1	PROCEEDINGS
2	MS. VAN CLEAVE: For the record, this is an
3	interview of John W. Odom, III,
4	date of birth who is
5	employed by Houston Lighting and Power South Texas Project.
6	The date is July 16 1992 and the time is 4:15 p.m.
7	Present at this interview are myself, Virginia Van Cleave,
8	an investigator for the NRC Office of Investigations, and
9	William Baer, attorney with Newman and Holtzinger.
10	This interview is being tape recorded by court
11	reporter Tom Whiteside.
12	Mr. Odom, if you would please stand and raise your
13	right hand.
14	Whereupon,
15	JOHN W. ODOM, III
16	was called as a witness and, having been first duly sworn,
17	was examined and testified as follows:
18	MS. VAN CLEAVE: Before we get into the main body
19	of the interview, I have a few questions that I want to go
20	over regarding Mr. Baer's presence.
21	Does your employer require you to have an attorney
22	present when you talk to the NRC?
23	THE WITNESS: No, ma'am.
24	MS. VAN CLEAVE: Is Mr. Baer acting as your
25	personal representative?

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THE WITNESS: Yes, he is. 1 MS. VAN CLEAVE: Did you select him personally or 2 did your company select him for you? 3 THE WITNESS: Mr. Baer offered his services and I 4 selected him as my attorney. 5 MS. VAN CLEAVE: Mr. Baer, who is your employer? 6 MR. BAER: Newman and Holtzinger. 7 MS. VAN CLEAVE: Are you acting as Mr. Odom's 8 personal representative? 9 MR. BAER: Yes, I am. 10 MS. VAN CLEAVE: Does your firm represent any 11 other party associate with South Texas Project? 12 MR. BAER: Yes, it does. 13 MS. VAN CLEAVE: And do you personally represent 14 any other parties at the South Texas Project? 15 MR. BAER: Yes, I do. 16 MS. VAN CLEAVE: And who is that? 17 MR. BAER: Houston Lighting and Power Company and 18 the other individuals who have been subpoenaed in connection 19 with this investigation. 20 MS. VAN CLEAVE: Do you personally represent 21 Houston Lighting and Power with respect to this interview? 22 MR. BAER: Yes, I do. 23 MS. VAN CLEAVE: Do you believe a potential 24 conflict of interest could arise in the course of this 25

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2	MR. BAER: Well, it is always possible that a
3	potential conflict of interest may arise. At this time I do
4	not foresee such a conflict.
5	MS. VAN CLEAVE: If a potential conflict of
6	interest arises, what will you do?
7	MR. BAER: If a potential conflict arises, I will
8	stop the interview, I will consult with Mr. Odom and we will
9	discuss how to proceed at that time.
10	MS. VAN CLEAVE: Mr. Odom, do you understand that
11	Mr. Baer represents other parties associated with the South
12	Texas Project?
13	THE WITNESS: Yes, I do.
14	MS. VAN CLEAVE: And what is your understanding of
15	who will pay Mr. Baer's fee?
16	THE WITNESS: Houston Lighting and Power.
17	MS. VAN CLEAVE: With that understanding, do you
18	still want Mr. Baer as your representative?
19	THE WITNESS: I do.
20	EXAMINATION
21	BY MS. VAN CLEAVE:
22	Q Mr. Odom, what is your current position with South
23	Texas Project?
24	A I am the nuclear human resources manager.
25	Q So does that mean you are the overall manager of

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what used to be considered personnel?

A That's correct. Personnel services, employment recruiting, compensation and benefits personnel type functions, that's correct.

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Q And how long have you held that position?

5

6 A Approximately four and a half years. I assumed 7 the position on December 16th 1987.

8 Q And prior to that were you employed by Houston
9 Lighting and Power?

- 10 A Yes, I was.
- 11 Q Were you onsite here?

A No, I was not. I was the compensation and benefits manager for Houston Lighting and Power located in Electric Tower in Houston.

15 Q How long have you been employed by HP&L?

16 A I was employed November 4th 1968. It will be 24 17 years in November.

18 Q As I'm sure you are aware, I'm here to look into 19 the circumstances surrounding the revocation of access of an 20 individual named Thomas Saporito.

