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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: This is a closed meeting to continue our deliberations on the TMI-1 restart, and it is closed on Exemption No. 10 which relates to judicial activities. I do not know if anyone has any comment on that, but that is the basis on which we will go.

During the break I wrote down four areas in which I believe the Commission has to make some decisions.

First, with regard to the GPU v. B&W trial record based on the exhibits that were prepared but not introduced into the trial. I think we have to agree on what we want to get out of it, the purpose; what guidance we want to give to the staff on the approach and whether or not we approve having it being done by NRR and, must this be done before restart. That is all under the area of GPU v. B&W trial record.

The second area is management integrity. As I understand the Board proposal, it is looking to the new information to identify if any changes ought to be made in the Board decision. New sources of information are the investigation --

> COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: What Board? COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: The Appeal Board.

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: It was Appeal Board licensing.

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COMMISSIONER AREARNE: Now, you said the Board proposal --

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I am sorry, the Licensing Board decision. Is there an Appeal Board decision, also?

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: There is an Appeal Board order that has scheduled oral argument for next months on whether to re-open the record on management competence and integrity based upon a number of items of . information.

> CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I didn't address that. COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: OKAY.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I was thinking of the Licensing Board decision.

16 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: The original Licensing 17 Board decision?

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Yes.

19 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: what is that? Could you 20 just read that again?

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: well, all I have is notes 22 here. Management integrity. I was going on the basis that we do have a Licensing Board decision. 23

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Right.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: New information is being

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developed.

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COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Right.

14	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: is considering
	re-opening the issue.
15	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Complicated it putting
16	it mildly.
17	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, okay. Sometimas I
18	put it mildly.
19	
20	The fourth question is, do we want to make a
	partial initial decision.
21	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: what was the third
22	question?
23	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I am sorry. The third one:
24	
25	Should the staff review the GPU proposal, make comments
	on it, consider it in its revalidation, or make other

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1	recommendations to the Commission
2	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Have we gotten any
3	requests for appearances before the Commission on the
4	part of GPU or anyone else? Are they satisfied with their
5	letter proposal?
6	MR. LEVI: Not formally, no.
7	MR. PLAINE: NOT formally. I don't think anyone
8	else did.
9	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Joe has got his mouth

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1 OPE and OGC to do -- I guess primarily OPE -- was to look 2 at what the schedule would be like if we were to wait for 3 everything. 4 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes. 3 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: That is what I gave you a 6 first cut at yesterday, and we have a revised cut here 7 today. There are some places where it says "To be 8 determined" and OPE made a guess at what the date might 9 be. 10 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes. 11 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: So, when we get to that 12 question or whenever you feel you would like to look at 13 it, we can review the schedule. 14 I did put another category, "Other," and the 15 only thing I put under there was that the staff wanted to 16 review HRH and BEDA documents before they make a 17 decision. 18 So, I would propose -- I am open to any other 19 reasonable suggestions. I would propose that we start 20 with discussion of the GPU v. 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1 willing to accept Dirck's proposal to separate. 2 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes. 3 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: As far as the Commission 4 accepts Dircks's proposal to do that separation, then you 5 approach the review of the B&W file record one way and 6 if you don't accept it, you may have ---CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Just plain a separation. I 8 nave trouble in understanding what the separation is. 9 COMMISSIONER AMEARNE: I think Vic put it 10 exactly correctly. 11 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: What is that? 12 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: If you accept a 13 separation it is an attempt to finesse so that you do not 14 nave to then address whether or not the investigations and a review of the trial record has to be done. 15 1. March States 16 COMMISSIONER ROBERTS: Say that again, John. 17 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I think Vic's 18 description was accurate. He used the word "finesse" and 19 Bill agreed to it. That it is an attempt to finesse the 20 issue of having investigations and review the trial 21 record being required to be completed before addressing restart. ž	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: My reading of what they
5	proposed, and then the meeting yesterday that GPU had
6	with the staff, I conclude what they are essentially
. *	saying is that, "We will put aside as many people as you
8	want and will bring in fillers so that at some stage you
9	can agree that all of these on-going reviews need not be
10	completed prior to restart.
11	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Right.
12	COMMISSIONER AMEARNE: Vic is right that those
13	reviews would even ally have to be completed if they
14	want to bring those people back in-
15	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: It would be done with
16	the plant in a reg base, is really the point.
17	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes.
18	COMMISSIONER AMEARNE: That, I think, is the
19	clearest way to describe what the staff's proposal is. In
20	other words, its acction is what is clear about it.
21	
22	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Procedurally, though, what would take place would be that the Commission would
23	identify the individuals about whom there is controversy
24	and they would not be permitted to participate in TMI?
25	
	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I expect the way the
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1 proposal would end up being that if the staff would 2 propose, "Here is an agreed position between GPU and 3 staff. Here are all the people that have been identified ŝ and here is a new organization structure in which they do 5 not have direct involvement for TMI-1 and will not until 6 the conclusion of investigations that affect them." ÷ CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: And the staff would 8 identify them by names. 9 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Yes. 10 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Right. 11 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: And we would approve it? 12 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Well that is, you see --13 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Oh, you have to. 14 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE! Yes. And the staff's 15 A Longitude in proposal did take a cut at that. They did identify by 16 name all those people. 17 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, but some of them 18 were new. Then I don't think they intended for us to --19 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, they simply 20 listed everyone. 21 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: well, not everybody. 22 COMMINSIONER GILINSKY: In fact, they didn't even list some of the people in the room. 23 21 (Laughter) 28 COMMISSIONER AMEARNE: Thaat's right.

