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Summary of the Monticello Individual Plant

Examination (IPE) Submittal on Internal Events

The staff completed its review of the internal events portion of the Monticello Nuclear Generating Plant (Monticello) Individual Plant Examination (IPE) submittal, and associated documentation which includes licensee responses to staff generated questions and comments. The licensee's IPE is based on a full scope level 2 PRA performed in fulfillment of Generic Letter 88-20 and is documented in the submittal.

The findings presented in the submittal under the specific damage classes identify station blackout as the dominant contributor to overall core damage frequency 46%. The next largest overall contributor to core damage involved flooding 26%, followed by transients with loss of high pressure reactor inventory makeup 13%, with either subsequent failure to depressurize (contributing 12% of CD) or subsequent failure of low pressure reactor inventory makeup (contributing 1% of CD). These were followed by ATWS 10% and LOCA 5%. The IPE estimated the core damage frequency as $1.9E-5$ /yr for internal events excluding flooding and $2.6E-5$ /yr with internal flooding.

The licensee used the following questions to determine if vulnerabilities existed:

1. Are there any new or unusual means by which core damage or containment failure occur as compared to those identified in other PRAs?
2. Do the results suggest that the Monticello core damage frequency would not be able to meet the NRC's safety goal for core damage.

The Monticello IPE did not identify any severe accident vulnerabilities associated with either core damage or containment failure. However, the licensee identified hardware modifications and procedural changes which were implemented during the 1993 refueling outage, with exception of one procedure which is scheduled for final approval in 1994. These improvements focus on both reducing core damage frequency and offsite release of radioactivity. In addition the licensee has indicated that, "NSP plans to have a living PRA Program to support Monticello licensing, training, engineering and operations."

Based on the reviewed of the Monticello IPE submittals and associated documentation, the staff concludes that the licensee met the intent of Generic Letter 88-20.

The licensee's IPE results(*) are summarized below:

Major contributions to dominant core damage sequences:

- Station Blackout - Loss of offsite power and diesel generators and (1) failure to recover offsite and onsite power leading to failure of high pressure makeup after 4 hours as a result of battery depletion and failure to depressurize; (2) failure to recover offsite power within 30 min. and independent failure of HP makeup and failure to depressurize.

*All information is taken from the Monticello IPE and the NSP response to staff questions and has not been validated by the NRC staff.

- Internal flooding from (1) a service water line break in reactor building > el. 896', failure of all high pressure injection systems and failure to depressurize; or (2) a service water line break in the 931' el. east turbine building which propagates to motor control centers and main access control and station batteries rendering high pressure injection system inoperable, and failure to depressurize; or (3) service water flood at 911' el. turbine building disabling Div 1 4KV room, failure of high and low pressure makeup.

- Transient - loss of offsite power, manual shutdown, turbine trip or loss of feedwater and subsequent failure of all high pressure sources of makeup and failure to depressurize.

Significant IPE findings:

- The assumption that the RHR and core spray pumps will continue to provide adequate flow after containment failure, reduced the calculated core damage frequency by about $1E-5$ /yr.

- Loss of high pressure injection and failure to depressurize stems from the dependency of long-term operation of the SRVs on a key instrument panel. Instrument panel Y20 powers AC solenoid valves which provide nitrogen to the SRVs for the purpose of depressurizing the reactor. The solenoid valves isolate on SBO because panel Y20 is not powered from the battery supplied essential AC. Accumulators assure operation of SRVs until Y20 is repowered by a diesel or until offsite power is restored.

- Station Blackout coping is negatively influenced by the potential inability to provide high pressure makeup and depressurization of the reactor vessel following battery depletion after 4 hours. The benefit of the crosstie between the diesel fire pump and the RHR as an injection source is limited unless the ADS capability is increased by extending battery life and modifying the power supply to the SRV pneumatic solenoid valves as recommended in the IPE.

- NSP took credit for quick recovery of loss of feedwater events based on occurrences which it used to estimate that the failure to recover would be only 11%. NSP indicated that this had the effect of significantly reducing the total contribution of accident class 1A, characterized by loss of high pressure makeup and failure to depressurize (CDF = $3E-6$). Loss of feedwater accounted for 20% of this class.