21 My first question, and I recognize because 22 everyone tells me that it's a general question, is when did 23 you first become aware of Mr. Saporito?

24AWhen did I become aware of Mr. Saporito?25QYes. I mean did you know him? Had you run into

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him prior to his filing his 2.206 petition? Did you know 1 him at all? Did you have -- You were the head of personnel. 2 Did you have any dealings with him prior to that time? 3 No, I did not. A 4 When did you first learn of his existence, if you 5 0 6 will? The first time I saw Mr. Saporito's name was on 7 A the 2.206. I saw a FAXed copy. I do not know the exact 8 date. It was prior to February 21st. That's what my 9 calendar indicated his access was revoked. It was the day 10 I saw (him name on the 2.206. that we received the 2.206. 11 Where did you see the 2.206? 12 0 I was in the executive area and I was involved in A 13 a meeting and we were told that we had received a 2.206 for 14 Mr. Saporito. 15 Who told you that? 0 16 I was in a meeting with -- as I recall, it was Mr. 17 À Hall, Mr. Jump, myself and Mr. Kinsey and I do not recall 18 who else was in that meeting. That was in late afternoon. 19 Whose office was it in? 0 20 It was in Mr. Hall's office. A 21 Were you called into his office to attend this Q 22 meeting? 23 I was present in the area and I don't know exactly 24 A why I was in the area and then I was called in the office. 25

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1 Q I guess what I'm asking you is was your presence 2 kind of accidental in this meeting? You were kind of going 3 down the hall and did somebody call you in, or were you 4 specifically in the area to attend the meeting regarding the 5 2.206?

A I was not in the area to attend the meeting on the 2.206. I was in the area. I do not know exactly why. I was then handed a copy of the 2.206 and then I was asked to come into Mr. Hall's office.

Q And why were you asked to attend this meeting?
What would be your function regarding a 2.206?

12 A At that time, background investigations, the 13 background group and the central processing was part of my 14 organization. The processing facility was part of the human 15 resources organization.

16 Q And how did that relate to the 2.206?

17 A That I do not know. I do not know why I was 18 informed. I don't know.

19 Q Did anyone ask you if you knew this individual -20 Mr. Saporito?

21 A No.

22 Q Did anyone ask you for his nuclear file or 23 personnel records or anything like that?

A I left the office and I requested the nuclear file be delivered to me. I wanted to see the nuclear file on Mr.

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2	Q Why?
3	A I wanted to know the individual. I wanted to get
4	a little background on the individual that filed a 2.206.
5	That was my primary interest.
6	Q Did anyone ask you to do that?
7	A Nobody asked me, no. I asked one of my employees
8	that was present in the area to get the file for me.
9	Q Who was that?
10	A Bob Smith.
11	Q And did he then bring you the file?
12	A Bob Smith called the central processing facility.
13	Janie Hobbins, who was the supervisor, hand-carried the file
14	over to me.
15	Q The record reflects that his nuclear file was
16	checked out on February 11th 1992. Do you think that would
17	be the date of the meeting? It was checked out by Mr.
18	Smith.
19	I should say approximately. The records are
20	incomplete on checking out that file.
21	A I do not know the exact date.
22	Q During this meeting that you said you attended
23	with Mr. Hall, Mr. Kinsey and Mr. Jump, did you receive any
24	instructions as to any action you should take regarding this
25	2.206, or regarding Mr. Saporito?

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A I received no specific instructions or actions. During that meeting and the following meeting the next morning, I think it was emphasized the confidentiality of this issue and Mr. Jump was assigned the task of coordinating the efforts for the 2.206 and we were to support Mr. Jump in whatever he needed. Those were the only specific actions I know.

8 Q To your knowledge had there been a 2.206 filed 9 here at Houston Lighting and Power before this one?

10

A I do not know.

11 Q I guess I still can't really understand your role 12 in the 2.206.

A Part of the access authorization program which included the background investigations, fitness for duty program, did belong to me, as far as my department. I do not know exactly why I was part of that discussion but that was the assumption I made.

