have been out of town
5	quite a bit as has Well, has been going back

1	and forth to her doctors in Monroeville and in Indiana quite
2	a bit and I have been out of town so if he called me, I did
3	not get that phone call and I did not get a letter to my
4	knowledge stating those facts.
5	MS. JONES: Do you get to see the very
6	much at all?
7	MS. PRUSHNOK: No, not very much.
8	MS. JONES: We will have to call them and find out
9	of they received their blood test results, too.
10	MS. PRUSHNOK: I can't hear you, Cynthia.
11	MS. JONES: I am sorry. I have to call them and
12	find out if their blood test results are in.
13	MS. PRUSHNOK: All right. Now
14	just came to the door and reminded me that
15	told her that she is unhappy with
16	her test, with her results, because Dr. Bauer talked with
17	her on December 4th when she was still a patient and he
18	explained to her about her test and said that there was some
19	abnormal parts to it.
20	MS. JONES: Did he take another lab sample later?
21	MS. PRUSHNOK: I cannot answer that.
22	MS. JONES: That's fine.
23	MS. PRUSHNOK: I don't believe so.
24	MS. JONES: On the times that you went to visit
25	Mildred in the nursing home and this refers again to the

1	article and the conversation you with the Plain Dealer which
2	is a Cleveland paper, can you reiterate that again to me
3	like you did on Tuesday, what did Mid say to
4	and so forth?
5	MS. PRUSHNOK: She said, okay, let me go back to
6	Thursday, November 19th when she said to me and one of the
7	little aides was in there, I don't know which one, I don't
8	know those girls by name, only by their face.
9	She did say to me, "one of those wires had broken
10	off" and at that time I looked for the very first time at
11	her rectal area and I saw what they were speaking of, I say
12	whatever the catheter, whatever that is called.
13	MS. JONES: Right.
14	MS. PRUSHNOK: So I did see where it was broken
15	off. That is the only thing Mid said. Then the next day
16	when we went in on Friday evening, when went over to
17	kiss her, she said, "aren't you afraid to get near me,
18	and said, "Well, why would I be afraid,
19	Mildred?" I mentioned after I had talked to you, Cynthia,
20	as to Mildred's reply when said that, said to her,
21	"Why would I be afraid?" and we both think that she didn't
22	answer.
23	MS. JONES: Okay.
24	MS. PRUSHNOK: We can't remember. Neither one of
25	us can recall that.

8	and she would say, "Please, Wilda, go and find someone, I
9	think I have to throw up or I think I have to urinate or I
10	think I have to have a BM or whatever" and I would go out in
11	the hall and find somebody and then they would come in and
12	brought her drinks. She kept wanting a drink. She was so
13	thirsty. She wanted a Coke or a Pepsi and that was unusual
14	for her because she never drank that but that night, she
15	just seemed thirsty that week.
16	MS. JONES: Right. Now when we the NRC was in
17	Indiana for a period of time, you indicated on Tuesday you
18	had tried to call us. Could you repeat that again?
19	MS. PRUSHNOK: But on Tuesday, I called you.
20	Somebody had called me and told me that I should speak with
21	the NRC, was that NRC or NRB, which is it?
22	MS. JONES: NRC, you are right.
2.3	MS. PRUSHNOK: So I called on Saturday, December
24	the 5th in the morning and I told the girl who I was and she