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1 MR. PLAINE: Mr. Chairman, with your permission 2 a question. 3 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Yes. 4 MR. PLAINE: It is really addressed to 5 Commissioner Ahearne. I need a little refreshing on the 6 history of this. 1 As I recall, when we got to the point of 8 Stello having made his review and possibly before it, I 9 think it was you that suggested that we really ought to 10 look at all of these records that were being examined. 11 COMMISSIONER ABLARNE: Correct. 12 MR. PLAINE: Do you remember what it was that 13 your purpose was in --14 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Gh, very clear. Very 15 clear because my purpose was also very clear and when I 16 asked for Stello to review it and it was very clear when 17 I asked your predecessor as General Counsel to keep track 18 of the court case in which -- and I was told that was too big a job for General Counsel to track the court case. 19 20 (Simultaneous conversations) 21 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I was concerned that 22 there was new information having to do with what happened 23 at the time of the accident that would change, modify our 21 understanding of that accident. 25 MR. PLAINE: For litigation purposes?

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1 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Actually, this might 2 seem strange. But no, it was just for understanding. 3 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Intellectual purposes. 4 (Laughter) 5 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Because, see, I felt that much of the changes in our regulations and the 6 philosophy of operation of the NRC as well as much of the 7 industry came about as a result of TMI. We thought we 8 9 understood as best as possible what had happened, how did that accident happen? 10 11 I didn't want to lose the opportunity while 12 there still were enough people around who still 13 remembered what was known to have an examination of this 14 new body of data, would that modify it. That was my 15 concern. 16 MR. PLAINE: Can I take it then you didn't tie 17 it in with the TMI restart? 18 COMMISSIONER AREARNE: I tied it to neither TMI 19 restart nor litigation. 20 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: It was I who tied it to 21 TMI restart. I asked Sue to look into --20 MR. PLAINE: What was that? 23 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: It was I who tied that 24 record --25 MR. PLAINE: I am talking about that 70 feet of

2	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Oh, this latter part.
3	MR. PLAINE: Yes, it was on that. That was a
4	special requirement after everything else was
5	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Right. I asked for that.
6	MR. PLAINE: Yes. But it wasn't tied to the
1	restart. Is that correct?
8	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: That's correct.
9	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: It was tied to
10	restart as far as my support of that request was
11	concerned, and I think Victor feels the same way.
12	MR. PLAINE: So, in other words, from your
13	standpoint, then, it would have been something that you
14	would want to see finished before a restart, even an
15	immediate effectiveness decision was made?
16	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: when I said I tied it
17	to restart I meant, I tied the question of looking into
18	the B&W record in my request to you to the restart.
19	MR. PLAINE: No, I wasn't talking of that. I
20	was talking about the extra documents.
21	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, that was the one
22	request I made.
23	MR. PLAINE: NO, I am talking about the extra
21	documents, sir, the documents
25	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: The ones after.

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COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: NO, I understand. CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, is that still your purpose in reviewing the others?

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COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: That's right. Yes. CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: However, Commissioners Asselstine and Gilinsky at least feel that --

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: My feeling was that there may be information in those documents that relate to the issues that were in controversy in the restart proceeding, and I gather at least some information has already been identified that fits into that category. .

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: What purpose would you characterize -- how would you characterize what we are doing?

what would you say is the purpose of doing 15 16 this latter review?

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Simply to make 18 certain within reasonable bounds that there isn't 19 information which the Commission had and which had been 20 identified as being in existence that would affect 21 restart without us at least having taken a look at it. In essence, to avoid embarrassment. 20

23 I think it would be embarrassing for the Commission to issue a decision on restart only to find 21 25 cut that the Commission had available to it information

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that would have affected those decisions.

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: And when you say affecting restart, are you thinking both from the safety standpoint and management, or just safety standpoint?

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I am thinking in terms of both the issues that are in controversy in the proceeding. That is, is there information in those documents that we did not know about before that affects those issues, or presumably anything else that would affect the safety of the operation of the plant.

