REPLY TO NOTICE OF VIOLATION

The District of Columbia General Hospital submits the following statements in response to a Notice of Violation.

Violation Identifier Code

On June 6, 1988, the Hospital's Medical Physicist was not accurate in all material respects when providing information to the NRC.

Statement and/or Explanation

The Hospital admitted in a previous report to NRC that the teletherapy unit radiation monitor was not working due to construction activities in the area. The contradictory statements made by the Medical Physicist concerning the status of the radiation monitor, was done without the knowledge and approval of the Radiation Safety Officer and Hospital management.

The altering of the monthly spot check report was done without the knowledge and approval of the Radiation Safety Officer and Hospital management.

The District of Columbia General Hospital is committed to providing complete and accurate information to NRC according to all license requirements. After the June 6, 1988 inspection, the Hospital immediately applied and obtained NRC approval for Dr. James Deye to perform monthly spot checks on the teletherapy unit. The Hospital's Medical Physicist was removed from all responsibility of supervising the teletherapy unit.

The Medical Physicist is no longer employed by the Hospital and the teletherapy unit has been decommissioned.

In the future, all reports pertaining to license activities will be closely monitored by the RSO. The Hospital will continue to cooperate fully with NRC and provide accurate facts and information when required.

The Hospital is currently in compliance with 10 CFR 30.9(a).
