Dear Mr. Newman:

I am in receipt of the correspondence between you and Mr. Lanny Sinkin, along with an article from the Austin American-Statesman, a copy of which is attached hereto, regarding the request by your law firm for allegedly publicly available records from the Selective Service System.

At this late date, the characterization of this request for the personal records of an opposing attorney/advocate as a routine background check into his qualifications, is "fanciful" at best. Can we deduce a tacit admission that your client, Houston Lighting & Power Company, directed your firm, as its attorneys of record in the licensing proceeding, to make such a request?

If the request was not an attempt to harm Mr. Sinkin professionally or personally, nothing is preventing you from coming forward and providing the real basis for such a request. I, for one, cannot imagine any possible motivation that is rationally related or in any way relevant to the issues involved in the licensing proceeding, beyond the preparation for a potential public relations smear of Mr. Sinkin.

The request and your response reflects badly on your character, the character of your law firm, and the character of your client. These "characters" are precisely what is still at issue in the licensing proceeding. It amazes me that you justify and condone this unseemly activity of your staff rather than publicly apologize for it.

Finally, it is my understanding that the Selective Service System, through an extremely conservative and, in my opinion, erroneous interpretation of the Privacy Act, has refused to release to Intervenors a copy of the request submitted to it by your firm's paralegal. At the very least, considering your reliance on public record request procedures denoted in 32 CFR Section 1665.7, Intervenor desires that you make your public record request public immediately.

Law firm on Nuke project seeking draft records of foe

A law firm hired to help get a federal operating license for the South Texas Nuclear Project has been trying to get the military draft records of an opponent in the case.

The firm of Newman & Holtzinger of Washington, D.C., has ified to get the records of Lanny Sinkin, a former Austin resident and longtime opponent of the nuclear project. The law firm represents the Houston Lighting & Power Co., the managing partner of the nuclear project, in the licensing proceedings.

Guiry last week and sent a letter of protest to officials of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and other parties in the licensing proceedings. Sinkin accused the firm of attempting to damage him personally or professionally by seeking the 20-year-old records.

· Jack Newman, a principal of the

firm, acknowledged that the inquiry was made but insisted the firm had done nothing wrong. Houston Lighting & Power knew about the inquiry, Newman said.

The inquiry was merely a routine check into the background of the sole adversary in the licensing case, Newman said. He said the investigation was confined to the Selective Service inquiry, and only information that was in the public record was sought.

"Normally, we want to be aware of the background, qualifications, and credibility of the individuals we are facing." Newman said. "It is part of the kinds of inquiries one makes."

Sinkin, who has been involved in the proceedings since 1979, wondered why the firm waited until recently to begin checking him out.

"My draft history has been public knowledge for years," Sinkin said. "All they had to do was check the newspapers."

Sinkin said he registered for the

draft in the mid-1960s and left the country later as a personal protest against the Vietnam War. He was never called to military service because his number in the draft lottery was too high, so he never violated the law, he said.

SINKIN, A native of San Antonio, lived in Austin, where he headed a group called the South Texas carrier and Campaign, until led hell. He then was named director of the Nuclear Information and Resource Service, a national anti-nu-clear power group in Washington.

He continues to be a formal intervenor in the federal licensing proceedings for the South Texas project.

Sinkin said he discovered the inquiry when the Selective Service sent him a letter by mistake. The source of the inquiry was traced to an employee of Newman and Holtzinger.

was check "I am appalled, but not really surprised that they would do this red for the kind of thing," he said.
