Subject: BIOASSAY RESULTS FOR EMPLOYEE CONTAMINATED WITH DEPLETED URANIUM IN THE FORM OF GREEN SALT (U F_A)

At 1:00 p.m. on December 17, 1980, the Quality Assurance and Safety Supervisor at Nuclear Metals, Inc. reported initial bioassay results for the employee mentioned in PNO-I-80-173. Urine specimens were collected on December 15 (day of the event) and December 16, 1980. The reported results of urinalysis for uranium performed at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology are 8, 7. 7, and 6 micrograms of uranium per liter of urine. These concentrations are 12 percent of the licensee's action guidelines for urinalysis results and are consistent with normal exposures to concentrations of uranium in air at Nuclear Metals, Inc.

The supervisor also reported that discussions with the employee and his coworkers revealed that the employee had been wearing a respirator at the time the depleted uranium as a green salt (U F₄) powder fell into his face. On the basis of this information and the results of urinalysis, it appears that the employee was not exposed to airborne concentrations of uranium in excess of NRC limits. The licensee stated that additional urinalyses would be performed to confirm these results.

A press release is not planned by the licensee nor Region I.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts has been informed.

This PN is issued for information only. The circumstances of this event will be reviewed during a future inspection.