18 Q Because of some of the concerns raised in the 19 2.206, is that what you mean?

20 A They were general type concerns and I think they 21 dealt with some of the security issues. I can't remember 22 the specifics of the 2.206. I did not have any actions in 23 that.

Q When you got Mr. Saporito's nuclear file, you have said that you reviewed it. Did you give it to anyone else?

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Mr. Kinsey was present. Mr. Kinsey did review the 1 A file. I later turned the file over to Mr. Jump who was the 2 program project coordinator of the 2.206. Yes, I did turn 3 it over to him. 4 Q When you say you turned it over to him, what do 5 you mean? 6 I gave him the file. A 7 And did he keep it? 0 8 Yes, he did. A 9 How long? 0 10 That I can't recall. I remember getting it back 11 A and we did give it back to central processing or I gave it 12 to Bob Smith to get back to central processing but I do now 13 know exactly how long we had the file. 14 Do you recall did you give it to Mr. Jump that 15 Q same day, that same evening? 16 I believe it was that same evening outside --17 A Well, Jump and I both smoke and we stepped outside and I did 18 turn the file over to him as we smoked a cigarette. 19 Outside outside or outside someone's office? Q 20 Outside the building. 21 A Outside the building? 22 0 In the rear, right. 23 A And he kept it? 24 0 Yes, he did. A 25

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The records reflect the file was returned to (1 0 central processing Mr. Smith on February 20th of 1992. 2 3 Now Mr. Smith has stated you returned it to him somewhere around the 14th to the 17th of February -- two to 4 three days after you received it and two to three days 5 6 before he turned it in, so I've reconstructed that to mean about the 14th to the 17th. 7 8 Do you recall when you gave it back to Mr. Smith? No, I don't. I cannot remember when I gave that 9 A back to him, no. 10 11 0 Did you receive it from Mr. Jump? Yes. That's my recollection. That's what I 12 A 13 recall. 14 Do you recall whether or not you kept it your 0 possession for any length of time or if you gave it 15 relatively quickly to Mr. Smith? 16 17 A I do not remember one way or the other. I would 18 under normal conditions return that immediately to him to be 19 placed back in CPF, but I do not remember what I did. 20 0 Did you give Mr. Smith any instructions regarding 21 the file when you did return it to him? None that I recall, other than return it to the 22 A 23 central processing facility. That's the only thing I can 24 recall. 25 He has stated that you told him to hold onto it Q

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for a little while because licensing might need it again.
 Do you recall that?

A No, I don't. That doesn't surprise me if Bob says that. That is possible that that happened. I don't remember it that way exactly. I don't remember that one way or the other but that is possible that I did instruct him to do that.

8 Q You may not be able to answer this if you don't 9 recall that, but why would you think licensing might have 10 needed it again?

A I don't know. I don't know other than just an assumption that they may need it again. I don't know. I do not recall telling Bob to do that, but it's possible that I did.

15 Q Did Mr. Jump say anything to you when he returned 16 it to you?

17 A No, he did not.

18 Q So he didn't ask you to hold onto it or to keep it 19 out?

20 A No, I don't remember him asking me to do that, no, 21 because it was -- I had turned it over to him. I don't know 22 any reason he would ask me to hold it. He could have kept 23 it a few more days if he had needed it.

24QDo you know Mr. Saporito? Have you met him?25ANo, I have not.

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1	Q Have you ever talked to him on the phone or
2	anything like that?
3	A No.
4	Q Did you ever receive any correspondence from him?
5	A No, I have not.
6	Q Did you attend any more meetings or have any other
ż	conversations regarding Mr. Saporito's 2.206?
8	A Yes. I attended a meeting when Bill Baer was
9	present. I believe Wayne Harrison in licensing conducted -
10	-I believe it Wayne Harrison conducted the meeting and it
11	had to do with responses to the 2.206 and actions that
12	people carried out of there.
13	I believe Dick Balcom I recall he being there
14	and myself, Wayne Harrison and Bill Baer. I don't recall
15	the other participants.
16	That's the only meeting I mentioned the evening
17	meeting and the following morning that we had a meeting and
18	that meeting and that's the only meetings that I've
19	attended.
20	Q Were you assigned any responsibility in any of
21	those meetings to respond to any particular aspects of the
22	2.206?
23	A No, I was not.
24	Q Were you requested to attend those meetings?
25	A Yes, I was.

