The picture simply shows our cattle feeding under the "stack" which soon will disperse radioactive waste oduct release from the Cooper Nuclear Power Plant Amer Brownville, Nebraska.

To me the dangers shown by the micture, and it's implications, are greater than the dangers from Vietnam or even Communism.

Pachuse, if what I read is true, we can expose up to two million people who like to eat Nebraska beef to possible radiation poisoning in one year's time from our farm alone. And just across from us we have a friend who feeds but three times as many cattle as we do.

I think you are doing a wonderful job in an immossible situation. I cartainly appreciate the fact that you are a cantleman at all times.