But my principal concern was the first point. That is, is there information there that is directly relevant to the issues that are in controversy in the proceeding, that we knew the documents were available to us but that we didn't bother to review them before we reached a decision.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I know John raised a question that in his mind he couldn't answer, all the questions on GPU v. B&W trial record unless he knew how we were going to stand with regard to the staff's proposal to separate corporate and individual integrity. You want to indicate why you think so? COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Yes. Yous see, from my

point of view the GPU trial record review is independent, as I just answered to Herzel. But I knew that at least

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1 from the point of view of Vic and Jim it was not: They 2 were doing it clearly as part of the restart. 3 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: When have I ever 4 expressed myself on that subject? 5 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: What? 6 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I don't know that I 7 ever expressed myself on this subject. 8 COMMISSIONER AREARNE: You have. You sent some . 9 memos. And, as I recall, when you talked to Mr. Ottinger 10 you were very clear that this was critical in being able 11 to address a restart. 그 가지 않는 것 같아요. 12 But it seemed to me that the concern was that 13 it Bill's proposal is correct, is accepted, then the 14 Commission would have to be essentially saying that it 15 was not tied to restart because he has essentially told 16 us that the review that he is going to have done of the 17 B&W trial record under his proposal would not be an 18 integral part of the restart decision. 19 I think another way of saying it is, he's got 20 an optimistic schedule for meeting that and ne wouldn't 21 feel that there was a tremendous pressure to meet that 20 schedule if it was not tied to the restart. 23 I think when you realize now SERs are 21 generated, when you realize what he is saying is, he 25 wants to take eight of those topics, voluminous sets,

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give them to these staff groups to essentially write, draft, new SERs in a month, that is just very optimistic

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: My reaction to what they are doing is that it is growing beyond the bounds at least I had in mind in supporting this, to where we are developing new SERS.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: See, that is consisten with naving it be part of a restart decision, an SER. M proposal nad nothing to do with that. My proposal to loo at it from the standpoint of anything more new about the accident, that wouldn't have led to an SER.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Jim, you spoke acout the possibility that there is information in there that migh embarrass the Commission. We have gone through the tria record and the exhibits used in the trial.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: They should represent the best effort of the parties. It has been reviewed by the Stello group. It has also been reviewed by Herzel's group.

Could you get to your second document now? MR. PLAINE: Apparently, we filed a, have a paper on it. Is our paper ready for today? MR. ZERBE: This is which one? CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: You have not got en it

Especially in view of the fact that we had the Stello group look at it and now we have the --

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I really have to interrupt you on that one, Joe because that Stello review was really a joke. They did not make a single reference to that record. Now, you cannot seriously portray that as a review of the record.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: You don't like the report, but the review may --

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: well, let me ask you, did that review satisfy you?

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, I think I made my comment on that.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: What is the answer? CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: That I would have liked to see more reference to the record.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Some reference. There

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was no reference to the record. Don't you regard that as
completely unsatisfactory, or let an an
"unsatisfactory?" Can you say whether
or uissatisfied with that warents
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I say that it should have
had more reference to the record.
COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, you are unable to
say you are satisfied with it.
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I Certainly didn't say I
was completely satisfied with it.
COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, are you satisfied
at all with it?
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Yes, I think the observations
COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Do you think it was a good job?
(Laughter)
COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Did they do what you expected them to do?
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: They came out with what
don't be like Congress there, but
(Laughter)
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But I found fault with the
report and I said so.
COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: But you are saying to
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Jim, in view of
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: NO, I am not
(Simultaneous conversations)
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: In view of the Stello
report and, and
COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: They didn'd do a damned
thing, Joe.
CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But I say, fine I am
asking him his judgment in view of the Stello report
and the OGC preliminary document where you suveryed the
ecord, and now unfortunately you have not had a chance
o see, nor have I, the final document. But based on
these things, do you still feel that there may be a
ource of embarrassment?
COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: That is what I am
oncerned about. First, as limmited as I tend to agree
ith Victor that as far as the product of the Stello
eview was concerned, it was an unsatisfactory product.
t aidn't provide any basis for me at all to go back and
erify the accuracy of their judgments.
Second, they did say that they found
nformation, new information, that related to issues in
ne proceeding. Now, granted I guess this was only one
ssue that was actually referred to the staff, but ey
id say there was new information. Their view was it was
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1625 I STREET, N.W. - SUITE 1004 WASHINGTON, D.C. 20006 (202) 293-3950 not significant new information, it didn't alter their judgments.

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3 But my concern is that I think there is at 4 least some indication that there is new information 5 there. I have concerns about the adequacy of the review 6 in terms of having something that we can reviewe and assure ourselves as at least some kind of a fair look at 8 it, and third, it was only a portion of the material. 0 Whether the parties, including B&W, put their best case 10 forward in the first half of the trial, I think, is an 11 assumption that you just cannot necessarily make: 12 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: They certainly would not 13 have put less than their best foot forward. 14 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Well, unless they 15 were saving some of their ammunition for their half of 16 the case. 17 So, it does seem to me that we have to make at 18 least some effort to look at that material and to reach a 19 judgment on whether there is information in there that 20 really is significant and affects the issues in the 21 proceedings. 22 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: So, you say it should be done before we -:-21 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I think at least some reasonable effort should be made. TAYLOE ASSOCIATES

