Dear Congressman Shays:

I am responding to your letter of February 24, 1992, requesting a review of a proposal by one of your constituents, Mr. Timpson, to give the Shoreham Nuclear Power Station to the Commonwealth of Independent States.

The owner of the Shoreham Nuclear Power Station, Long Island Power Authority (LIPA), is currently decommissioning the facility. Decommissioning a nuclear plant results in radiation and nuclear contamination being reduced to levels that allow for the unrestricted use of the site and remaining structures. LIPA is not required to dismantle all structures and return the site to a preconstruction state. The decommissioning plan for the Shoreham Nuclear Power Station submitted by LIPA does not include complete dismantlement.

Technical considerations preclude the possibility of dismantling the entire facility and reassembling it in one of the independent countries of the former Soviet Union. Nuclear power stations in this country are site-specific installations that are designed to take into account local seismology, geology, hydrology, meteorology, local environmental considerations, and the risk of hazards such as nearby airports, rail lines, and industrial uses. The chances of finding a site in one of the members of the Commonwealth with the same environmental conditions, for which the Shoreham Nuclear Power Station was designed, would be highly unlikely.

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Most of the structural components of the Shoreham station are constructed of reinforced concrete. The nuclear steam supply system, which provides steam to the turbine to generate the electricity, is enclosed in several reinforced concrete structures that could not be dismaniled and reassembled. These structures are too massive to be moved, and dismantling destroys their structural integrity. This limitation alone precludes the possibility of moving the facility. Even if some major components, which could be transported from New York to the Commonwealth of Independent States, were utilized in the Commonwealth, the cost of dismantling, re-siting, and building a facility with Shoreham components would be very high.

I hope this information is useful to your office and Mr. Timpson.