- An anticipated transient without scram (ATWS) is exacerbated by the small capacity of the turbine bypass at Monticello. A turbine trip with bypass could result in heatup of the containment at a rate similar to MSIV closure until the operator takes action to initiate power/level control as specified by EOPs.

RCIC - In 73% of cutsets of Class 1A(CDF = $3E-6$).

36% of failure due to failure of pumps to start or run.
23% of failure due to valve failure

HPCI - In 69% of cutsets of class 1A(CDF = $3E-6$).

61% of failure due to failure of HPCI or aux oil pump to start or run.

Enhanced procedures, hardware, and operator actions:

In response to the accident class 1A, concerning a loss of high pressure injection and failure to depressurize:

Modifications are under consideration to supply power to the bottled nitrogen supply for the solenoid valves from an instrument panel that can be powered by an essential power supply or batteries.

In response to accident class 1B, concerning Station Blackout:

- 1) Operator training was conducted covering such items as shedding DC loads, operating HPCI and RCIC to minimize battery drain, and plant response for at least 4 hours.
- 2) Procedure changes were drafted to upgrade the steps to loadshed the station batteries after an SBO to extend battery life if the diesels are not available, which would provide 2 extra hours of capacity.
- 3) Recommendations made to add procedural steps to commence a controlled cooldown as soon as possible after an SBO.
- 4) Recommendations made to supply station battery chargers with an AC independent power supply to extend battery life.
- 5) Plant was modified to allow the diesel fire pump to be aligned to RHR as a reactor vessel injection source.

In response to accident class 1C, concerning loss of high and low pressure injection systems:

- 1) A recommendation was considered for development of procedures for the use of low pressure backup injection systems such as RHRSW through LPCI, condensate service water, service water to the hotwell.
- 2) Operators trained on operation of RHR and core spray pumps under certain operating conditions such as when cavitation is possible.

In response to accident class 2, concerning Loss of Decay Heat Removal:

Recommendations were being considered for:

- 1) Operator training on recovery of failed RHR system and failed condenser with degraded or failed support systems.
- 2) Elimination of locked open condition for discharge valves for air receiver tanks to allow isolation to prevent loss of air.
- 3) Writing a procedure for the replenishment of the water in the CSTs.

In response to the accident class 4, concerning ATWS:

- 1) Operator training was conducted on the significant insights regarding ATWS.
- 2) Actions for mechanically bound CRDs were moved to a contingency procedure in the EOPs, so that the operator will focus on reactor shutdown with SLC.

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

As currently written, H.R. 4296 and title XLV of H.R. 3355 could affect adversely the security of NRC-licensed commercial nuclear power plants and facilities possessing a formula quantity of strategic special nuclear material (SSNM). Both types of facilities employ security personnel armed with weapons such as those that would be subject to the restrictions relating to semiautomatic assault weapons to safeguard the facility. They also use large capacity ammunition feeding devices.

Sections 4505 and 4507 of H.R. 3355 and sections 2 and 4 of H.R. 4296 would exempt departments and agencies of the United States from the restrictions described above. However, as drafted, these sections would cover guards only at Government-owned facilities, such as facilities that are owned by the Department of Energy. We believe the same exemption should apply to NRC-licensed facilities.¹

Therefore, if bans of assault weapons and large capacity feeding devices are included in the final legislation, we recommend that

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been lost to violence. The grim reality demands our immediate response.

Mr. Chairman, this measure takes a significant step in curbing the rising tide of our Nation's violence. H.R. 4296 will help to restore safety and sanity to our communities and I strongly urge all of my colleagues to support this legislation.

Mr. BORSKI. Mr. Chairman, I rise today to express my strong support for H.R. 4296, the Public Safety and Recreational Firearms Use Protection Act. In conjunction with the crime bill and the Brady Law, this legislation is an essential step in ensuring the safety of our community, our law enforcement officers, and especially our families.

Mr. Chairman, assault weapons were designed for only one purpose—killing people. These weapons were designed for war, specifically manufactured to make as many wounds as possible with a maximum number of bullets. Unfortunately, the rapid-firing capability and large bullet capacity of these deadly weapons are quite useful as instruments of terror for the criminals of our country.

