Dear Dr. Friedman:

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During an extended plant shutdown which began October 20, 1982, an increase in Cobalt-60 concentration was noted in the irradiator pool on October 25, 1982.

In an effort to isolate the possibility of a leaking source, the sources in the pool were inventoried and leak tested beginning November 23, 1982. Prior to this period, decontamination procedures carried out by Chem-Nuclear personnel and INI personnel failed to reduce the water activity to a stable concentration below 5 x 10⁻⁵ microcuries/ml.

On December 21 during leak testing the Cobalt-60 sources, GE drawing 135C5605, it was noted that one source produced a smear survey of approximately .2 microcuries. Upon further examination, the source appeared to have evidence of a rupture in its encapsulation. The source identified is dated November, 1970 with an original activity of 2650 Ci. The current activity is 490 Ci.

The suspected source was placed into a stainless steel screw thread encapsulation 18" x 1" to isolate it. Water samples drawn from the confined encapsulation revealed corroborating evidence of the source being a confirmed leaker. Samples showed concentrations of 1.7×10^{-3} microcuries/ml with a background of 5.8×10^{-5} microcuries/ml. The identified leaky source will be removed from the pool by the storage cask and await disposition for re-encapsulation or eventual disposal by proper means.

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Further leak testing of all sources will be performed in an effort to locate any other leaking sources.
