Dear Dr. Manly:

Thank you for your letter of January 25th, outlining the Committee's policy on public access to its proceedings. I do not feel, however, that it is entirely responsive to my original letter of November 12th.

I am under contract with Coward-McCann, Inc., of New York to write a case history of a particular reactor project. The publishers rightly feel that the public is entitled to understand precisely what happens in these proceedings, beyond the broad generalizations incorporated in the Code of Federal Regulations.

The fact that this is already a matter of public interest is shown by the enclosed copy of PG&E Progress (December 1964), which the applicant has distributed to approximately 2 million households in northern California. You will note that the company has emphasised that reservations about the safety of the Bodega installation were a "minority view," implying that the ACRS was unanimous in its approval of the project. But the ACRS report of October 20, 1964, mentions no such unanimity and offers no support for the inference that disapproval of the site was a "minority view.

I can find no support in 10 CFR 2,9--cited in your letter-for the implication that either administrative or Congressional intent was to discourage public access to ACRS proceedings, after the fact. Indeed, a close reading of the regulations suggests that the intent was just the opposite -- to facilitate such access, except where matters of national security are involved. Clearly national security is not involved in the Bodega Bay Atomic Park application. Since the ACR3 is a publicly constituted body, since national security is not involved, and since I cannot agree that the Committee's own internal policy, as outlined in your letter, has anything to do with the Committee's ability "to perform its functions effectively," I must again request permission to interview participants in the ACRS' Bodega Bay deliberations.

"We have repeatedly stated that if any reasonable doubt exists about the safety of the proposed Bodega plant, we would not consider going forward with it.

#### Many Experts Found It Sound

"The Bodega site and the engineering design of the plant were studied extensively and confirmed as safe by eminent consultants in geology, seismology and seismic design. The Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards, an independent group of twelve eminent scientists and engineers established by law to advise the Atomic Energy Commission, came to the same conclusion. We are convinced that these views are sound.

The regulatory staff of the AEC, however, has earthquake. Although agreeing that 'the proposed engireering principles appear reasonable,' the Staff has

"We have made provision for adequate electric generating capacity elsewhere to take care of our customers' needs for the several years immediately ahead.

Nuclear Power Future Bright

"Our decision to withdraw the Bodega application does not mean we have lost any confidence whatsoever in nuclear-electric generation. Atomic plants are safe and dependable, as experience in California and elsewhere has shown. Nuclear fuel is plentiful and rapidly is becoming the most economic heat source for power generation. Its application is especially important for meeting the future energy needs of grow-

PG&E's purpose remains, as always, to provide our customers with the most efficient, reliable and safe service at the lowest feasible rates. Further development of this important peaceful use of the atom is essential to this objective.

# S. F. Unility Redos Secund Lowest in U.S.

tric and telephone service for a typical San Francisco household are the second lowest among the 25 largest cities in the United States, according to a survey by the California Public Utilities Commission.

Only in San Antonio, Texas, where gas and electric services are provided by a tax-exempt, municipal system, are the rates lower.

Based on usage of 50 therms of gas, 150 kilowatt rate reduction for both gas and electric customers of PG&E. San Antonio's gas and electric rates were not reduced during the past year and the combined total

Los Angeles, also with a tax exempt municipal electric system, was third lowest in the nation at

Only six large cities in the United States have bills of less than \$15. The highest charge for the three services is 824,94 in Boston and 14 cities have bills of more

Although gas and electric service rates vary somewhat throughout the PG&E service territory, charges in San Francisco reflect low rates in Northern and Central California. Fifty therms of gas cost \$4.00 in San Francisco, down from \$4.03 last year and 150 kilowatt hours of electricity cost \$4.69, down from

An analysis of the Utilities Commission's figures shows that PC&E customers spend only \$1 for gas and electric service which on the average in the other cities covered by the survey costs \$1.28.

PG&E's gas and electric rates are lower now than they were 30 years ago when the value of the dollar

A manuer of California newspapers flow control withdraw its application before the Atomic Energy Commission for the construction of a nuclear power plant at Bodega Head.

The S.F. CHRONICLE said:

"By cancelling its nuceur power project at Bodesa Head, the Pacific Gas & Electric Co. has fived up to its own repeated promises to make safety its overriding consideration in going forward there.

"In the face of conflicting judgments by two different groups connected with the Atomic Energy Commission, the PG&E intelligently concluded that it would be unwise to build a nuclear plant that left any substantial doubt existing as to public safety. It reached this conclusion even though it remains convinced that its commercing design for the plant is entirely safe.

"We compliment the PG&E management for second in what clearly is the public interest and for showing path good faith and good will.

"To concee a point like this in the realm of engineering and geological expertness is not easy for an organization that takes pride in its engineering skill and knowledge. All the more credit, therefore, to the PCRE for electing not to make a stubborn and implacable fight of it.

"The question of nuclear installations for electric power of course still remains in the picture. If not at Bodega, an atomic plant will doubtless be proposed for somewhere else in or near the Bay Area; a particular site, not the advance of nuclear technology, has been defented

"The decision was taken on the advice of a minority stail report from the Atomic Energy Commission. The majority of AEC experts in seismology and nuclear reactor construction felt the Bodega Head plant would be safe. A minority thought it would probably be safe but that the present state of knowledge about earthquakes and reactor construction made it impossible to give un-

That was enough for PG&E. It abandoned the plans and the millions already invested so that there could be no question of endangering public safety.

This is community responsibility of the highest order. Pacific Cas & Electric Co. deserves the praise and the gratitude of all of Northern California. The MERCURY is proud to salute this firm."

The Sacramento BEE had this to say:

"The decision of the Pacific Gas and Electric Company to cancel its plans to build a nuclear power generating plant at Bodega Bay is commendable.

A staff opinion by the atomic energy commission that there is lack of proof of safety of the plant because of its location adjacent to the San Andreas earthquake fault prompted the company to scrap its plans.

PGSE President Robert H. Gerdes has declared this decision will not deter the utility from pressing forward its program to build nuclear powered generators.

Naturally it should not, because the development of power from nuclear fueled plants is as inevitable as to-morrow's sunrise. But until man knows more about this source of energy and how to control it, no one should take unnecessary risks such as building a plant on an earthquake fault. Moreover, the Bodega site was unsuited because of its recreational potential."
