1 MACHINE-HARVESTED. IN TERMS OF MACHINE-HARVESTED PLOTS. WE SAW NO STATISTICAL SIGNIFICANCE BETWEEN TREATMENTS. 2 3 ONLY WHEN WE WENT TO THE HAND-HARVESTED PLOTS DID WE SEE 4 SOME STATISTICAL VARIATION THAT'S INDICATED IN COLUMN TWO. THE REASON WE WENT TO TWO METHODS OF LOOKING AT 5 6 YIELDS IS. OF COURSE. WE WERE TRYING WITH THE 7 HAND-HARVESTED PLOTS TO INCREASE OUR PRECISION BECAUSE 8 WITH THE MACHINE-HARVEST WE. BY NATURE OF THE MACHINERY. 9 ARE NOT ABLE TO GET ALL OF THE YIELD. ALL OF THE LINT 10 OFF OF THE STALKS AT THE TWO PICKINGS. THERE IS 11 ALWAYS SOME WASTE. SO THE REASON FOR THE HAND-HARVEST 12 WAS TO BE MORE PRECISE IN OUR YIELD ESTIMATIONS.