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And why were you asked to attend those meetings? 0 1 That I don't know other than possibly I had 2 A attended the original meeting and that again my assumption 3 is the background investigation files, nuclear files, 4 resided in my central processing facility. 5 And you did not attend any -- Well, you presented, 0 6 me with one page from a calendar and it says Walt Honson 7 access denial February 21st and you stated that that refers 8 to Mr. Saporito, is that correct? 9 That is correct. A 10 So before this date, February 21st -- Let me 0 11 12 rephrase that. Between what I believe to be February 12th when 13 you had a morning meeting and then this meeting that you 14 mentioned with Mr. Harrison, did you attend any other 15 meetings in which Mr. Saporito --16 None that I can recall, no. A 17 Did you have any conversations with Mr. Jump about 0 18 Mr. Saporito? 19 I recall Mr. Jump telling me prior to my meeting 20 Mitt Hinson with Walt Henson that he had requested that security conduct 21 an investigation and I was aware walt Hinson, the 22 investigations manager, was conducting an investigation on 23 Mr. Saporito's background. I don't recall when that 24 conversation took place. It was very close to the 21st. 25

1 That's about all I can remember.

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Why were you informed of that?

A I got the impression -- again this is an opinion -- that there was information that could be considered I guess contradictory, information that was in the background investigation file or the security file. Mr. Saporito's employment history was one area.

8 Q What is your role in adjudication of employees and 9 any subsequent actions such as denial or revocation of 10 access?

A On access denial and the access authorization program, I have no function. I do have signature authority on badge transaction forms, and HL&P employees I have some authority, but Mr. Saporito is a contractor so I had no authority in the adjudication process.

16 Q Then why did you attend the meeting with Mr. 17 Henson on Mr. Saporito's access denial?

18 A I was presented a badge transaction form by Mr.
 19 Henson revoking Mr. Saporito's access.

20 Q When?

21 A On the 21st of February.

22 Q Were you notified prior to that time?

23 A Yes, ma'am.

24 Q When?

25 A The night before, on the 20th, somewhere in the

neighborhood of 8:00 or 9:00 o'clock, I was called at my apartment to ask if I would be available Friday morning by Dick Balcom, and said that they were revoking Mr. Saporito's access and would I be available on the 21st at 8:00 o'clock *Hinkdow* to meet with Mr. *Henso*n to sign the badge transaction, *form* removing his badge from the east gatehouse.

7 Q You said you have signature authority. Is it 8 standard for you to sign these forms?

A Yes, I sign those daily.

10 Q So there was nothing unusual about him calling you 11 at home?

A No. Oh, calling me at home? My understanding from Dick was he was not going to be onsite the next day and wanted to make sure somebody was here that had signature authority and he called me.

16 Q How many people have signature authority? Do you 17 know?

A The direct reports to Mr. Hall, the plant manager. I don't know exactly. There is a list that's published that shows those individuals.

21

9

Q Are there several of them?

A Approximately ten, I would say, or more probably.
 Q Do you know why you were contacted regarding Mr.
 Saporito?

25

A Dick indicated that several people were going to

be off the project Friday. On Friday sometimes, according to him there's not a lot of people here. I think he just checked with me. I've been -- I have signed a lot of transactions lately. I think people know that I am available to do that if they need it. All I know is Dick just called me to make sure somebody was here.

Q Did he explain the circumstances surrounding the
decision to revoke Mr. Saporito's access?

A Not that I recall. He did tell me that he was going to -- his badge had been revoked and Mr. Henson brought the transaction form. I then asked him prior to signing if he would brief me on his investigation and I did review his investigation file prior to signing the transaction form revoking it.

Q What did his investigation file consist of?
A He had -- I believe it was a 210 appeal case from
Florida that, according to Mr. Hisson, indicated some
employment discrepancies. He had his interview notes from
Mr. Saporito's interview.

