

ISSUANCE OF FINAL DIRECTOR'S DECISION UNDER 10 CFR 2.206

Notice is hereby given that the Director, Office of Inspection and Enforcement, has issued a final decision concerning a Petition dated July 20, 1983, filed by Michael D. Ernst on behalf of the Massachusetts Public Interest Research Group. The Petitioner had requested that the Commission take action to remedy certain alleged serious deficiencies in the offsite emergency response plans for the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station in Plymouth, Massachusetts. On February 27, 1984, the Director of Inspection and Enforcement issued an Interim Decision denying in part and deferring in part the Petitioner's request. The portion of the Petitioner's request deferred dealt with potential bottlenecks near the Pilgrim site which might impede effective evacuation. The Director has now determined to deny the remaining portion of Petitioner's request dealing with this issue. Reasons for this final decision are explained in the "Final Director's Decision Under 10 CFR 2.206" (DD-84-15) which is available for inspection in the Commission's Public Document Room, 1717 H Street, N.W., Washington, D.C. 20555 and at the local Public Document Room for the Pilgrim Nuclear Power Station at the Pilgrim Public Library, North Street, Plymouth, Massachusetts, 02360.



A copy of the decision will be filed with the Secretary for Commission review in accordance with 10 CFR 2.206(c). As provided in 10 CFR 2.206(c) the decision will become the final action of the Commission twenty-five (25) days after issuance, unless the Commission on its own motion institutes review of the decision within that time.
