## Zech Sees No Hope Of January Restart

## NRC Defended On TVA Plant Troubles

It was not a failure by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission that led to TVA's troubled nuclear power program, a member of the oversight agency said Monday, adding he sees no January restart of the utility's offline plants.

"We make the rules that must be complied with, but it is the utility's responsibility to manage the plant," said the NRC's Lando Zeck after a tour of the idled Sequoyah Nuclear Plant.

Commissioner Zech sald TVA has "a long way to go" before satisfying the NRC it is ready to safely operate the nuclear-energy producing plants.

TVA asked the NRC last month for permission to reactivate one of the Sequoyah plant's nuclear reactor units by late January, but Mr. Zach said he does not believe it can be online then.

"Miracles can happen," said Mr. Zech, "but I don't believe it can be done."

He said there are too many items that much be taken care of at the North Hamilton County plant which has been shut down since August, and it takes time to do them.

"Eniployee concerns in some cases are very real and need to be addressed," said Mr. Zech.

He added that management needs to work together in a more coordinated way.

"The responsibility rests with TVA.
The NRC has a part to play, but the
ultimate responsibility is TVA's," he

He said he believes TVA realizes that and "I trust they are taking actions to bring the plants on line when it is safe to do so."

A few years ago, he said, TVA plants were operating "fine," but it was in the past year that performance has declined.

He said he sees no regulatory failure on NRC's part.

Asking if NRC could have seen the difficulties sooner, he said it is OK for the agency to determine if it could have made better assessments of TVA's nuclear program.

"It is important to realize that everyone looks where improvements

can be made," said the former U.S. Navy agnural.

He noted there has been some criticism of the NRC, and the critics have "every right to see we do our job properly."

U.S. Rep. John Dingell, who chairs the investigations subcommittee of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, denounced the NRC for its "dismal performance" in overseeing TVA's nuclear operations.

In a 27-page reply, however, NRC Chairman Nunzio Palladino said he believes NRC has acted responsibly.

Mr. Zech said the public can expect a careful NRC review of the TVA situation.

"We make roles that must be complied with, but it is the utility's responsibility to manage the plant," he said.

Mr. Eech said he has visited about 50 plants in the past year and a half.

He said he was impressed with the operators of the Sequoyah plant, adding he thought they were knowledgeable of the plant's operations.

TVA voluntarily shut down its Browns Ferry plant in March and then Sequoyah in mid-August.