There is an ongoing war on the streets between the law enforcement and the criminals. The fact remains that in the city of Philadelphia, our local police are not armed with assault weapons, but the criminals are. Mr. Chairman, opponents to this legislation have stated that a ban on any firearm is an infringement upon their second amendment rights. Let me remind my colleagues that the Preamble of the Constitution clearly states that it is our constitutional duty to "insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common Defence, [and to] promote the general Welfare [of] ourselves and our Posterity." H.R. 4296 is an important step in upholding our vows to ensure these "God-given" liberties.

Mr. Chairman, it is clear that current laws are inadequate to ensure these liberties. Criminals are winning the war on crime in this country. The law enforcement officers charged with protection of our citizens are outgunned and outnumbered by criminals who can easily obtain deadly weapons. The House has already taken steps to aid the law enforcement officials with the passage of H.R. 3355, the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994. The crime bill provides local law enforcement officials with much needed financial assistance for recruitment of 50,000 additional police officers, requires three-time violent criminals to be locked up for life and provides funding for the construction of new prisons. Yet, law enforcement officials continue to begin each day with the fear that they will face a well-armed "street" militia armed with only their service revolver.

H.R. 4296 will ban the manufacture and importation of these weapons of war which will cut off the production and, thus, the supply of these deadly weapons to criminals. The assault weapons banned in this legislation are used every day by criminals to kill other human beings. These guns are not hunting rifles, these guns are not target shooters, these guns were designed to harm other humans. Criminals with rapid-firing capabilities and large capacity ammunition clips can potentially kill as many human beings as they have bullets.

H.R. 4296 specifically targets the most dangerous weapons present on our streets today: AK-47's, UZI's and street sweepers. H.R. 4296 will only ban semiautomatic rifles capa-

ble of accepting a detachable ammunition clip, and two or more of the following military features: flash suppressors, grenade launchers, bayonet attachments, folding or telescoping stocks, and pistol grips.

Mr. Chairman, I see no legitimate reason why this legislation should not be passed. It is time to stop the madness of gun-wars on our city streets. It is time to protect our Nation's law enforcement officers, our families and our children from the crossfire. It is time to pass this measure and prevent those guns from entering into the hands of the criminals of this country.

The CHAIRMAN (Mr. MFUNE). All the time for general debate has expired.

Pursuant to the rule, the committee amendment in the nature of a substitute shall be considered as an original bill for the purpose of amendment and is considered as read.

The text of the committee amendment in the nature of a substitute is as follows:

H.R. 4296

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Public Safety and Recreational Firearms Use Protection Act".

SEC. 2. RESTRICTION ON MANUFACTURE, TRANSFER, AND POSSESSION OF CERTAIN SEMIAUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAPONS.

(a) RESTRICTION.—Section 9i2 of title 18, United States Code, is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(v)(1) It shall be unlawful for a person to manufacture, transfer, or possess a semiautomatic assault weapon.

"(2) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to the possession or transfer of any semiautomatic assault weapon otherwise lawfully possessed on the date of the enactment of this subsection.

"(3) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to—

"(A) any of the firearms, or replicas or duplicates of the firearms, specified in Appendix A to this section as such firearms were manufactured on October 1, 1983;

"(B) any firearm that—

"(i) is manually operated by bolt, pump, lever, or slide action;

"(ii) has been rendered permanently inoperable; or

"(iii) is an antique firearm;

"(C) any semiautomatic rifle that cannot accept a detachable magazine that holds more than 5 rounds of ammunition; or

"(D) any semiautomatic shotgun that cannot hold more than 5 rounds of ammunition in a fixed or detachable magazine.

The fact that a firearm is not listed in Appendix A shall not be construed to mean that paragraph (1) applies to such firearm. No firearm exempted by this subsection may be deleted from Appendix A so long as this Act is in effect.

