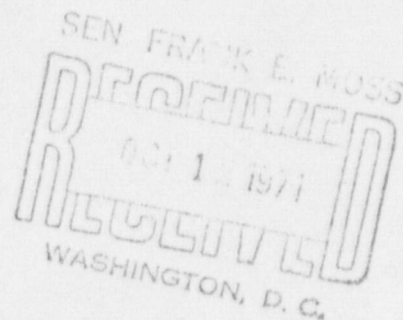

Idaho, Utah Firms Cited In Crackdown

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two Utah firms and two Idaho firms are among 35 cited Thursday by the Environmental Protection Agency in a crackdown to enforce compliance with water clean-up regulations.

John Quarles, assistant EPA administrator for enforcement, said the Roper Yards of the Denver & Rio Grande Western Railroad at Salt Lake City and the Union Pacific Railroad in Salt Lake were named.

Quarles said the rail companies would be granted a 30-day grace period in which to comply with regulations.

In Idaho, two firms were among those against whom suit would be brought immediately. They were Forest Products Co., Snelherville,

and Remington Brothers Produce, St. Anthony.

EPA charged the firms with failing to apply for a permit to dump wastes into navigable waterways. The deadline for applications was July 1. EPA said the 35 firms were among thousands which have failed to comply.