He did tell me that he did sit down and interview Mr. Saporito, and his conclusions were that Mr. Saporito omitted, willfully omitted information on his background.

Q Is it standard for you to ask for some specific
 information regarding an access denial or revocation?
 A I would never sign an access denial without proper

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backup or see the information myself. 1 Were you satisfied with the information that Mr. 2 INSON son gave you? 3 Absolutely. 4 A Did you believe that access revocation was a 5 0 proper course of action in this case? 6 Absolutely. 7 A The forms -- I have two forms and I would like you 8 0 to explain them, if you wouldn't mind. I can't quite 9 understand them. They are both transaction forms. They 10 have different dates and they say different things up at the 11 top for reason for action. 12 Is that your signature on both of them? 13 That's correct. That's the 21st. That was the A 14 revocation. Yes, I remember signing that. 15 The page behind it is another form. Can you 0 16 explain why there are two of these and what they mean? 17 Yes. This was placing the badge on hold. I'm A 18 trying to rack my memory cells on this one. 19 This placed the badge on hold and this revoked it, 20 had it removed from the east gatehouse. 21 Do you recall signing two separate forms? 22 0 Yes, but I don't remember the sequence. That's A 23 what I'm trying to get -- I do not remember the sequence. 24 This was placing the badge on hold and this was revoking the 25

 the sequence.

3

Q What does placing the badge on hold mean?

4

5

A We generally -- If there is information, an investigation going on that's -- We do it in personnel work.

For instance, if we have an investigation on an
employee that's possible wrongdoing -- well, not wrongdoing
as defined by NRC but wrongdoing as opposed to company
policy -- we could have a badge placed on hold pending the
outcome of the investigation.

In this particular case, it was a security investigation and we have placed badges on hold pending the outcome.

14

Q Do you recall signing --

A No, I do not and that's bothering me because I do not remember signing that particular form. I definitely *Watt HinSur* remember the meeting with Walt Henson on this, revoking the access.

19 Q There are two dates on that other form and one of 20 them --

21 A And it's been lined through and initialed by me.

22 Q Does that appear to be your initials?

23 A Absolutely.

24 Q You had stated earlier that you did not recall any 25 discussion about Mr. Saporito's adjudication until Mr.

 of the 20th and that was one of my questions, but if the
 date initially was the 20th, you can't --

A No, I do not, other than the date I signed this was the 21st and I signed it on the 21st and wrote 20th and then lined through it and initialed on the 21st. I don't know.

8 Q But you said you met -- Your calendar indicates 9 you met with Mr. Henson -- Q 10 A On the 21st.

11 Q -- on the 21st at 8:00 o'clock. Why would you 12 need to put his badge on hold on the 21st?

13 A That I don't -- I don't remember this particular

14 form. I really don't. I notice that Walt lined through (

16 Q So you don't recall signing this form putting Mr.
17 Saporito's badge on hold on the 20th of February? It that
18 accurate that you do not recall?

A I do not recall. I do not recall signing this
form. I have a very good memory of this prior to signing
this particular form.

22 Q And does that appear to be your signature on that 23 second form?

24

A Yes, it does and those are my initials.

25 Q Would there be any purpose for signing a second

1 form on the 21st if at 8:00 in the morning you signed a form 2 revoking his access?

A The only thing I can think of was from an administrative, for security to have somebody that they had placed his badge on hold the night before and to get my signature on the transaction form. I do not know.

Q Could they place his badge on hold without
8 someone's authorization signature?

9 A Yes. The security manager can place his badge on 10 hold.

11 Q Would they need an authorization signature to 12 complete the procedure?

13 A As far as revocation?

14 Q No, that second form, the placing the badge on 15 hold.

16 A I am not that familiar with or procedure on that.

18 Q But to your knowledge, Mr. Balcom could have 19 placed Mr. Saporito's badge on hold without an authorization 20 signature from you or one of the other ten?

21 A That is my understanding. I wish I could explain 22 this better, but I can't.

- 23 Q You just don't recall?
- 24 A I don't recall.

25 Q Do you recall signing two forms, two separate

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1 forms for Mr. Saporito?

