This will reply to your letter of November 25, 1964, to the Director of Regulation and your letter of November 23, 1964, to me. Since the extra copies of the seismicity and tsunami report are available in this Division, and since your letter to Mr. Harold Price arrived at the same time as your letter to me. Mr. Price has asked me to reply in his behalf.

Enclosed is the seismicity and tsunami report which you requested in your letter to Mr. Price. I am unable to enclose copies of amendments 8 and 9 of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company application. The Atomic Energy Commission was not supplied with extra copies of the amendments for public distribution. They are, of course, available for public inspection in the Commission's Public Document Room at 1717 H Street, N.W., Washington, D.C.

Alternatively, members of the public may order specially reproduced copies in accordance with the uniform AEC pricing policy for copies of documents made on office copying machines. The price is 20c per page for pages no larger than  $8-1/2'' \ge 14''$ . Amendment 9 consists of approximately 46 pages, and Amendment 8 consists of 75 pages. In reply to your recent letter of inquiry you are correct in your assumption that the type of reactor involved had nothing to do with the regulatory conclusions reached on the Bodega Head Nuclear Power Plant. The point at issue would have been the same if the plant had been powered by a pressurized water reactor.

As regards the San Omofre case a similar situation holds. Although the reactor to be built there is pressurized water, we see nothing that would have precluded building a boiling water reactor at the same location.