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1 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, I guess I divide it 2 more black and wnite. I don't know what "reasonable 3 effort" means unless they mean what they are doing. 1 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I am not dissatisfied 5 with what the staff is proposing. 0 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: So, you would say that . ought to be done before we make our immediate 8 effectiveness decision on restart? 9 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I guess I am inclined 10 to say, yes. Yes, that I think it should. 11 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Now, Vic, you said 12 something about agreeing with Tom Roberts. Could you --13 CCMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, just in his 14 comments about this being a great morrass. 15 Incidentally, I had the Secretary look up the 16 various memoranda and he doesn't seem to find anything 17 that fits your description of what I said. 18 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Let me fix it. Then I 19 have --20 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Perhaps my memory fails 21 me. 22 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Maybe I got the wrong 23 impression. My impression was that you felt it was 24 necessary to look at that for anything that might affect. 25 restart. Was that incorrect?

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1 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: well, I think that we 2 needed to look into the questions, yes. 3 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: That would affect 4 restart? 5 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: That would affect 6 restart. But what I am saying also is that this is 7 assuming the Commission is continuing on the course it is 8 continuing. Now, I would also say that I don't feel all 9 these things are necessary for restart if we put in a new 10 "high command" in that company. 11 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: No, and you have been 12 consistent on that, that has been your position for a 13 long time. 14 My question is, is it incorrect that you felt 15 that it had to be looked at for anything that might 16 affect restart? Isn't the conclusion incorrect that you 17 would have then concluded the review would have had to be 18 done before the Commission addressed restart? 19 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I guess probably. But, 20 you know, I have said before that in reviewing these 21 documents you don't start at page 1 and just read every 22 page. 16	go through the review to look for things that might
17	affect restart if you were not going to hav. that review
18	be required to be completed before you addressed restart?
19	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I would like them to go
20	through the documents in some intelligent way and see if
21	there are things that are important to restart, yes. But
22 .	that doesn't mean starting at page 1 and going through
23	all the record.
21	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Sure. No, I recognize
25	that. There is a difference in the way it is done.
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1 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Right. 2 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: But you would want that 3 review to be completed. 4 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: That is probably right, 5 assuming that -- at least I think it ought to get done. U But I must say, barring a change in the top management of 7 that company, my present view is that that company ought 8 not to be permitted to run the plant. 9 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Sure, and that has been 10 your consistent position. 11 COMMISSIONER ROBERTS: Well, then who would you 12 include? 13 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I would include the 14 chairman, the president of GPU, and the president of GPU 15 Nuclear. 16 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: That is Koons, Diekamp 17 and Arnold. 18 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: And if you changed 19 those people and got pretty decent people in there, I 20 just don't think it is necessary for us to look into 21 every detail, and we can count on a new management to 22 straighten those things out. 23 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Could you depend on the 24 new management, would they be familiar enough with the 25 issues to really be able to cope with them? 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convinced that the new management would necessarily come in and do better. I am thinking, starting with the Chairman of the Board.

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COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, I think there are very strong, important advantages there for moving new people in nere.

Now, people were arguing just a little while ago about the advantages of having had new people in all the various jobs in the company. Now, you can't have it both ways. Either that is a good thing or not a good thing.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: well, no. You could have it that way, though, where the management is making the changes in the lower divisions to bring about --

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Yes, but these are the same guys. You know, I don't know if you want to talk substance now. The fact of the matter is, all of those companies -- you know, we can play games about GPU Nuclear and so on -- all of those companies, as far as I can tell, are run by Koons and Diekamp. They are the two guys that run that entire system.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But they are thinking about changes in the organization.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Right. And I must say, I do not have confidence in those people. Arnold is a

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tough guy in GPU --

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2 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I disagree with Vic's 3 conclusion. But I agree with him, it is really odd that 4 when you look at the staff's description --5 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Sure .--6 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Of who is involved in 7 it, they start and they don't list Herman Diekamp. And we 8 all know from all of our involvement with this, ne has 9 been completely enmeshed --10 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Yes, and Arnold 11 basically takes orders from Diekamp, as far as I can 12 tell, even right here in a meeting. 13 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: So, to have a chart that 14 starts without listing him is absurd. 15 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Oh, I have no argument 16 with that. I think your comment was well taken. But now, 17 whether or not you have to start with the Chairman of the 18 Board and the presidents -- when they are making changes 19 20 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Sure they are making 21 changes. 20 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, I think that we have 23 to evaluate whether they are making the right changes or 24 good changes, effective changes because all of the new 25 management can come in and do is make changes.

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COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I would say that --CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Unless we already --COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Barring -- it seems to me the company has either got to accept responsibility for things that have happened, wrong-doing which in my view has taken place, or the top people have got to get changed out. They have not accepted the responsibility that I think they need to accept. In fact, they blame us, they are suing us.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Can I ask you another question? Suppose Koons were replaced, after all, ne is elected by the Board I presume and the Board picked somebody else these days on the Board. Would that be a satisfactory solution, at least so far as Koons is concerned?