"(4) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to—

"(A) the United States or a department or agency of the United States or a State or a department, agency, or political subdivision of a State;

"(B) the transfer of a semiautomatic assault weapon by a licensed manufacturer, licensed importer, or licensed dealer to an entity referred to in subparagraph (A) or to a law enforcement officer authorized by such an entity to purchase firearms for official use;

"(C) the possession, by an individual who is retired from service with a law enforcement agency and is not otherwise prohibited from receiving a firearm, of a semiautomatic assault weapon transferred to the individual by the agency upon such retirement; or

"(D) the manufacture, transfer, or possession of a semiautomatic assault weapon by a licensed manufacturer or licensed importer for the purposes of testing or experimentation authorized by the Secretary."

(b) DEFINITION OF SEMIAUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAPON.—Section 921(a) of such title is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(30) The term 'semiautomatic assault weapon' means—

"(A) any of the firearms, or copies or duplicates of the firearms, known as—

"(i) Norinco, Mitchell, and Poly Technologies Automot Kalashnikov (all models);

"(ii) Action Arms Israeli Military Industries UZI and Galil;

"(iii) Beretta AR7 (SC-98);

"(iv) Colt AR-15;

"(v) Fabrique Nationale FN/FAL, FN/LAR, and FNC;

"(vi) SWD M-10, M-11, M-11A, and M-12;

"(vii) Steyr AUG;

"(viii) INTRATEC TEC-9, TEC-DC9 and TEC-22; and

"(ix) revolving cylinder shotguns, such as (or similar to) the Street Sweeper and Striker 12;

"(B) a semiautomatic rifle that has an ability to accept a detachable magazine and has at least 2 of—

"(i) a folding or telescoping stock;

"(ii) a pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon;

"(iii) a bayonet mount;

"(iv) a flash suppressor or threaded barrel designed to accommodate a flash suppressor; and

"(v) a grenade launcher;

"(C) a semiautomatic pistol that has an ability to accept a detachable magazine and has at least 2 of—

"(i) an ammunition magazine that attaches to the pistol outside of the pistol grip;

"(ii) a threaded barrel capable of accepting a barrel extender, flash suppressor, forward hand-grip, or silencer;

"(iii) a shroud that is attached to, or partially or completely encircles, the barrel and that permits the shooter to hold the firearm with the nontrigger hand without being burned;

"(iv) a manufactured weight of 50 ounces or more when the pistol is unloaded; and

"(v) a semiautomatic version of an automatic firearm; and

"(D) a semiautomatic shotgun that has at least 2 of—

"(i) a folding or telescoping stock;

"(ii) a pistol grip that protrudes conspicuously beneath the action of the weapon;

"(iii) a fired magazine capacity in excess of 5 rounds; and

"(iv) an ability to accept a detachable magazine."

(c) PENALTIES.—

(1) VIOLATION OF SECTION 921(v).—Section 926(a)(1)(B) of such title is amended by striking "or (g) of section 922" and inserting "(r), or (v) of section 922".

(2) USE OR POSSESSION DURING CRIME OF VIOLENCE OR DRUG TRAFFICKING CRIME.—Section 926(c)(1) of such title is amended in the first sentence by inserting ", or semiautomatic assault weapon," after "short-barreled shotgun."

(d) IDENTIFICATION MARKINGS FOR SEMIAUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAPONS.—Section 923(l) of such title is amended by adding at the end the following: "The serial number of any semiautomatic assault weapon manufactured after the date of the enactment of this sentence shall clearly show the date on which the weapon was manufactured."

SEC. 3. RECORDKEEPING REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSFERS OF GRANDFATHERED FIREARMS.

(a) OFFENSE.—Section 922 of title 18, United States Code, as amended by section 2(a) of this Act, is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(w)(1) It shall be unlawful for a person to sell, ship, or deliver a semiautomatic assault

weapon to a person who has not completed a form 4473 in connection with the transfer of the semiautomatic assault weapon.

"(2) It shall be unlawful for a person to receive a semiautomatic assault weapon unless the person has completed a form 4473 in connection with the transfer of the semiautomatic assault weapon.

"(3) If a person receives a semiautomatic assault weapon from anyone other than a licensed dealer, both the person and the transferor shall retain a copy of the form 4473 completed in connection with the transfer.

