Dear Dr Hanauer:


Regarding the work of your Committee in judging the safety of specific nuclear plant sites, please advise me as to whether or not the Committee has ever recommended a rejection of a proposed site. If so, has the [redacted] overruled the Committee?

I have been told by a utility executive that ACRS has never rejected outright any given site. I'd be grateful to have this confirmed or otherwise by you, as an independent scientist involved in these matters.

Any documents you can supply will be especially helpful. For example, your statement in the Brown's Ferry site in which, if Novick (pp 84-85) is correct, you took exception to the Committee's recommendations....

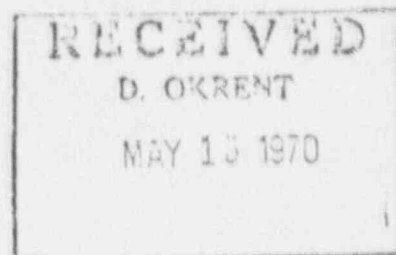
Dear Dr Okrent:

Statement of Policy

April 19, 1969
Revised on May 16, 1969

The public health, safety, and welfare are our primary concerns. We are equally concerned with the intelligent use of the natural environment--land, air, water--for ourselves and for future generations.

We believe that the commercial use of atomic energy for the generation of electrical power can be a threat to the above concerns. The State of New Hampshire must protect the health and safety of its citizens before permitting the building of nuclear power plants.

We believe that the proposed nuclear plant along the New Hampshire seacoast will mar the beauty of an attractive, popular resort area, will do irreversible damage to a valuable estuary, and will jeopardize the considerable economic and recreational benefits presently accruing from our seacoast.

We urge that a moratorium be declared on further construction of nuclear powered plants until reactor technology and proper governmental regulations, including adequate safeguards, are sufficiently developed.

The SEACOAST ANTI-POLLUTION LEAGUE is therefore organized to work toward attaining two specific goals: a deferral of the proposed nuclear plant in Strack and a vigorous opposition to any alteration or degradation of New Hampshire's tidal marshes and estuaries.
