I am deeply and unequivocally opposed to this plant 18 miles from our home, possibly endangering everyone - old & young in the area - by radiation, in case of an accident.

I have long been

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Convinced that any benefits derived do not justify the danger involved. I've been voicing this protest ever since the first plant was 1/3 completed (That's when we learned about it.) And have written many letters to all concerned.

The two problems with nuclear energy from the very beginning have not been solved.

① Avoidance of heavily populated areas. This plant is smack in the middle of great numbers of people.

② What to do about nuclear waste. We are befouling the earth for future generations of inhabitants, as no solution for waste has been offered.