"(4) Within 90 days after the date of the enactment of this subsection, the Secretary shall prescribe regulations ensuring the availability of form 4473 to owners of semiautomatic assault weapons.

"(5) As used in this subsection, the term 'form 4473' means—

"(A) the form which, as of the date of the enactment of this subsection, is designated by the Secretary as form 4473; or

"(B) any other form which—

"(i) is required by the Secretary, in lieu of the form described in subparagraph (A), to be completed in connection with the transfer of a semiautomatic assault weapon; and

"(ii) when completed, contains, at a minimum, the information that, as of the date of the enactment of this subsection, is required to be provided on the form described in subparagraph (A)."

(b) PENALTY.—Section 924(a) of such title is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(F) A person who knowingly violates section 922(w) shall be fined not more than \$1,000, imprisoned not more than 6 months, or both. Section 3573 shall not apply to any offense under this paragraph."

SEC. 4. BAN OF LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION FEEDING DEVICES.

(a) PROHIBITION.—Section 922 of title 18, United States Code, as amended by sections 2 and 3 of this Act, is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), it shall be unlawful for a person to transfer or possess a large capacity ammunition feeding device.

"(2) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to the possession or transfer of any large capacity ammunition feeding device otherwise lawfully possessed on the date of the enactment of this subsection.

"(3) This subsection shall not apply to—

"(A) the United States or a department or agency of the United States or a State or a department, agency, or political subdivision of a State;

"(B) the transfer of a large capacity ammunition feeding device by a licensed manufacturer, licensed importer, or licensed dealer to an entity referred to in subparagraph (A) or to a law enforcement officer authorized by such an entity to purchase large capacity ammunition feeding devices for official use;

"(C) the possession, by an individual who is retired from service with a law enforcement agency and is not otherwise prohibited from receiving ammunition, of a large capacity ammunition feeding device transferred to the individual by the agency upon such retirement; or

"(D) the manufacture, transfer, or possession of any large capacity ammunition feeding device by a licensed manufacturer or licensed importer for the purposes of testing or experimentation authorized by the Secretary."

(b) DEFINITION OF LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION FEEDING DEVICE.—Section 921(a) of such title, as amended by section 2(b) of this Act, is amended by adding at the end the following:

"(3) The term 'large capacity ammunition feeding device'—

"(A) means—

"(i) a magazine, belt, drum, feed strip, or similar device that has a capacity of, or that can be readily restored or converted to accept, more than 10 rounds of ammunition; and

"(ii) any combination of parts from which a device described in clause (i) can be assembled; but

"(B) does not include an attached tubular device designed to accept, and capable of operating only with, 22 caliber rimfire ammunition."

(c) LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION FEEDING DEVICES TREATED AS FIREARMS.—Section 921(a)(3) of such title is amended in the first sentence by striking "or (D) any destructive device;" and inserting "(D) any destructive device; or (E) any large capacity ammunition feeding device."

(d) PENALTY.—Section 924(a)(7)(B) of such title, as amended by section 2(c) of this Act, is amended by striking "or (v)" and inserting "(w), or (x)".

(e) IDENTIFICATION MARKINGS FOR LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION FEEDING DEVICES.—Section 923(l) of such title, as amended by section 2(d) of this Act, is amended by adding at the end the following: "A large capacity ammunition feeding device manufactured after the date of the enactment of this statute shall be identified by a serial number that clearly shows that the device was manufactured or imported after the effective date of this subsection, and such other identification as the Secretary may by regulation prescribe."

SEC. 5. STUDY BY ATTORNEY GENERAL.

(a) STUDY.—The Attorney General shall investigate and study the effect of this Act and the amendments made by this Act, and in particular shall determine their impact, if any, on violent and drug trafficking crime. The study shall be conducted over a period of 18 months, commencing 12 months after the date of enactment of this Act.

(b) REPORT.—Not later than 30 months after the date of enactment of this Act, the Attorney General shall prepare and submit to the Congress a report setting forth in detail the findings and determinations made in the study under subsection (a).

SEC. 6. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Act and the amendments made by this Act—

(1) shall take effect on the date of the enactment of this Act; and

(2) are repealed effective as of the date that is 10 years after that date.

