SUBJECT: VISIT BY GEORGE WHITE, GENERAL ELECTRIC

George white of General Electric, escompanied by his Washington representative, Mr. J. Barbard, came to see me today. He talked about the schedule for Jersey Central and Niegara Mohawk. He slee talked about the problem of the Section 102 finding of practical value, and his only apparent concern was the impact of the Commission's study of this upon the schedule for these two plants.

The main thing he wanted to talk about, however, was Price-Anderson. Anticipating that his company would have to testify, he told me that he is re-emanining the position which the company ought to take. He said the position would depend upon a weighing of three factors: the technical evaluation of the safety of the plants; the marketability of the plants without Price-Anderson; and public acceptance of the plants without Frice-Anderson. He volunteered a guess that the company would support extension. He would have liked some guidence, but I told him that I didn't think I could help him on this marter. I told his that the Commission had already said it would support a modification or extension to take core of the Jersey Central type of problem. I also told him that the ultimate position of the Commission might very upll be influenced by the attitude of manufacturers and utilities

generally. I also told him that I expected that this legislation would be controversial, in the sense that the safety question would be placed in juxtaposition with the most for Price-Ambaroom.