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2	A No, I don't. I'm trying to search my memory cells
3	and that I do not recall. Again, I do remember the meeting
4	and the discussion this, approximately a 30-minute meeting.
5	Q With Mr. Harson?
6	A Yes.
7	Q And does the standard procedure for him if he
8	wanted to revoke access on an individual, is it the standard
9	procedure for Mr. Hensen to meet with you or one of the
10	other nine people
11	A Right.
12	Q and bring an access transaction form with him?
13	Is that standard procedure? Who fills this out?
14	A Whoever is the requester. In this particular Must Hinson He was requesting the transaction
15	to take place.
17	Yes, generally the requester is the one that
18	brings it or a designated person within their organization.
	We have certain revocations for instance, if it's not for
19	
20	cause, RIFs, they would normally hand-carry those to me.
21	In this particular case, Mr. Nenson was the
22	requester and he hand-carried it to me.
23	Q Do you have any input or could you have any input
24	into the decision whether or not to revoke or to deny
25	access?

You said you would not sign the form until you 1 2 understood the circumstances surrounding the decision. That's correct. 3 A If you were unhappy with the explanation, could 4 Q 5 you or whoever ask that additional investigation be performed, additional information be provided to you? 6 7 Absolutely. Primarily in the employment area we have terminated HL&P employees, conducted investigations and 8 9 I have requested additional information, yes. 10 Had I not been comfortable or agreed or concurred HINSON with the conclusion that Mr. neon had, I would not have 11 signed this form and would requested it go back for further 12 investigation. 13 Have you ever taken that kind of action regarding 14 0 a contractor employee, as Mr. Saporito was? 15 No, ma'am, not that I can recall. 16 A 17 Do you recall signing other transaction forms, 0 18 access transaction forms on contractor employees? 19 A Quite a few, yes, ma'am. 20 How about for cause? 0 21 No, ma'am. This is the only one that I can recall A 22 that I had for a contractor for cause. 23 Do you know who usually signs the authorization on Q contractor --24 25 Let me correct that, ma'am. May I correct that? A

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a.	

Sure.

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In the fitness for duty program, I have signed 2 A badge transaction forms revoking access under fitness for 3 duty failures. 4 What about for adjudication procedures? 5 0 None that I can recall. 6 A And do you know who usually -- if there is such an 7 0 individual -- signs the authorization for revocation or 8 9 denial in those cases? No. I do not. Security would do the investigation 10 A and, again, one of the authorized ten people or whoever 11 would sign the badge transaction form. 12 Does Mr. Jump have authority to sign? 0 13 To my knowledge he does, yes. The last list I A 14 saw, he did. 15 And a list of the individuals who can sign that is 16 0 available? 17 Yes, ma'am. Would you like me to --18 A I may ask for that after the conclusion of this 19 0 interview. 20 In this case, though, you've stated that Mr. 21 Balcom called you and told you that a number of people were 22 not going to be available the next day. 23 That was my understanding, yes. A 24 HINSON And Mr. Hensen then met with you and you discussed 25 0

1

the situation, you signed the form, you gave it back to him.

2 Did you have any further involvement in Mr.
3 Saporito's case?

I'm still not too sure how human resources fits into this. I know that there is a delineation between HL&P employees and contractor employees and I understand that human resources has the authority and responsibility for the HL&P employees.

9 Did you have any further involvement in Mr.
10 Saporito's case as the director of human resources? Do you
11 help process him out or anything like that?

A Yes, we do. Since we had that -- At that particular time, the central processing facility and the fitness for duty program -- the central processing consisted of in and out processing and coordination of that, and the background investigations section so, yes, my organization did process Mr. Saporito out.

18 Q What's the standard procedure that Mr. Henson 19 would have followed?

A Mr. Saporito would have been escorted -- it's my
 understanding -- Are you talking about the way we would
 physically handle processing?