9 (b) DEFINITION OF SEMIAUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAP-
10 ON.—Section 921(a) of title 18, United States Code, is
11 amended by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

12 “(29) The term ‘semiautomatic assault weapon’
13 means—

14 “(A) any of the firearms, or types, replicas, or
15 duplicates in any caliber of the firearms, known as—

16 “(i) Norinco, Mitchell, and Poly Tech-
17 nologies Avtomat Kalashnikovs (all models);

18 “(ii) Action Arms Israeli Military Indus-
19 tries UZI and Galil;

20 “(iii) Beretta AR-70 (SC-70);

21 “(iv) Colt AR-15;

22 “(v) Fabrique Nationale FN/FAL, FN/LAR,
23 and FNC;

24 “(vi) SWD M-10, M-11, M-11/9, and M-
25 12;

26 “(vii) Steyr AUG;

1 “(viii) INTRATEC TEC-9, TEC-DC9 and
2 TEC-22; and

3 “(ix) any shotgun which contains its am-
4 munition in a revolving cylinder, such as (but
5 not limited to) the Street Sweeper and Striker
6 12;

7 “(B) a semiautomatic rifle that has an ability to
8 accept a detachable magazine and has at least 2 of—

9 “(i) a folding or telescoping stock;

10 “(ii) a pistol grip that protrudes conspicu-
11 ously beneath the action of the weapon;

12 “(iii) a bayonet mount;

13 “(iv) a flash suppressor or barrel having a
14 threaded muzzle; and

15 “(v) a grenade launcher;

16 “(C) a semiautomatic pistol that has an ability
17 to accept a detachable magazine and has at least 2
18 of—

19 “(i) an ammunition magazine that attaches
20 to the pistol outside of the pistol grip;

21 “(ii) a barrel having a threaded muzzle;

22 “(iii) a shroud that is attached to, or par-
23 tially or completely encircles, the barrel and that
24 permits the shooter to hold the firearm with the
25 non-trigger hand without being burned;

1 “(iv) a manufactured weight of 50 ounces or
2 more when the pistol is unloaded; and

3 “(v) a semiautomatic version of an auto-
4 matic firearm; and

5 “(D) a semiautomatic shotgun that has at least
6 2 of—

7 “(i) a folding or telescoping stock;

8 “(ii) a pistol grip that protrudes conspicu-
9 ously beneath the action of the weapon;

10 “(iii) a fixed magazine capacity in excess of
11 5 rounds; and

12 “(iv) an ability to accept a detachable mag-
13 azine.

14 (c) PENALTIES.—

15 (1) VIOLATION OF SECTION 922(S).—Section
16 924(a)(1)(B) of title 18, United States Code, is
17 amended by striking “or (q) of section 922” and in-
18 serting “(q), or (s) of section 922”.

19 (2) USE OR POSSESSION DURING CRIME OF VIO-
20 LENCE OR DRUG TRAFFICKING CRIME.—Section

22 in the first sentence by inserting “, or semiautomatic
23 assault weapon” after “short-barreled shotgun,”.

24 (d) IDENTIFICATION MARKINGS FOR SEMIAUTOMATIC
25 ASSAULT WEAPONS.—Section 923(i) of title 18, United

1 *States Code, is amended by adding at the end the following*
2 *new sentence: "The serial number of any semiautomatic as-*
3 *sault weapon manufactured after the date of enactment of*
4 *this section shall clearly show the date on which the weapon*
5 *was manufactured."*

6 **SEC. 4503. EXEMPTION FOR FIREARMS LAWFULLY POS-**
7 **SESSED PRIOR TO DATE OF ENACTMENT.**

8 *Section 922(s) of title 18, United States Code, as added*
9 *by section 4502(a), is amended by adding at the end the*
10 *following paragraph:*

11 *"(2) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to the transfer or*
12 *possession of any firearm that was lawfully possessed before*
13 *the effective date of this subsection."*

14 **SEC. 4504. EXEMPTION FOR CERTAIN HUNTING AND SPORT-**
15 **ING FIREARMS.**

16 *Section 922 of title 18, as amended by section 4503,*
17 *is amended by adding at the end the following paragraph:*

