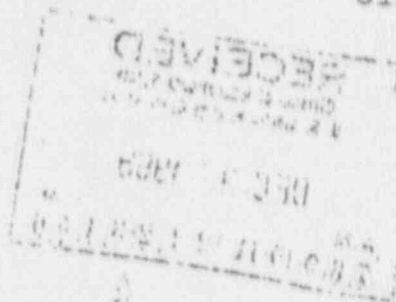
To me the dangers shown by the picture, and it's implications, are greater than the dangers from Vietnam or even Communism.

Because, if what I read is true, we can expose up to two million people who like to eat Nebraska beef to possible radiation poisoning in one year's time from our farm alone. And just across from us we have a friend who feeds out three times as many cattle as we do.

I think you are doing a wonderful job in an impossible situation. I certainly appreciate the fact that you are a gentleman at all times.