Is it Koons, or Koon?

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: well, I just have not addressed that. But I think you need a new chairman, a new president of the company; just new people who are in charge. It is not my intention to go after these people personally wherever they go off to. But I think you need a new chairman, a new president, new leadership in that company, and a new president of GPU Nuclear.

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1 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Does anybody else share 2 that view? 3 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I don't because if I had 4 agreed with that, then I would have resigned from the NRC 5 after the accident. 6 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, let's not go 7 through that again. If you want to --8 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Vic, I think this is 9 important. 10 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: The fact of the matter 11 is, we are the judges here and this is on our plate. 12 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Vic, but I am just 13 trying to say, if the conclusion is that the people at 14 the top of the organization are the ones responsible for 15 the difficulties and that we can't look into enough 16 detail to see where the difficulties arose, we want to 17 make changes to put it in shape, then the Commissioners 18 of the NRC should have resigned. And we did not see it 19 that way; certainly, I didn't. So, I disagree with that. 20 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: The question is, should 21 the president who told people to resign, or not. 22 Now, he made his decisions; the Senate made 23 their decisions. 21 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: We are an independent 25 Commission.

14	is top management attitude that is the ultimate decider

16	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Sure, thata is right.
17	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: It is top management
	this, and top management that.
18	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: That's right. That's
19	right.
20	COMMISSIONED CTLINGEN
21	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: well, nere top
22	management has screwed up, has behaved has acted
23	wrongly; has refused to face up to its responsibilities
	and I say, top management has got to go.
24	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I would
25	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Let me ask. I am sorry, go
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ahead.

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2 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I would disagree that 3 they have -- to say they have refused to face up to their 4 responsibilities. I think they have made a number of 5 major changes, including a reorganization of the whole 6 organization. They have substantially beefed the 7 organization up. They brought in a lot of people from the 8 outside. 9 They really, as far as I can tell, they went 10 out and tried to get as competent people as they could to 11 come in to run the various elements of this organization. 12 So, they have made a number of changes and they have 13 recognized it. 14 Now, when you say they have not essentially 15 admitted their responsibility, the point I made in the 16 open meeting, it is not obvious to me -- given the suits 17 and countersuits and the positions of PUCs with respect 18 to what can and cannot be allowed into rate bases -- I 19 think it is a very complicated situation as to what they 20 could admit. 21 For example, I still believe that their filing 22 the suit against us was part of that strategy. 23 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, they are just 24 caught up in that situation and that is just too bad. But 25 what you are really saying is that you have a better view

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1 of them than I do. 2 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Yes. 3 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: And for that reason you 4 don't want to take that sort of action. 5 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But in the interest of 6 trying to get something done, does anyone else share 7 Commissioner Gilinsky's view that Koons, Diekamp and 8 Arnold should go? 9 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I don't go that far. 10 I think I am probably right in the middle of where John 11 is and where Victor is. I have some serious questions 12 about the competence and integrity of the management of 13 the utility, based largely on the cheating incidents. 14 I think something needs to be done and I do 15 not have a great deal of confidence in allowing that 16 utility to operate the plant with the present people it 17 has. But I don't think -- at least in my own mind -- that 18 the evidence goes so far as to say that I could finger 19 those three people as saying, those three have to go. 20 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: So, as far as these three 21 are concerned --22 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Mine is more, is 23 broader as far as the management of the company as a 24 whole, rather than those three specific individuals. 25 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, my feeling is that TAYLOE ASSOCIATES 1625 | STREET, N.W. - SUITE 1004 WASHINGTON, D.C. 20006

2	reservation. If any of these allegations, particularly

6	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Of course, if
7	investigations lead to specific information on an
8	individual like Arnold saying to him, he knew something,
9	did something wrong, that is different.

8	I understand what Jim is saying. I think the likelihood
9	of that happening is extremely remote and I think it is a
20	misuse of resources.
11	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes. You may be
22	right. But it is a gamble.
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1	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I mean, really.
5	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: That is what it boils down to.
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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: all right, let me ask another question. Well, that would be three to say we don't have to have it for restart, two to say we want it for restart.

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Is the approach being taken by the staff satisfactory to the Commission, that is, turning it over to NRR and having them proceed as they outlined to us this morning?

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I think as far as the volume of this is concerned, I think it has to go down into a staff element. I guess there is a little concern, I think as Vic points out, that when you have this large a volume you have to do it in intelligently in the review.

I had no way of telling whether or not they are doing that, and I don't know how the Commission could find out.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: The reason why I thought that staff approach was a resonably sound one was, one, it seemed to be a more systematic approach than Vic Stello had used, admitting that Harold has got more resources to put in on it.

But one, it did seem to me that they had adopted a systematic approach and, two, it seemed to me from their description of the product that the product

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would enable us to go back later on and verify the quality of the job that has been done, and that is something we simply couldn't do.