23 Q Yes. He's got this form now. You've authorized 24 revocation of Mr. Saporito's access. I guass Mr. Henson 25 took it somewhere so I'm just trying to get an understanding

2	How would Mr. Menson then proceed since he was the
3	requester in this case? As I understand it
4	· A The normal process of my understanding is that Mr. 4
5	Henson would hand-carry that to the east gatehouse and that
6	would be entered into the security system and then Mr.
ż	Saporito's badge would also be taken out of the rack and
8	they would make a notation in the security system computer
9	and then Mr. Saporito would be processed out of South Texas
10	through the central processing facility.
11	Q Did you have any further dealings with Mr.
12	Saporito's access revocation?
13	No, ma'am.
14	Q Did you have any further conversations with anyone
15	regarding Mr. Saporito's access revocation?
16	A We have currently a 210 complaint that we're
17	dealing with. I've had discussions in that regard. We are
18	addressing the Section 210 complaint at this time.
19	I do not recall any discussions regarding the
20	2.206 or the access authorization, no.
21	Q I guess you discussed it with Mr. Baer?
22	A Yes, with my attorney, that's correct. I'm sorry.
23	If that's what you're referring to.
24	Q I'm just referring to any discussions.
25	A I have had discussions with Bill Baer.

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1 Q Are you familiar with the adjudication process at 2 all?

A The past adjudication process? No, ma'am, I'm not that familiar with that.

5 Q You said that to the best of your knowledge this 6 was the only time that you had signed as authorization for a 7 contractor employee as a result of an adjudication process 8 and investigation.

9 Did you believe that this action was consistent
10 with the standard practice at this plant?

11 A Yes, and the standard practice for Houston 12 Lighting and Power. Yes, I do. I did then and I do now.

Q What made you believe that? What did you base your belief on? I say "did," when you made your decision here to sign this form, what did you base that belief on?

16 A Basically on the practice that we have followed 17 regarding employment practices in the company and our 18 dealings with security in the past when we had similar 19 investigations.

20 My department personnel will conduct an 21 investigation, and we have done that in parallel with 22 security, regarding information that we've received that 23 doesn't match the employment application. 24 We have terminated HP&L employees and security has 25 worked in parallel with us on the same issue they -- they

have been looking at access and we were looking at
 employment.

The information that Mr. Henson provided to me was consistent and the action we took was consistent with the way we've handled our employment practices and access in the past, that I'm aware of.

Q You said that you sometimes conduct investigations
in parallel. Is that only HL&P employees or does that
include contractor employees?

A That would be HL&P employees.

11 Q Only?

12 A Only.

13 Q Have you received any instructions from anyone 14 about how to respond to questions regarding Mr. Saporito's 15 termination or access revocation?

16 A Explain that again. I'm sorry I missed it.

17 Q Have you received any instructions on how to 18 respond to any questions regarding Mr. Saporito's access 19 revocation?

A Regarding this interview? Are you referencing
this interview?

Q No, just in general.

A I've been -- I was instructed, specifically by Don
Hall in a meeting with Will Jump, Warren Kinsey -- that
meeting I mentioned earlier -- to handle this in a

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1	confidential manner and to support Mr. Jump's efforts in

з	I've received.
4	2 But that didn't have anything to do with Mr.
5	Saporito's access revocation.

19	Q We've discussed a few meetings and a few
20	conversations. Are there any other meetings or any
21	conversations you can think of that you were a party to
22	where the method of or the reason for revoking Mr.
23	Saporito's access was discussed?
24	A None that I can recall. The two meetings I had in
25	Mr. Hall's office. I had the one short meeting with Mr.

Jump that I mentioned and Mr. Henson and then the one phone call from Dick Balcom. That's all I can recall as far as specific to the 2.206 and the access.

4 Now that does exclude the 210 litigation that we 5 currently have. $\mu_{1}q\rho_{5}'$

6 Q What is the HP&L's general policy regarding 7 providing information former employees to prospective 8 employers who call and ask for a reference?

9 We have a policy that clearly lines out the A company and STP position on that. We do require a release 10 from an employee to provide information other than we will 11 provide employment dates and the position the person held at 12 the time they left. Any other information we do require a 13 release and it has to be -- an HL&P employee has to come 14 resources through the human sources department for review. 15

Q What about a contractor employee?

A The policy also addresses that, that we have now
recently become the point and we will work with the
departments, but we do want a release.

20 Q From either an HL&P employee or a contractor 21 employee?

22

That is correct.