18 *"(3) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to—*

19 *"(A) any of the firearms, or replicas or dupli-*
20 *cates of the firearms, specified in Appendix A to this*
21 *section, as such firearms were manufactured on Octo-*
22 *ber 1, 1993;*

23 *"(B) any firearm that—*

24 *"(i) is manually operated by bolt, pump,*
25 *lever, or slide action;*

1 ✓ “(ii) is an unserviceable firearm; or

2 “(iii) is an antique firearm;

3 “(C) any semiautomatic rifle that cannot accept
4 a detachable magazine that holds more than 5 rounds
5 of ammunition; or

6 “(D) any semiautomatic shotgun that cannot
7 hold more than 5 rounds of ammunition in a fixed
8 or detachable magazine.”.

9 **SEC. 4505. EXEMPTIONS FOR GOVERNMENTAL AND EXPERI-**
10 **MENTAL USE.**

11 Section 922(s) of title 18, United States Code, as
12 amended by section 4504, is amended by adding the follow-
13 ing paragraph:

14 “(4) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to—

15 “(A) the United States or a department or agen-
16 cy of the United States or a State or a department,

1 **SEC. 4506. RECORDKEEPING REQUIREMENTS AND RELATED**

6 “(1) It shall be unlawful for a person to sell, ship,

16 the seller shall maintain a record of the sale on the seller’s
17 original copy of form 4473.

19 date of this subsection who requires retention of form 4473 ✓
20 under this subsection shall, within 90 days after publication
21 of regulations by the Secretary under paragraph (5), re-
22 quest a copy of form 4473 from a licensed dealer in accord-
23 ance with those regulations.

24 “(5) The Secretary shall, within 90 days after the date
25 of enactment of this subsection, prescribe regulations for the
26 request and delivery of form 4473 under paragraph (4).”

1 (b) *PENALTY.*—Section 924 of title 18, United States
2 Code, is amended by adding at the end the following new
3 subsection:

4 “(i) A person who knowingly violates section 922(t)
5 shall be fined not more than \$1,000 (in accordance with
6 section 3571(e)), imprisoned not more than 6 months, or
7 both.”.

8 (c) *DISABILITY.*—Section 922(g)(1) of title 18, United
9 States Code, is amended by inserting “or a violation of sec-
10 tion 922(t)” before the semicolon at the end.

11 **SEC. 4507. BAN OF LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION FEEDING**
12 **DEVICES.**

13 (a) *PROHIBITION.*—Section 922 of title 18, United
14 States Code, as amended by section 4506, is amended by
15 adding at the end the following new subsection:

16 “(u)(1) Except as provided in paragraph (2), it shall
17 be unlawful for a person to transfer or possess a large ca-
18 pacity ammunition feeding device.

19 “(2) This subsection does not apply to—

20 “(A) a transfer to or by, or possession by or
21 under the authority of, the United States or any de-
22 partment or agency of the United States or a State,
23 or a department, agency, or political subdivision of a
24 State;

1 “(B) the lawful transfer or lawful possession of
2 a large capacity ammunition feeding device that was
3 lawfully possessed before the effective date of this sub-
4 section; or

5 “(C) the transfer or possession of a large capac-
6 ity ammunition feeding device by a licensed manufac-
7 turer or licensed importer for the purposes of testing
8 or experimentation authorized by the Secretary.”.

9 (b) DEFINITION OF LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION

10 FEEDING DEVICE.—Section 921(a) of title 18, United
11 States Code, as amended by section 4502(b), is amended
12 by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

13 “(30) The term ‘large capacity ammunition feeding
14 device’—

15 “(A) means—

16 “(i) a magazine, belt, drum, feed strip, or
17 similar device that has a capacity of, or that can
18 be readily restored or converted to accept, more
19 than 10 rounds of ammunition; and

3 **SEC. 4601. SHORT TITLE.**

4 *This title may be cited as the "Recreational Hunting*

6 **SEC. 4602. FINDINGS.**

8 (1) *recreational hunting, when carried out pur-*