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COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: If there is some mechanism -- and I guess we would have to leave that to General Counsel -- if there is some mechanism for someone either from OPE or the General Counsel to track that process.

My sense is that Harold agreed immediately ton your question, will all these be referenced. I am not sure whether the he realized what amount of effort that was now going to require on the part of the staff doing that review of record, of everywhere they run across something and do that in such a way that it could be then, as you said, we could go and look at that document. COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes.

COMMISSIONEP AHEARNE: That is as very large undertaking, requiring very good records control.

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It would be useful if someone from the Commission staff office could check on the process they are using to verify that you guys are going to be satisfied.

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COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes. Although I think you nave to recognize, and in my own view I certainly recognize that this has to be a best effort kind of thing. This isn't something where you can examine if that much ---

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: well, reasonable effort.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Well, okay, reasonable effort. You can't examine that many documents within that period of time and be absolutely certain that you have identified everything or described it in great detail. I think you just have to view the effort and the product within some reasonable bounds.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Take emergency planning, the trial record realy speaks about emergency planning that was listed at that time. My recommendation would be that they spent very little time on doing a review of that and only scanned it by subject matter areas to see if there is any information that might impact on what we are getting to day.

What I am getting at is to use the reasonable point of view that Victor pointed out. I forget the word he used, intelligent point of view, to take an intelligent approach to it.

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COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: My recollection of the emergency planning issues was that something like that I think would be fairly reasonable. I am not sure that I would expect to see too terribly much that would be directly relevant to the emergency planning issues that we were raised in the restart proceeding.

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, let me make a proposal, that the statf approach is okay, but it should be pursued on a reasonable basis and with wisdom with regard to the extent of review on each of the various issues, for example, emergency planning because I think we have got to give them an answer one way or the other. By the staff approach is okay means also that it be assigned to NRR.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Now OGC and OPE had recommended that the Commission address -- they say "The Commission may want to state expressly its views on whether or not the review must be completed before restart."

CHAIRMAN PALLADING: Well, I have three to two, review of GPU versus B&W trial record not needed for restard.

COMMISSIONER ABEARNE: But you are going to include chat in what you are talking about.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: On, yes. Now I was going to the staff approach.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Before you do that, one

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1 element that I think ought to be in there, is I think there 9 ought to be a bin for management competence and integrity. 3 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: well, I assume that there 4 is one. 5 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: well, it wasn't listed 6 in Harold's little chart of viewgraphs, and what he said was they are going to do the best they can and just look at 8 those on a case-by-case basis becuase they are technical 9 people and they are really not qualified to identify those 10 things. 11 COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: Yes, you are right. 12 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I would renew the 13 suggestion I made this morning that at least they ought to 14 consider the feasibility of having one person work with 15 them who they could just consult with. But we are not

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COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: well, but what he is saying, the Counsel has just given you his advice that that only pertains to restart but the proceeding continues with appeals, et cetera. That is what happens when you have the staff in hearings. You ought to take the staff out of the nearing at this point.

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COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I think ultimately if there is anything still ongoing on the proceeding when the staff comes up with this information ---

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: No. In this particular case it is information that is going to be used as part of your decision. That is what does the trigger. It doesn't matter who is doing a generation.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: It is a good thing I never decided to become a lawyer.

(Laughter.)

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COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Is ultimately there is something left of the proceeding at the time that the staff comes in with its conclusion on this, would seem to me at that point this would still be part of the proceeding and at that point you would have to deal with providing an opportunity ---

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Define for me what the proceeding is.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: The one that the Commission started in terms of the reviews of all of these issues leading to an ultimate decision. If we make an immediately effectiveness decision, there is still a merits review going to the Appeal Board and ultimately the merits review by the Commission.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: The proceeding is not then

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1 the immediate effectiveness decision? 2 COMMISSIONER ASSELSFINE: That is correct. 3 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: It is part of it. 4 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: That is part of it, but 5 it is not the full substance. 6 COMAISSIONER AHEARNE: It is the full 7 adjudication and it ends for the NRC when the Commission 8 makes it final pass or decision on the merits review, at 0 which point ---10 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Now we could simply say 11 that the immediately effectiveness decision is the decision 12 period. 13 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: well, I don't think 14 anybody is proposing that. 15 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: We haven't talked about 16 investigations yet. 16	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I think that is the point.
17	COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I think that is perhaps
18	the way to say it.
19	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I think that is a very good

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1 MR. ZERBE: There were no facts developed that 2 came up that would change our position. Now on the part 3 that OGC looked at relative to the trial where they are 4 dealing in ---5 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: What did you look at? 6 MR. ZERBE: We were looking at the trial to come. 7 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I see. Well, I am not 8 interested in that for the moment. 9 MR. PLAINE: That was the question I was raising. 10 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: So you did not look into 11 wnether this transcript affected the restart decision. 12 MR. PLAINE: No, that was their decision. 13 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: OPE did that. 14 MR. PLAINE: OPE did that. 15 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: That is very interesting. 16 MR. PLAINE: They did it using whatever material 17 we had found and summarized in a litigation memorandum. 18 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: So the General Counsel 19 has never looked at this B&W trial record to see whether 20 there is anything in it that would affect the Commission's 21 restart decision? 22 MR. PLAINE: Not per se. 23 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I thought you did. 21 MR. to testimony before Mr. Ottinger.

