I received a call from Mr. Finfrock, Vice President for Operations, JCP&L, on

Wednesday, January 9, 1974. Mr. Finfrock said he was just leaving to go to Court

to answer a Writ of Injuction from the State of New Jersey regarding the State's attempt

to prevent them from shutting down the Nuclear Power Plant. This subject is covered in

other correspondence; however, it does relate to the possibility of a significant "fish kill"

of menhaddenfish if the plant shuts down and in effect causes the water in Oyster

Creek to cool down to approximately 37° - a temperature that insures 100% mortality

of menhadden fish. Mr. Finfrock said they were coming down for safety reasons and also

to conduct some plant repairs and modifications to permit operations at 30 M k 2000 electric higher than their massimum output.

Mr. Finfrock said that he would call me after his "day in court".
