Inspection Summary

Inspection on June 15-19 and 23, 1992 (Report Nos. 50-237/92015(DRSS); 50-249/92015(DRSS))

Areas Inspected: Routine, unannounced physical security inspection involving: Management Support; Protected and Vital Area Physical Barriers, Detection and Assessment Aids: Protected and Vital Area Access Control of Personnel. Packages and Vehicles; Alarm Stations and Communications; Power Supply; Testing, Maintenance and Compensatory Measures; Security Training and Qualification.

Results: No violations of NRC requirements were noted.

Four security program observations were identified regarding: (1) a vulnerability of search equipment; (2) weak vehicle search procedures: (3) procedural weakness involving package searches and (4) a weakness in the storage of Safeguards Information. The licensee has taken adequate corrective action for each finding noted above.

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licensee performance continued to be effective in implementing the site socurity program. Management attention to and involvement in security activities at the site and corporate level showed strong support for the security program. Security equipment was operating in an effective and reliable manner. Licensee resources were ample and properly allocated to meet security program requirements. Security personnel observed were knowledgeable of their duties and tested security equipment performed as required, except as addressed in the observations noted above. Excellent licensee performance in the area of security training was noted.

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