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MR. PLAINE: I didn't hear what you said. COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I said it is contrary to what the Chairman testified to before Mr. Ottinger.

MR. PLAINE: We prepared a memorandum based on looking at the testimony, not the whole trial record, just the actual testimony, the record of the 47 volumes, and maybe one or two exhibits crept in there because they were in part were used in the testimony.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But, remember, you came to me, or maybe it was OPE, and in a meeting it was stated that one of the major decisions was whether the legal assessment regarding restart could be separated from the legal assessment affecting litigation.

My first reaction was oh, yes, we ought to separate them. Then on appeal after appeal in statements that you can't separate them I said well, then do it the way you were planning to.

So I took from that that there was review so far as the restart issue was concerned at least on the part of OGC.

MR. PLAINE: OPE used this material ---COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Yes, but OPE are not lawyers and they don't understand evidence and they are not familiar with dealing with this ---

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1 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But see, that is why I 2 wanted the separation. I said the things that you reviewed 3 that affect restart ought to be in a separate document from 4 those that affect the litigation. 3 MR. PLAINE: It is. 6 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: No, from legal counsel. 7 Remember, that is what the issue was, should the legal 8 counsel assessment be divided. 9 MR. PLAINE: There is an A paper and a B paper. 10 These are attachments to a cover in which OPE takes the 11 view as to whether or not whatever we have found is useful 12 in connection with the restart. 13 Now they make a different judgment on certain 14 things with respect to restart than we would with regard to 15 Eighting the litigation against the USNRC. That is the 16 difference. They draw on the material thought. 17 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I don't know whether yours 18 was the A or B paper, but whatever yours was was the one 19 that I thought ought to be divided into two parts. 20 MR. PLAINE: Well, it could be separated. 21 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I am only using that to say 22 that it was my impression that you had addressed the legal 23 aspects affecting restart. 21 MR. to identify issues related to both the litigation and restart. The issues thus identified were then sent over to a different team led by OPE to examine what implications those issues had for restart. That is now the two documents got separated.

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We did review the transcript and it served the dual purpose, but the ultimate conclusions on the effect on management were drawn by OPE. But we participated in reviewing the transcript to make sure that all the issues were identified as an input to OPE's review process.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But it did nave a dual purpose, both ligitation and TMI-1 restart.

MR. MALSCH: That is right.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Are you willing to go till 12:30 or even a little later?

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I would not like to.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, Vic, we are getting to some decisions I know ---

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: If you think you will complete it by 12:30, but I don't think you will.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, let me try.

Should the staff review the GPU proposal and the comment on it and pursue it as part of whatever it feels it needs to do on revalidation and make other recommendations if necessary to the Commission?

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COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: It really confused me. It confused me on two grounds. First, the one that OPE and OGC raises as I tried to raise in the meeting.

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I am really puzzled by if they make sweeping changes if now is an organizational structure rather than a people structure, but as I recall the Board, the Board addressed a people structure.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: That is right. COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: They went through these people and addressed the competence of those individuals. I recognize, Joe, your issue well, an organization has to have the ability to make changes. That is true, but in this restart issue, as I recall the Board, they focused very heavily on specific people.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, I was giving caution for the future. I didn't want to tie the future ---

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I understand that, but for right now I think the memo we got from OPE and OGC is right on that point.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I agree with John.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: The second part, the reason 1 asked the question in the meeting, I am not sure whether I would really want to characterize this as a GPU proposal. I just get the sense from the way harold answered that our staff has told GPU that, look, one of the problems

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the Commission is having is that these people are still there that had previous links. So can't you in some way come up with a proposal that would separate them out?

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So I am not sure what good it would be to have the staff review the GPU proposal.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, I only found two things in the GPU proposal, and that was that the emphasis on Clark being in charge of TMI-1 and some different approach to Husted. The rest of it is just organizational charts saying here are where the changes have already been made. There is nothing new that they are proposing.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: In the meeting yesterday actually they did talk about a number of people that they were not going to have associated. They were going to allow some operating licenses to lapse. In fact, they are going to withdraw some people who had operating licenses, withdraw the licenses.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, my own feeling is that if GPU wants to make proposals and they impact on restart, we should have the staff input as to whether or not it is a favorable or unfavorable impact.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Well, I think what we ought to do is on that question, and the staff is a party, and get comments from all the parties. Say we have received this proposal from GPU and any party that wants to provide

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comments or advice or views on the proposal, that is fine. Let them do it.

