Subject: Comments Pertaining to Applicability of License Conditions and Technical Specification in an Emergency; Proposed Rule (47FR35996, 18 August 1982)

## Dear Sir:

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Yankee Atomic Electric Company appreciates the opportunity to comment on the subject document. Yankee Atomic owns and operates a nuclear power plant in Rowe, Massachusetts. The Nuclear Services Division also provides engineering and licensing services for other nuclear power plants in the Northeast including Vermont Yankee, Maine Yankee, and Seabrook 1 and 2.

We stand in strong support of the NRC's proposal that permits licensees, during emergency situations when normal measures toward compliance may not be protective of public health and safety, to make reasonable departures from license conditions or technical specifications. NRC properly recognizes that technical specifications applicable during normal operations may not be applicable, or desirable, during situations of unforeseen circumstances that might occur. We believe that specific provisions should be promulgated, as NRC has proposed, in order to remove the existing enforcement disincentives that prohibit a reactor operator from making judgements that could better serve the public interest than would rote observance of some technical specifications.

The Commission solicited comments on whether to change the proposed rule to include standards that (1) would specifically identify when licensees were permitted to depart from license conditions or technical specification or (2) would specifically identify when NRC could take enforcement action against impermissible departures. In response, Yankee Atomic believes that the text of the proposed rule need not be changed. We feel such standards would nullify whatever gains toward safer overall plant operation are achieved by the rule, as currently proposed. Licensees must retain discretion, during

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emergencies to exercise the proposed waiver of license conditions or technical specification, and sufficient NRC authority already exists for taking enforcement action against any unreasonable exercises of such licensee discretion.
