The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) has sent to the Office of the Federal Register for publication the enclosed request for information on the scope of random drug testing defined in 10 CFR Part 26. The NRC is reevaluating whether utilities licensed to operate nuclear power plants must conduct random drug testing of those workers who do not perform safety-related jobs, but who have unescorted access to the plant's protected areas.