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4	I think the more fundamental question is the one
	that John'raised which is what about the staff's proposed
5	approach? I must about the staff's proposed
6	approach? I guess I am inclined to agree with your
	comments. I just don't think it is formity
7	the organization from the individual

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18	CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But if you get a proposal
19	from a utility you can't ignore it.
	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: That is right.
20	COMMISSIONED AND
21	COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: One issue is GPU has
20	proposed some management changes, and I think the right
22	way, as Jim said, you have asked all the parties for their
23	comments and I have asked all the parties for their
24	comments, and I think OGC has to look at the issue they
	raised, what effect does it have on the Board decision.
25	COMMISSIONER ASSESSMENT
	COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Right.
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COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: The second one Jim was talking to was Dirck's proposal to separate people from organization, and I agree with him on that also. What I gathered from the OPE/OGC memo is that it is just too late in the process to make that kind of separation.

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I understand that. But now I don't your saying that you consider the staff as a party and therefore we ask everybody for comments. If you said the staff ought to review it, consider it and then also ask for the parties' comments, I would say then I would understand it. Otherwise, I don't know who has the job to do it. The parties don't have any job except to comment. Thes staff has a job to make sure that the public health and safety is protected.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: But in these proceedings they are a party and that is the price you pay for carrying on ---

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I dian't intend it and I don't like it either, but we have got it.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: But you have the staff now saying to us that they are going to have to revalidate their position on management integrity and competence. I guess my own view is if you want to explore the GPU proposal to understand more fully what it is, I don't have any problem with that. If you want to bring all the parties

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in and have GPU give us a short presentation and then have the other parties comment on it.

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CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: I was thinking of us doing it. If the staff has a proposal from one of the parties as part of its review, it should review that proposal. It should also be served on all the parties and then it should be factored into the revalidation program to whatever extent they think it is important.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I guess I don't have real difficulty with that, although I think in this sense the staff is pretty much just like any of the others. The staff had a position on these issues, they have said they are revalidating it now and I think the staff has to decide what weight they want to give the GPU proposal in making their revalidation.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Okay, I will agree to that. That is was getting at. They should review it to satisfy themselves with regard to the impact it has on their revalidation.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Sure.

COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: But they have done that. They have had a meeting and they have ---

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I am not sure they have really reached any conclusion.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: They had the meeting

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yesterday which was to try to explore and get further information because that original letter was very sparse.

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COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: Well, ultimately they will come up with some view of it which will emerge in the form of their own position.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: I think your approach is right, Jim.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Okay.

CHAIRMAN PALLA INO: I am going to skip to a question that I believe is of particular interest to Victor and others. Do we want to try to issue a partial initial decision on anything promptly, or do we want to wait until we have all of the items that would fall into place completed before we make any decision?

Now one of the reasons for raising that question was I believe Commissioner Gilinsky was interested in a vehicle for getting his additional comments out and he wanted to get them out early enough so that they may have whatever impact they could have before the final decision has to be made.

So my question is while we have Commissioner Ahearne here do you want to make a partial intitial decision? The reason I say that is because it is not clear to me how scon we will have another Commissioner.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: It doesn't look to me like

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given the schedule that OPE has come up with, I don't that there realistically is a set of issues that can be addressed while I am still here. I don't think that the Commission should rush on any of those.

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I would expect that there are a couple sets of issues that ought not to lead to that great a disagreement among the Commission and you might want to be able to try to at least get those out of the way, which are some of the hardware issues and perhaps the emergency planning type issues. At least that would begin to close parts of the proceeding and that would be useful and that would give Victor his opportunity.

CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: But it would be off a few more weeks. I do agree that we should not rush.

COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: I think the issues touching on management competence and integrity, I just don't see how we can reach any kind of a judgment at this point.

COMMISSIONER AHEARNE: In fact, on that one, although I didn't believe that the B&W/GPU court record ought to be part of that decision, I would recommend that you wait for the Hartman investigation before you make that decision.

> COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes. CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Well, I would proposal also

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1 to wait for the Parks/Gischel investigation and, as a 2 matter of fact, the ongoing investigations ought to be 3 awaited. 4 I also feel that we ought to try to get the 5 staff to complete the GPU versus B&W trial record as soon 6 as reasonably possible so that it can be factored in. 7 Now we can attempt to make some partial 8 decisions on the hardware issues, on emergency planning, on 9 the design issue and leave the management one to ---10 COMMISSIONER AREARNE: Yes, I think you ought to 11 try to do that. 12 COMMISSIONER ASSELSTINE: Yes, I would be willing 13 to work towards that. 14 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: Now, Vic, I don't know where 15 that leaves you with your desire to get your additional 16 comments out. 17 COMMISSIONER GILINSKY: I guess I will have to 18 think about it. 19 CHAIRMAN PALLADINO: All right. 20 So I would suggest that OPE look at where we 21 might be able to make those decision and get us a revised 22 integrated schedule on that basis. 23 Now that also sort of makes a decision for us 21 with regard to investigations, that we should wait for 25 Hartman, Parks and Gischel.