A

Q What about back in March and April timeframe?
A We did not have a policy that addressed
contractors specifically. We currently do.

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1

Q What practice did you engage in?

2 Dur practice and our advice that we have given 3 site management is do not release any information on any ex-4 employee, ex site employee, without coming through and 5 getting advice from human resources.

6 We do get office of -- I can't remember the name 7 of it -- I dealt with the lady the other day that she's 8 trying to get information. I have asked her for a release 9 on a prior contractor.

10 We do tell site management to contact us if in 11 doubt and we will coordinate that.

12 Q Are you aware of a prospective employer of Mr. 13 Saporito contacting the site, attempting to get information 14 regarding Mr. Saporito's access revocation?

15 A No, I don't. There was -- My personnel services 16 manager did make me aware of a phone call to Mr. DeLong but 17 that was after - No, that was while he was here, regarding 18 Mr. Saporito. We were made aware of that.

19 Q Who was -- you said your personnel --

A Betty Brown. She is currently working with the
21 210 complaint. She's handling the coordination of that.

Q This company, which is NSS out of Pennsylvania, did send at least one FAX and possibly two here to the site asking for information regarding Mr. Saporito's access revocation. Apparently there was never a response made.

 - A No, I'm not.

- Q Who would ordinarily handle something like that?
 A Was it a suitable inquiry?

5 Q One of them went to Mr. Woods and I believe that 6 one went to someone in personnel. I'm not sure who the 7 individual was.

8 A I'm not aware of that. That would normally be 9 handled out of the central processing facility. Janie 10 Hobbins coordinates that.

11 Q They were trying to obtain information as to why 12 Mr. Saporito's access was revoked and I have seen the FAX, 13 and in fact there was one here -- I have a copy of that.

Here's one of them. This is the one that went to
Andy Woods. Is there a date on there -- March 30 '92,
asking -- As you can see, it's asking for specific
information, not just fitness for duty or dates of
employment. Are you familiar with this request?

A No, I'm not. I've not seen that before.

20 Q If Mr. Woods was uncomfortable with this, who if 21 anyone would he contact in human resources concerning 22 relating this kind of information to another company? There 23 is a release behind it signed by Mr. Saporito.

24 A He would contact Betty Brown, who is the manager 25 of personnel relations in my department.

1 Q Would she ordinarily inform you of a request like
2 this?

A No, not necessarily. In most cases, no, I would never know about that. It would be something that would be followed in her normal scope.

6 Ms. Brown was not aware of the Saporito 2.206 7 issue. She was later made aware of the 210. No, I would 8 not receive that.

9 Q If you got a request for information as to why 10 someone's access was revoked or denied and they signed a 11 release, a general release, would you ordinarily provide 12 that information to a requesting potential employer?

13

A Yes, we can provide that.

14 Q You can provide that but you are not aware of this 15 particular situation.

16

A No, I am not.

17 Q Do you think that Betty Brown would be someone who 18 might have some information regarding this situation?

19 A The situation regarding --

20 Q This -- Apparently NSS attempted to get 21 information regarding Mr. Saporito's access revocation and 22 were unable to do so and I would just like to know what the 23 standard procedure is and why the information apparently was 24 not provided.

What do you mean by that? 8 A As far as our preparation for the Department of 9 Labor. 10 Are there additional notes that you have made that 0 11 are not --12 A I have none in my possession, no. Are there additional notes that you have made in 13 0 the past that are somewhere else, that may not in your 14 15 possession now but maybe are in Ms. Brown's possession 16 because she's preparing for a response to the 210? 17 A No. 18 0 Did you make any notes? 19 A No, I did not. 20 So you didn't make any notes regarding your 0 interactions with Mr. Rensen or Mr. Balcom concerning Mr. 21 22 Saporito, is that correct? 23 That is correct. 18	in any manner or offered you any rewards in return for this

20	THE WITNESS: No, ma'am.
21	MS. VAN CLEAVE: Is there anything further you
22	would care to add for the record?
23	THE WITNESS: Nothing that I can think of.
24	MS. VAN CLEAVE: The interview is concluded.
